The English 'X' is also the Greek letter 'chi,' which is traditionally a perfectly legitimate abbreviation for "Christos," or Christ. The X is also interpreted by some us a sign of the cross.

Despite the well-established and documented legitimacy of the abbreviation, this paper nevertheless uses it only in headlines and calendars of events, and usually only when necessary to conserve space. (The use of shorthand devices in newspaper headlines is an equally well-established cus-



I've spent the ensuing years in a futile quest for the true meaning of that curious word. I've heard that you are one of the wisest men on earth. Please solve this vexing riddle for me. What does Ofaclyde

LYME DISEASE SEMINAR HELD ... Agriculture and health experts from throughout New Jersey gathered at Montclair State College recently to devise strategies for raising public awareness about the rapidly spreading, tick-borne and highly infectious Lyme Disease. The disease is named after the quaint Connecticut town where the firm case was reported in 1970. In New Jersey, occurrences of the disease have almost doubled since 1985 when 170 cases were reported. More than 350 New Jersey cases were recorded in 1987, according to the Atlanta-based Centers for Disease Control, which last year named Lyme Disease as the nation's number one tick-home # ness. Experts attending the conference cautioned that no one who spends any amount of time outdoors is impervious to the disease, which has infected avid out doorsmen like hunters and fishermen as well as the homeowner raking leaves in the backyard. Describing physical features of the Deer Tick, the principal carrier of the disease, is Jonathan H. Forsell, an Essex County agricultural agent.
