




The Robinson Plantation House, built in 1690, is located at 593 Madison Hill Road in Clark.





First, of the 20 cents your mom gave you to tic in' our handkerchief so you wouldn't lose it, a nickel was spent at the so-called "cigar store" before you even got to he movie. For it was in the cigar store that you bought those penny candies that were available in such a wide

For instance, for a penny you got about a foot-long piece of that paper with all the little globules of hard candy stuck to it, and with the remaining four cents you could get a variety that included those marshmallow squares with the toasted coconut on them, licorice and strawberry twists, and those little wax bottles full of some kind of juice...For that nickel you got enough to hold you through at least half the first feature at the movies.

On to the matinee. After using the remaining 15 cents to buy your ticket, your were handed a free comic book that would have cost you 10 cents to buy at the cigar store. So now the three hours you'll be spending under Hollywood's spell in the darkened auditorium is costing you only a nickel.

Out of this, the theater manager had to pay the ticket-seller, the usher and the projectionist, not to mention the rental on the films, taxes and the electric and coal

Now here's what you got for that nickel: First (right after the "Prevues of Coming Attractions"), the latest chapter of the serialized cliffhanger \_through which budget studios with names like Republic and Monogram bestowed upon lesser actors the closest hey'd ever come to stardom.

Then, a cartoon, followed by a "selected short"- a "Pete Smith Specialty" if you were lucky, or a "Speaking of Animals" or a "Joe McDoaks" ("Behind The 8-Ball"). If you weren't so lucky, it was the "Passing Parade" of John esbitt or the "March of Time."

Next, the newsreel, with mellifluous-voiced Lowell Thomas giving us his version of world events, as further Rocco Collucci, HSPT work board. modified by film editors who had made the most of the scant footage they'd been given to work with. (You hope there won't be anything about fashions, as that is always

Now comes the first of two features-a grade B western, maybe, or Warren William playing a sleuth called the "Lone Wolf."

How the heck, you ask, did the theater owner survive, giving you so much for your money? How did the whole movie industry survive?

Fact is, the theatre owner and the proprietor of the cigar store across the street were two of the richest people n town. And the movie industry was not only thriving, but was making overnight millionaires of scores of people who never would have made it in any other business or
