Council mum on burn unit queries

Litigation cited for silence on matter Recycling gets high marks in poll

Residents were met with silence when they questioned Rahway's City Council about the proposed resource recovery facility at a meeting held August 13. David Brown, East Sterns Street, asked the council for its opinion on the possible regionalization of Rahway's incinerator. Councilman Walter McLeod reminded the council that it was involved in litigation with the Concerned Citizens for the Environment, a Rahway-based group of which Brown is a member. Councilmembers then deferred from directly answering Brown's questions.

The Emergency Solid Waste Assessment Task Force, formed by Governor Jim Florio to study mass-burn incinerators, has recently disclosed its findings. The task force stated that alternatives can be found to incinerators and that proposals should be re-examined.

Bob Carson, Central Avenue, cited the results of a telephone poll made by members of the Concerned Citizens for the Environment. Carson said results of the poll show 70 percent are aware of the dangerous environmental effects of mass-burn incinerators, 70 percent do not think they are acceptable and more than half the residents contacted know that there are more acceptable means of reducing the solid waste flow.

Carson also said that 90 percent of those polled would be glad to participate in an enlarged recycling program, 70 percent object to a larger incinerator and 80 percent object to increased truck traffic. The poll reached 200 families in the City and is not yet completed.

Carson asked if the question of resource recovery could be put on the ballot in November and City Attorney Louis Rainone answered that it would not make any difference. Rainone said

that Rahway is bound by its Host Community Agreement and that siting of the facility is a County function. Therefore the referendum would be non-binding.

"There is a great deal of controversy over the safety and economics of mass-burn incinerators," said Carson. "My feeling is that people are ready to recycle on a larger scale."

Rahway man imprisoned by Doe forces in Liberia

A City resident has been arrested in Liberia and charged with supporting rebel forces who are trying to overthrow the government. News reports from Liberia said Andrew Voros, 33, was arrested last Friday and charged with "rebel activities." Ironically he was completing a documentary film he had been working on for the government at the time of his arrest.

Voros has lived in Liberia since 1981. He is a graduate of Rahway's school system and served in the Peace Corps from 1981 to 1983. His family settled in the City in 1954 and resides on West Stearns Street.

Rebel forces in Liberia have been trying to overthrow the government of President Samuel Doe. Voros was reportedly arrested while armed with a U.S.-made M16 rifle and a loaded revolver and was charged with assisting the rebels in their 7 month quest to drive Doe from power. Andrew Voros founded the Liberian chapter of the


World Wildlife Federation and served a one-year term as its first president. He also hosted a Liberian radio program on the environment and was making a documentary film on the environment when war broke out. Family members expressed dismay over Voros' arrest and deny that he could be involved in any political activities.

McLeod's bipartisan gesture breaks council tradition

Picks Wnuck to sit in for Addona New parking ordinance considered: Block Grant consultant gets nod

During the meeting, the council approved for 1st reading an ordinance that will prohibit parking at all times on the easterly side of Martin Street and between the hours of 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Mondays to Fridays on Pierpont Street from West Milton Avenue to Elm Avenue. The ordinance also designates handicapped parking on Rutherford Street in front of residence 1742 and in front of residence 1761. A public hearing on this ordinance is scheduled for the September 10 meeting of the council.

The council also approved a resolution authorizing the mayor and City Clerk to enter into an agreement with Robert E. Rosa Associates for consulting purposes for the Community Development Block Grant Program at a cost of \$30,000.

The Police Department will hold another auction of three abandoned motor vehicles on September 13 at 10 a.m. at Ryan's Garage, 1063 Westfield Avenue and at 11 a.m. at Murphy's Garage, 2053 Route 1.

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Plastics recycling is Fulcomer goal!

Doesn't buy environmental safety assurances for city-based resource recovery facility

Republican Mayor candidate James J. Fulcomer has announced that one environmental goal of his administration will be to fight for a program both in Rahway and throughout Union County to recycle plastics in order more effectively to avoid cancer-causing pollution from resource recovery.

While state environmental authorities assure us that the county resource recovery facility will be so well-built that there will be an insignificant amount of cancer-causing pollution from the burning of plastics, some environmentalists challenge these assurances. Whatever the truth may be, it is very clear that if no plastics are burnt, there will be no resultant cancer-causing pollution, and if at least substantially less plastics are burnt, there will be less pollution.


The Mayor candidate said that resource recovery, if a determined and committed administration is in office, will provide some property tax relief and improve Rahway property values. He emphasized, however, that the new mayor and council also must work to make sure the facility will have an environmentally healthy impact on Rahway.

The recycling of all plastics that can be recycled, Fulcomer said, is one important ingredient in assuring an environmentally sound resource recovery facility in Rahway. He added that it can be done because plastics are recycled successfully in Western Europe, which has much more experience in the use of resource recovery facilities than the U.S.

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

RESTORATION UPDATE

"R" for "Re-Seat" (5th in a series)
Someone once characterized the typical 1920's movie palace as "an acre of seats in a garden of dreams."

Rebels expressing the splendidly preposterous aura of the great cinemas of yesterday, that phrase also eloquently captures the fundamental truth that "it ain't no theater if there ain't no seats."

By that yardstick, the Union County Arts Center in Rahway is, for the moment, only about half a theater. The entire orchestra and loge sections of the auditorium—850 of the total 1,447 seats—are barren of upholstery.

The WORLD ACCORDING TO NED by Ned Negitso

The Unforeseen Return Of The Gentle, Wicker-Bellied Air-Whacker

When I was a kid, the A&P, the soda fountain, the shoe store and the library all had them, and when I first worked in New York City, fresh out of high school, even subway cars had them.

Then, for a long time, you didn't see them anymore, nor did you particularly miss them. In the 1970s, my sister and her husband bought an old apartment building in a quiet little town near where I used to live, and in the parlor of their living quarters was one—and it still worked!

I remember thinking how lucky they were to have this interesting and authentic artifact from a bygone era: this rotary vane air-moving device commonly known today as a "ceiling fan."

The way I figure it, my sister and brother-in-law, or someone else with similar good fortune, must have had a Japanese businessman in for tea one day around this time and, upon seeing the ceiling fan, the guest must have uttered the Japanese equivalent of "Eureka!" and then rushed back to his native island to build a new factory.

Today's ubiquitous ceiling fan, almost exclusively of oriental manufacture and probably a perfect copy of its 1920s (or earlier) American-made predecessor, exists, I am sure, in far greater numbers than it ever did at the height of its previous popularity.

Unlike the more conventional electric fan, it delivers a comfortably gentle breeze as quietly as nature, has long been doing it on a comfortable summer day in its country.

A mechanical peculiarity of the ceiling fan, carried over from its original design, is that the vanes are attached externally to the housing of the motor, which rotates while the center shaft (the rotating part in more conventional electric fans) remains motionless.

Two cautions to observe if you decide to install ceiling fans in your home: (1) The conventional models are made for high-ceilinged rooms only—the kind that were typical in the early years of this century. For ceilings of conventional height (eight feet), you'll need a "ceiling hugger."

(2) This is a rather heavy device and so it is inadvisable to attach it just to an existing junction box provided to accommodate a simple light fixture. Make sure at least one of the attaching bolts holds it firmly to a ceiling beam.

My wife and I have one of the ceiling hugger types in our bedroom (in addition to three others in various rooms of the house) and, on a warm summer night, it produces much the same effect that millstones used to be able to experience only by escaping to their stumpy summer mansions on the water's edge in places like Newport, Rhode Island.


Hayride for handicapped
