Composting No Answer

A recent news article accurately detailed the undesirable aspects of municipal solid waste composting. As Chairman of the Union County Utilities Authorit (UCUA), I would like to comment on this article, which choed the opinions of the UCUA.

It is interesting that opponents of resource recovery attempt to point toward composting as a "safe alternative" for disposal. As this news article clearly pointed out, this is not the case. The New Jersey Advisory Council on Solid Waste Management's report shows that "Composting and landfilling may release five to 10 times the dioxin generated equivalent-sized incinerator and that the same seems to be true for heavy metals." This is something composting advocates neglect to point out.

Municipal solid waste composting is not working because of unpredictable operating and construction costs and the contamination of the composted material. Two acilities - one in Dade County, FL, and another in Portland, OR. - which were hailed as state-of-the-ar nunicipal solid waste composting facilities, have failed. There have not been any state permits issued in New Jersey for the operation of a municipal solid waste com-

posting facility. Processing of the garbage, sale and quality of the compost, and severe odor problems are just a handful of the extensive problems surrounding full-scale municipal solid waste composting. While it is becoming increasingly obvious that municipal solid waste composting is not the solution to hande the immense solid waste crisis, limited composted of selective materials can compliment a county's Solid Waste

In Union County, for instance: composting of sourceseparated organic materials is an intergral part of the County's Plan. By January 1, 1993, most of the grass, brush and leaves generated in Union County will be processed at the county's composting facility in Springfield or comme

cial organic processing facilities in the region.

Composting alone is not a garbage disposal solution, but rather just a segment of a larger plan. The fiscal 1993 budget is a budget that all of New Jersey can be proud of.
