


For a few hours last week, the firchouse became the jailhouse for many prominent members of the

School budget acceptable

Rahway's proposed school budget contains a tax increase of approximately \$80 on the average home, but considering the effort that went into keeping the increase to that level and the potential effects that further cuts would have, the spending plan is solid.

Getting any tax increase past voters in today's economy is a difficult task, but the Board of Education and the school administration have proven their concern for taxpayers in finalizing this budget proposal. It contains a tax increase of 6.5 points, and while that is a considerable amount of money for the average citizen, there are several factors to consider.

First, the proposed increase is almost half of what was sent to the voters last year. Last year's 12-point increase was defeated by a two to one margin at the polls and was reduced by \$500,000 by the City Council. That also means that this proposed increase is less than what the ouncil recommended after the voters spoke

Also, because the city's distribution of tax bills and the school budget periods do not coincide, and because of a loss in ratables, six tax points carried over from last year's budget. In order to reduce taxes at all, the board would have been forced to reduce \$2 million from the budget. That would have hurt the level of instruction in the schools because there is no doubt that it would have resulted in a reduction of staff.

The staffing level of the schools has not been reduced at all, which is commendable. Readers must keep in mind that some areas, such as librarians, are currently understaffed. A reduction in force certainly would adversely affect the level of instruction.

Revenues from sources other than property taxes have declined during the past several years, which necessitates shifting more of the funding burden to local taxpayers. The school tax increase is not so much an increase in spending as it is a loss of outside revenue.

An outside consultant was hired by the board to review the budget and look for areas that could be reduced. The consultant made a list of 18 areas where he thought expenditures could be questioned. After those areas were explained by Business Administrator Anthony Rocco and Superintendent of Schools Anthony Cavanna, it became clear that what was budgeted in those areas was needed. It became clear then that Rocco and Cavanna knew what they were doing when they created this budget. The board made reductions where and when they could and have come up with a very lean budget.

Salaries and benefits have automatic increases built in by contract. To make a significant impact in cost reduction, school systems and teachers must accept lower con-. tractual increases in the future.

No tax increase can ever really be considered good, but the one proposed by the schools is something Rahway's taxpayers should be able to live with, and is necessary for the continued success of the school system and its students. A better school system makes for a better city. A further reduction in this budget likely will reverse some of the progress the schools have made.

We urge support for this budget not only from the voters, but also from board members and board candidates. For the budget to pass, they must promote it to the public as strongly as they promote themselves.

Suliga says GOP 'raiding' landfill fund

Assemblyman Joseph Suliga, D-Union, charged the Whitman administration with "raiding" the Sanitary Landfill Contingency Fund of more than one-fourth of its budget as part of her deficit reduction plan. The Whitman administration's

1996 budget would call for a \$10.4 million reduction in the fund, which is fised to help pay any contingency costs of closing the state's approximately 600 landfills, according to the assemblyman.

"In a time when our state has finally begun to get a handle on its environmental problems, the administration raids this account for over 25 percent of its value," said Suliga. "Without the proper funding level being maintained, many of the 600-plus landfills still open will have no emergency funding in place.

"This raid, which has become the coincd term for this administration's operations, reduces the Sanitary Landfill contingency fund to \$29 million. This equates to less than \$55,000 per landfill for any contingency costs associated with closure, including lawsuits or emergencies," Suliga added. "I don't think you have to look very far to see that \$55,000 to cover any type of emergency or lawsuit is far from sufficient," he added.

While there will not be any immediate impact felt by the taxpayers, Suliga said, this could lead to serious problems down the road. "One incident of exposure could cost millions; not thousands, millions if something were to scop into Arthur Kill ... Household waste disposal date set

Westfield will host the first of six Household Special Waste Disposal Days sponsored by the Union County Utilities Authority this year. Three disposal days will be held this spring, according to UCUA Chairwoman Blanche Banasiak. The first will be held April 29 from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Westfield Municipal Swimming Pool on the corner of Scotch Plains Avenue and Cumberland Avenue. The second will be held at the Union Public Works Garage at 300

Swanstrom Place in Union on May 20 from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. The final waste date will be held at the New Providence Public Works Garage on Park Place in New Providence on June 3 from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. There is no cost to participate, however, preregistration with the UCUA is required. The event is open to Union County meidents only. Proof of residency is required.

"Residents can help protect the environment by properly disposing of unwanted household special waste at these events," Banasiak stated. This type of waste, such as oil-based paints and pesticides, should not be thrown away with other household garbage."

Acceptable materials include oil-based paints and varnishes, pool chemicals, corrosives and cleaners, pesticides and herbicides, caustics, solvents, thinners, acrosol cans, asphalt sealer, fire extinguishers, flammable liquids and solids, automotive products, batteries, propane tanks, unbroken fluorescent bulbs, thermostats and mercury switches. Only materials in their original containers will be accepted.

Unidentified materials, explosives, radioactive materials, gas cylinders or materials containing PCB's will not be accepted. For more information or to register, call the UCUA at (908) 382-9400

Big flush of hydrants to begin Elizabethtown Water Company

began annual fire hydrant flushing on Sunday to prepare its system for the summer months.

Hydrant flushing is the process of forcing water through mains to dislodge small particles of rust and sediment. Such sediment does not affect water purity, but it can cause water to become discolored when the peak demands of the summer cause water to travel at an increased velocity

through the mains. Hydrant flushing is a necessary part of Elizabethtown's ongoing process of testing and maintaining hydrants and is performed in the spring when demand for water is low. As always, Elizabethtown follows water conservation practices and the amount of water used during the process is kept

to a minimum. Customers may experience discolored water for short periods of time while flushing is being done in their neighborhoods.
