At the conclusion of the business session, refreshments were served and a social hour enjoyed by all present.

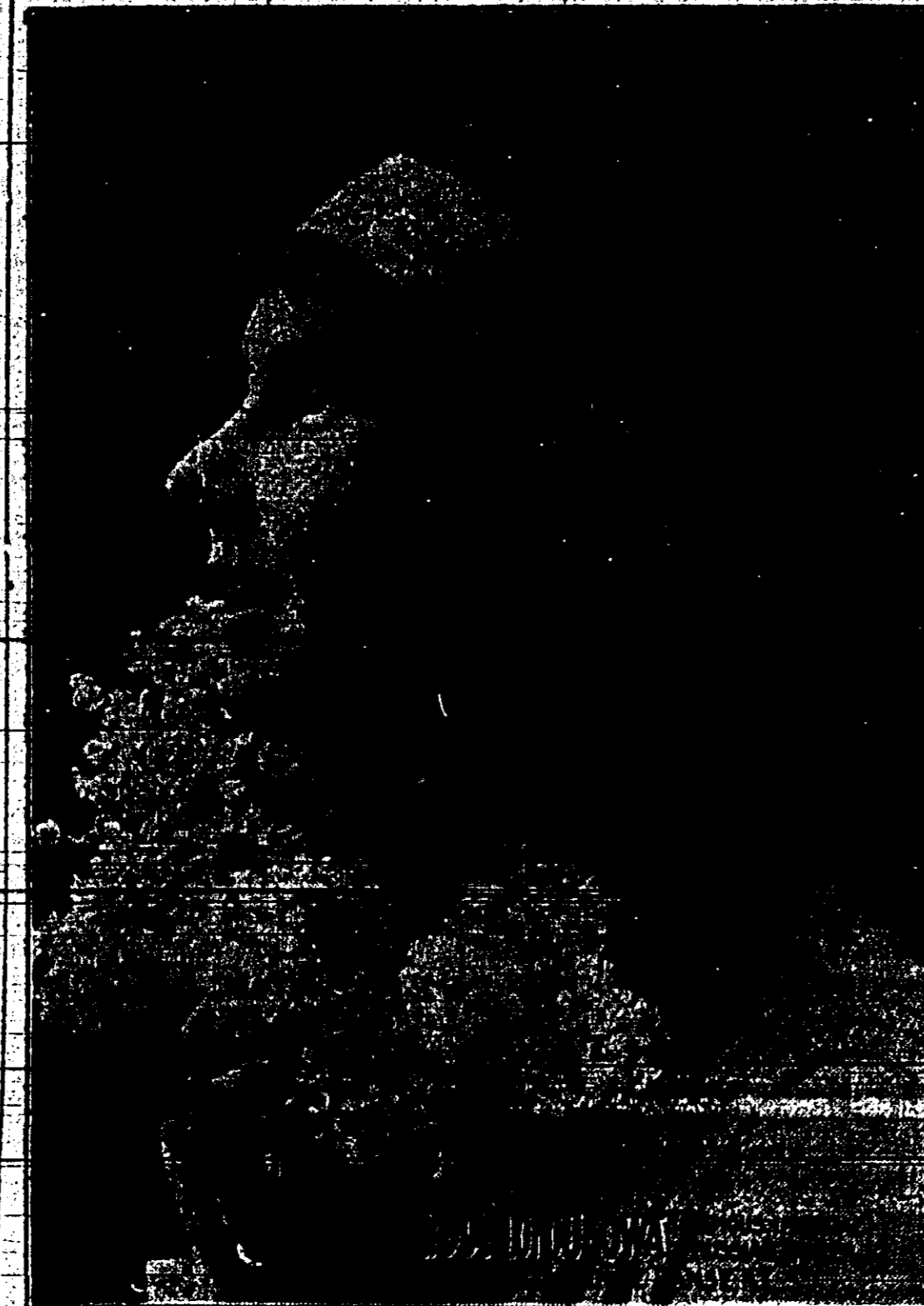

**A DOG WARDEN IS APPOINTED**  
By Council at Special Meeting Held Tuesday Evening—Doubt of Officials Approved  
TO IMPROVE POOR HOUSE

The dog warden question was introduced by Councilman Buckley, who remarked that William Cook, of this city, had offered his services for \$25 per month, with \$1 for each dog every day, and if impounded, to be understood that the city was to pay for the rental of the pound and the feeding of the dogs. Mr. Buckley said that this arrangement should be much cheaper than that of last year, but the cost for two weeks in his collection, was at the rate of \$10 per day. President Trembley recommended that the council take action on the appointment at once, and upon the recommendation of Mr. Buckley, Council was appointed dog warden for the period beginning January 14th until April 1st, 1914, at the figures stated before.

RAILROADS GET ONE-TWENTYFIFTH OF CONSUMER'S DOLLAR

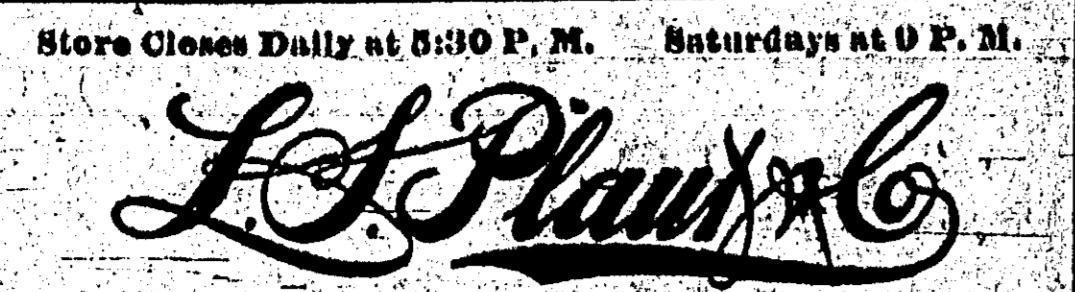
Senior Thomas P. Gore, Chairman of the Senate Committee on Agriculture, made the statement recently in Philadelphia that out of farm produce that retails annually for \$18,000,000, the farmers get only \$4,000,000,000. The railroads, he said get approximately \$500,000,000.

To illustrate Senator Gore's figures the Lehigh Valley Railroad has made a compilation of the most commonly used farm products, showing how much the farmer, the middleman, the railroads and the retailers receive for their services.

Using the consumer's dollar as a basis, the figures obtained indicate that the farmer gets an average of 50 cents, packers, local wholesalers, distributors and retailers combined get 14 1/2 cents, and the railroads get five cents. For an average haul of 1,000 miles the railroads get only one-twentieth of the retail price.

These figures are based on the varieties of food that go to make up about nine-tenths of every family's grocery bill. Meat is not included, on account of its being a staple article of food. But on such commodities as butter, eggs, milk, rice, potatoes, onions, sugar, tea and the many kinds of canned fruits and vegetables, it is entirely feasible to arrive at comparative figures. Any variation in the selection of the list will of course make some difference in the relative position of the producer and distributor, but the railroad's share of the dollar is so small that it can be figured to a certainty. For a 1,000 mile haul the railroads get only five cents.

Confusing the inquiry to the haul over the Lehigh Valley Railroad itself, products from the large farming district in Western New York are brought to New York City, an average of nearly four hundred miles, for a trifle over two and a half cents out of the consumer's dollar. While this is considerably less than the average haul, it shows that the butter, eggs, apples, poultry and vegetables produced in all that rich and productive section are taken to their best market, New York City, for only one-half cent of the city family pays for them.
