THE KITCHEN CUPBOARD

GREEN PEPPERS WITH MEAT.
For a substantial dish green peppers may be stuffed with meat or with a mixture containing meat. Wash the peppers, remove stems, seeds and membranes. Roll five minutes, plunge in cold water, drain and fill with any preferred mixture.

Stuffed With Fish.
Stuffed With Salmon.—Cut the stem and from green peppers and scoop out the seeds. Mix a mixture with two cups of salmon, one teaspoonful of pepper seeds, one cupful of chopped celery and sweet pickles. Mix with thick mayonnaise. Stuff the pepper shells and serve on lettuce leaves. A stuffed olive or piece of lettuce may be put in the end of the pepper as a garnish.

Stuffed With Oysters.—Remove the stems and seeds from green peppers. Pack oysters in their own liquid, season with salt. Chop fine half of a large pepper and use very small onion and fry in butter. Mix the fried pepper and onion and oysters together and add bread crumbs until the stuffing is of a suitable consistency. Stuff the peppers, dot with butter and bake until brown. They may be served with tomato or cream sauce.

Substantial Peas.
Stuffed With Ham.—Take one color, eight green peppers, one pound of lean raw beef, one egg, one teaspoonful of salt, one-eighth teaspoonful of pepper, one tablespoonful of onion grated or chopped very fine. Cut off the tops of the peppers and remove the seeds. Mix the meat with the egg and the onion and fill the peppers with this mixture. Put the onion in the stewpan and just cover with water. Put the peppers in this and stew until they are done.

Stuffed With Veal.—Take large peppers, soak them in salt and water, changing the water constantly to make them less pungent. Cut off the tops that makes them so hot and stuff them with finely chopped veal seasoned with salt, butter, a little onion, parsley, and some sweet herbs and crumbs of bread. Stuff the peppers and fry in butter. Serve with a rich gravy.

Many of them brought their food with them, and in order to stimulate the enthusiasm the people copious quantities of Burgundy wine were given to the assembled throngs by rich nobles, who understood thus to buy the applause of a discriminating public.

AN ACUTE ABSCESS.

The Way It Forms and the Way It Should Be Treated.

An abscess is a collection of pus. It may be either acute or chronic, and it may either be deeply seated in the body or it may appear upon the surface. The chronic abscess is generally of tuberculous origin, whereas the acute abscess is the result of an infection by bacteria.

The acute abscess comes on suddenly with all the signs of severe inflammation—heat, redness, swelling and pain. The pus forms a throbbing pain. The sufferer often feels ill and has a slight degree of fever. In three or four days the abscess begins to enlarge and the pain becomes more acute.

When the inflammation is deeply seated the pus may burrow into the tissues and form a fistula. The treatment of abscesses has changed much in late years. Formerly the abscess was allowed to run its course and the pus was allowed to escape through the skin. The modern treatment is to make an incision and drain the abscess.
