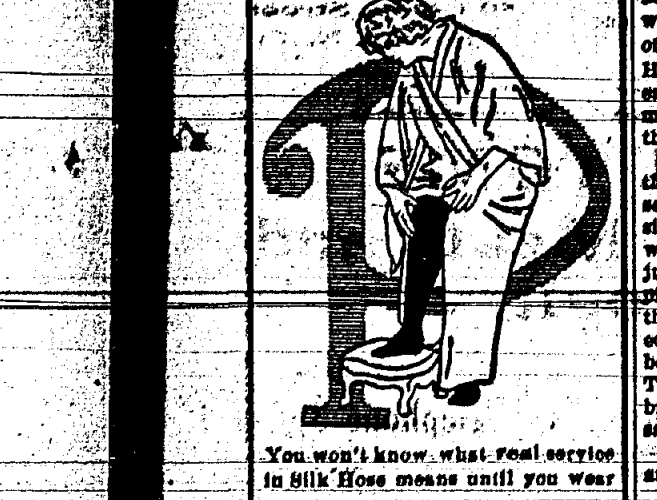

Sealed proposals will be received by the Township Committee of the Township of Linden at the Township Hall, Linden, N. J., at 8:00 p. m., on MONDAY, AUGUST 21, 1936, for the following described work:

(1) Improvement by macadamizing and applying tar surface coat of Lower Road to Rahway from Twelfth Street to the Rahway City Line. Work to be 16 feet in width and the length being about 3600 lineal feet.

(2) Improvement by macadamizing and applying tar surface coat of Grier Avenue, from Elizabeth City Line to limit of Greater Elizabeth, also of McMillen Place, from Edgemoor to Grier Avenue. The work to be 16 feet in width and the length on both streets being about 3600 lineal feet.

(3) Improvement of Peterson Lane, from Edgemoor to Brunswick Avenue, also Brunswick Avenue, from Peterson Lane northwesterly to the Elizabeth City Line. The work to be done with Amelise or Warrenite on macadam base or the roadway to be constructed of concrete with or without a bituminous surface coating. The width of the work to be 16 feet, and the length of both streets being about 7500 lineal feet.

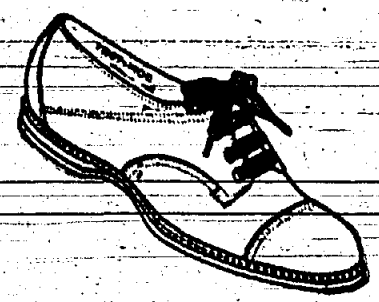
