









THAT S. P. C. A. CASE  
In another column of this issue the President of the Rahway Branch of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals replies to an editorial which appeared in the Record, issue of September 25. The S. P. C. A. President fully explains, and quotes extracts of the law governing S. P. C. A. agents, and everyone will agree that, not only in Rahway, but elsewhere, the Society is doing a work that is most commendable.

The article in question, reflected, in no way upon the integrity or sincerity of purpose of the S. P. C. A. nor any of its representatives but simply voiced the sentiment of a great many people. "What is the reason why the S. P. C. A. agents withdraw their complaint when defendants counsel, asked that the case be tried before a jury. The S. P. C. A. president has evidently answered the question and gives the reason, in that part of the communication, where it is stated that the "Magistrate should declare the defendant guilty or not guilty on the charge after which the defendant may exercise his right to appeal if he desires." This statement, as it is said, "suggested the law in Rahway on the occasion in question." If he did, and the magistrate failed or refused to decide one way or the other, then the S. P. C. A. agent had no other alternative than to withdraw his complaint against the defendant. That is perfectly clear.

The fact that the arrest was made and the case brought before Judge Buckley without the knowledge of the Rahway Branch, etc., is irrelevant, as far as the writer being "unaware of the fact that it requires two witnesses to the act of cruelty. The writer of the editorial is aware that defendant in a case has a right to be adjudged innocent, until his guilt is proven. It matters little whether it pertains to S. P. C. A. arrests or any other branch of the law.

We think that the editorial in question dealt very fairly with the S. P. C. A. side of the case. We credited, and still credit the society with doing good work, but we will adhere to the fact that no man can be judged guilty of a breach of the law until it is proven against him.

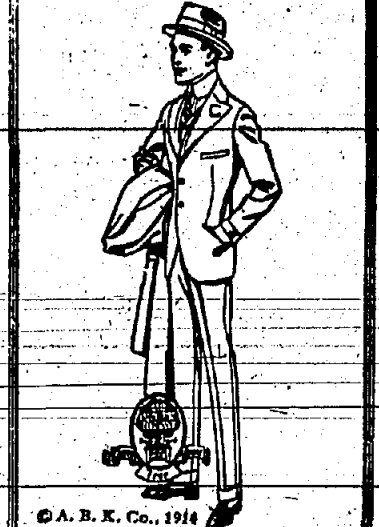

THE REPUBLICAN  
CONGRESS CANDIDATE

John H. Capetick has been a resident of the Fifth Congressional District for thirty-two years. He was born in Lawrence, Mass., September 2, 1860, and attended the public schools of that city until he was twenty years old. With his parents he then removed to Providence, R. I., and there entered the Military School of Morey and Goff. He became a member of the First Light Infantry Regiment of the Rhode Island State Militia and when 26 years old moved to Morris county.

Mr. Capetick said:  
"Uncertainty. That is what acts as a brake upon the progress of the people. Uncertainty as to what the Administration is doing. Uncertainty as to the effect of legislation passed through the Washington mill during the last year. Uncertainty as to what the Administration intends to do." The need of an American merchant marine, acquired by following the same course as that of other nations, was another point brought out by Mr. Capetick, and he also favors a less hostile attitude towards business and the taking of the tariff out of business and placed in control of a broad tariff commission.

on subjects of interest to the citizens

in general whenever it is thought that

the lecture would be of interest to

high school pupils that it be given in

the afternoon for their benefit and re-

ported in the evening for adult dis-

cussion. I make this suggestion be-

cause I believe that the size of the

auditorium will compel us to restrict

the attendance at evening lectures to

adults only.

(c) That the board appropriate \$100

toward the expense of a series of lec-

tures on educational or literary sub-

jects to be given by the teachers' club

in the afternoon or evenings. The

teachers' club will contribute an equal

or larger amount and it will be pos-

sible to provide a series of fifteen or

more lectures on subjects of interest

to parents and teachers and those

who may be interested in literary or

educational problems.

I make the foregoing recommendations

after careful inquiry and believe

that they suggest the best way of

reaching and benefitting the greatest

number possible.

I would ask the sanction of the

board of education to form parents'

associations in each of the several

schools, and for the use of the build-

ings for meetings of such associations.

I would also like your board to

authorize me to employ an expert to

give efficiency tests. This test to re-

veal weakness should be given by an

outsider, the cost will not exceed \$25

or \$30.
