**RAHWAY HAS PLENTY OF WATER**  
Not since the dry spell of 1910 has there been any approach to the present period of dryness. The whole state of New Jersey is in the grip of the drought to the extent that village is suffering, and that on the country roads is several inches deep. Many municipalities, because of the scarcity of water have been cautioned by the authorities to use it as sparingly as possible, as a water famine is threatened, unless relief in a liberal rainfall comes soon. As is usually the case when other cities are beset by the scarcity of water, Rahway has an abundance. This valuable asset, is something worth taking care of. And should be preserved and protected most solemnly, not only by every resident of the city, but the authorities should also guard it as a most valuable treasure. Rahway is growing and each year shows a heavier drain upon the city water supply. According to Engineer Gage, the authority in charge at the pumping station there were 55,463,869 gallons of water supplied during the month of September.

Fortunately, Rahway has an efficient, capable Board of Water Commissioners. Business of the Board is transacted with a thoroughness most agreeable, or should be most agreeable to the taxpayer. There is always a substantial cash balance in the exchequer of the Board after all bills have been paid, and it is one of Rahway's institutions that is self-supporting. The water supply, supplied by the Rahway Water Company, is of the highest quality, and better than that supplied anywhere, and this, taken in conjunction with the many valuable improvements installed in the last few years at the water works, should be looked upon with a great degree of pride by those interested in the welfare of the city. Those who compose the Board of Water Commissioners, and especially the Board's President, Mr. E. W. Langenhove, have devoted to the interests of our water supply and the best methods of keeping it pure and wholesome, a great deal of valuable, personal time. The result of these efforts, is apparent and should be appreciated. Mr. A. F. Kirstein, clerk of the Board and general superintendent, looks carefully after details and business pertaining to his office, is thorough and systematic. Engineer Gage, in charge of the works, transacts his part of the business to the satisfaction of the Board and the completeness of the monthly reports, is evidence of economical management. Altogether Rahway residents should have very little to complain of so far as the water supply is concerned. Those interested, directly in looking after the city water, deserve honorable mention.

**WHY NOT SETTLE IT?**  
A matter of vital importance to this city, which has been hanging fire for some time, centers in sewage disposal plant. The time has now come when it is mandatory upon the city to take definite action, one way or another. The question of a scientific method of disposing of the city's sewage seems to be of considerable magnitude. The matter has been deferred until now, the State Board of Health insists that positive efforts be made to carry out a sewage plant here, in order that sewage may be diverted from the Rahway river.

The question is of so much importance that it should not devolve upon any particular city official or body corporate to decide, but is a question that should interest every citizen interested in Rahway. For a few to come together, from time to time, and talk over the sewage disposal problem, is merely hope deferred. The State Board of Health is not at this late date, going to permit Rahway any longer to delay in disposing of the matter to be much longer delayed. It is a problem that must be met and settled, and settled very soon, otherwise the State Board is apt to act for us and perhaps make it very uncomfortable.

**REGISTRAR SMITH'S RECORD IN OFFICE**

Justification for County Registrar Frank H. Smith's action in basing his candidacy for re-election on the Republic ticket on his record, is frequently given by no less an authority than the highest court of the county. There was an instance of this just recently, when a suit was being tried in which the ownership of property was a factor in the case. The title was not involved in this particular instance, but it had a direct bearing on the case and had to be established by proof.  
Mr. Smith was subpoenaed as a witness and was directed to produce a certain record book from his office showing the ownership and location of the property. It happened to be the Netherwood section of Plainfield. The book was produced and after the witness had been asked to tell the page and title under which the land was recorded, it was offered in evidence. The presiding judge at this juncture informed the attorneys that it would not be necessary to mark the book as an exhibit in evidence, but it could go to the jury as it was and should be considered by the jurors as authentic.

This confidence in the efficiency and accuracy of the Registrar's office is felt generally among lawyers, real estate men and all others who have to do with title searching for the settlement of disputes as to ownership, information concerning owners, or the transfer of the title to another. It also applies to the recording of mortgages, discharges, releases, contracts, leases, etc. The secret for it lies in the businesslike administration of the office which has been endorsed by all who are familiar with Mr. Smith's methods.  
He has adopted as his slogan in the campaign, "A Business Administration by a Business Man." Business Office. In commenting on this fact recently, one of the best known attorneys in the State said, "That has been the Registrar Smith's rule and guide throughout his term, and it is therefore no more pretty phrases to catch the public fancy, or an empty jingle for political effect. Instead, it is the cold brutal truth, which he has earned and is justly entitled to."

**The KITCHEN CUPBOARD**  
FOR THE HOME DINNER.  
DINNER MENU  
Potato Chowder. Tomato Soup. Neapolitan Veal Cutlet. Parsnip Potatoes. Combination Salad. Brown Bread. Apple Fritters. Coffee.

A SIMPLE yet tempting dinner menu is the following:  
Potato Chowder. Take six large potatoes, pare and slice thinly. Chop one onion and two large slices of bacon. Fry the bacon and onion to brown. Put a layer of the potatoes in a baking dish. Cover with the onion and bacon, a little minced parsley, salt and pepper. Add the rest of potatoes. Then cover with a pat of milk in which has been stirred one tablespoonful of butter. Bake in a hot oven for an hour. Cover the baking dish and cook one-half hour.  
Neapolitan Cutlets. Take two tablespoonfuls of olive oil and one scant tablespoonful of lard. Place in a frying pan, and when hot put in one good sized onion and two slices of garlic, both chopped, and brown slightly. Put the onion back to the side of the pan and put into the hot pan the cutlets slightly beaten. Brown on both sides and when brown add half a can of tomatoes, well-seasoned with salt, pepper, one tablespoonful sugar, salt, pepper, one-half teaspoonful sugar. Let simmer two hours. Serve on a hot dish garnished with sprigs of fresh parsley.  
Parsnip Potatoes. Take three or four parsnips, the juice of a lemon, and one egg. Grate the parsnips and wash the parsnips and, if large, cut in half. Cook in plenty of boiling water, containing a little salt and lemon juice. When tender take out and drain. Break with well-beaten egg, roll in crumbs and put on grease, baking pan in a hot oven for one hour, basting with melted butter. Serve in a pyramid with melted butter sauce.  
Apple Fritters. Slice apples that have been pared, cored and quartered over a plate of pulp a half cup of sugar, one-fourth cup of butter, one egg, one-half cup of bread crumbs and three eggs.
