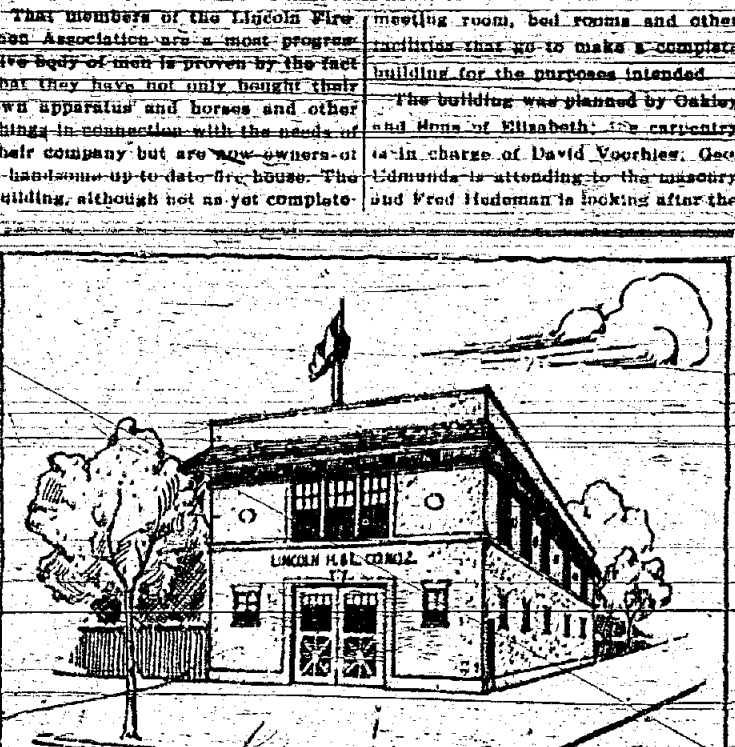

ABOUT ADVERTISING

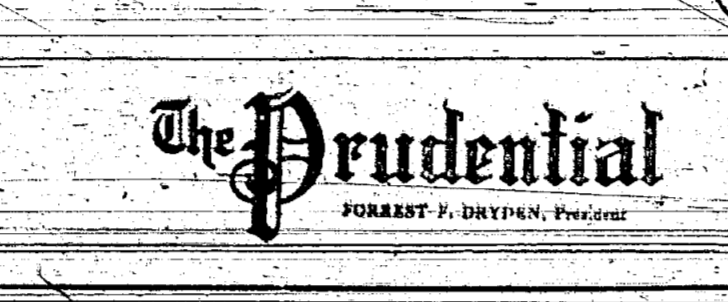
