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REDUCTIONS IN ASSESSMENTS

County Board of Taxation Acts
Favorably on Number of Applications from Rahway

At a meeting of the Union County Board of Taxation, held in Elizabeth, N. J., on January 15, 1915, the board acted favorably on the applications for reductions in assessments filed by the assessors, the following Rahway people were allowed a decrease in their assessments:

Henry Crocker was allowed \$75 off the \$1,750 assessed value on 1/10 Union street.

Jerry J. and Sarah Pitta, 416 Main street, were allowed \$900 off the assessment of \$1,500.

Sarah J. Squire was allowed \$25 off the \$1,375 assessed value at 1100 1/2 Whittier street assessed at \$1,400.

Patricia Haines was allowed \$100 off the \$1,500 assessed value at 1100 1/2 Whittier street assessed at \$1,600.

Manor Real Estate and Trust Company, assessed at \$14,000 for an irregular piece of land with three feet on Cherry street and seventy-two feet on Irving street, asking an \$8,000 reduction. His appeal was dismissed.

Mary C. Higgins allowed \$237 Main street, assessed at \$1,800.

Walter A. Bross and The Hastings Company, 237 Main street, assessed at \$1,800. His appeal was dismissed.

The Weldon Construction Company, assessed at \$2,500 on 1/10 Union street, assessed at \$2,500. His appeal was dismissed.

The Millbury Atlantic Manufacturing Company was allowed \$1,500 off the \$9,500 on 135-141 Hamilton street. The board dismissed the appeal filed by the Postal Telegraph Company asking a cut to \$731.40 in a \$1,500 assessment.

A \$600 allowance was given the W. B. Walrath Realty Company in the \$2,300 assessment on 11 Orchard street.

Evelina Bracher was allowed \$3,775 off various lots in Rahway included in the estate of James A. Hudson, of which she is executrix and trustee. They were assessed at \$3,775.
