The jewelry consisted of valuable hairlooms—which had been forwarded to the office of the Adams Express Company.

Early Returns Show Interesting Results in Different States

Early Returns show that John F. Hyland, Democrat and Taunnamy candidate, was probably elected Mayor of New York by a plurality of about 148,000, his vote being 291,061. Mitchell ran second with 147,918 and

Woman's suffrage probably won in New York State by about 70,000 votes. Suffrage was defeated by a wide margin in Ohio. From present indications Ohio is likely to adopt state-wide prohibition by a narrow margin.

The Socialist and German Alliances in Chicago was defeated by the loyal Americans by about 80,000. The machine organization won over the reformers in Philadelphia by a narrow

margin.
The local option issue has resulted in Democratic gains in New Jersey Governor Samuel W. McCall, Republican, was re-elected in Massachusetts by a larger majority. Westmoreland Davis, Democrat, was elected governor of Virginia.
For the first time in ten years Louisville, Ky., elected a Republican Mayor and an entire Republican city ticket.
