## Vital Issues Stated by Senator Edwards

"The man you choose for your next Governor will deal directly with Prohibition, and with your Trolley Fares and your Electric Light, Power and Gas Bills; It is not a Partisan campaign; it is an election of Jerseymen, by Jerseymen and for Jerseymen."

In keeping with the program of Camouflage and "straddle" the Republican machine, directed by Baird and Stokes and Vice President Wakelee of the Public Service Corporation, in its desperate efforts to divert public attention away from local and home issues in this campaign by talking about wholly irrelevant matters of national or international character, have enlisted the services of the Republican National Committee. No man for whom you will cast your vote on November 4th will have any influence with or duties to perform affecting national issues now before Congress or the Peace Conference.

If I am successful at the election, my every energy will be devoted solely and exclusively to the interests of Jerseymen, to freeing Jerseymen from the hypocritical tyranny of James K. Shields, and Samuel L. Wilson, and the financial tyranny of the Public Service Corporation, represented by Wakelee, Baird, Stokes and Edges Political Utility Commission.

I make the liberty loving and joining masses the solemn pledge to drive the Prohibition and the Public Service lobbyists out of the State House at Trenton. The great outstanding issue of this campaign is whether the Public Service Corporation shall continue to dominate the public officials, commissions and boards of this State, and to write laws to relieve that monopoly of its just tax burdens.

The Public Service Corporation is not content with a monopoly in the most vital industrial and home necessities of New Jersey, but insists upon writing all legislation affecting its subsidiaries, gas, electricity and trolleys, and in dictating appointments of all officials who may have to do with enforcement of the laws against this corporate monopoly.

I believe that the citizens of New Jersey are entitled to as good service and as low a charge for gas and electricity as are the citizens of Pennsylvania and New York.

Through the Public Service Corporation lobbies in Trenton and its partnership in politics through David Baird and Stokes and Wakelee, New Jersey is taxed from 30% to 50% more for gas and electricity and trolley fares than are the citizens of Philadelphia and New York.

The trolley patrons of Philadelphia have made the Philadelphia Rapid Transit a prosperous company on a five-cent fare, while the Public Service Railway Company of New Jersey is bordering on bankruptcy on seven-cent fares with the one-cent transfer.

In New York 80-cent gas has proved profitable to the investor while in New Jersey 97-cent gas of a character unfit for use brings from the Public Service Company a demand for another increase in price with a threat to discontinue the supply.

We are held up for a flat 10-cent per kilowatt hour electric charge in New Jersey by the Public Service Electric Company, while the average rate in other cities operating under like conditions and patronage averages less than 8-cents.

If the people of New Jersey, at the polls in November, repose their confidence in me, I promise that one of my first official acts will be to take steps to remove the present Utility Commission and to substitute a commission that will give the people of New Jersey the same trolley fares and the same electric light charges that prevail in neighboring States operating under like conditions.

The Public Service Corporation, through its gas, electric and trolley subsidiaries, has done more to add to the high cost of living than any other combination of causes in this State.

This single monopoly that dominates the Utilities of this State touches the pocketbook of every home in New Jersey.

The home expense of every poor family is increased by an extortionate charge for trolley fares, for gas and for electric light.

The 25% to 40% overcharge for gas and electric light and power on industries adds just that much to the cost of production, just that much to the selling price of products of the manufactured articles of home necessity.
