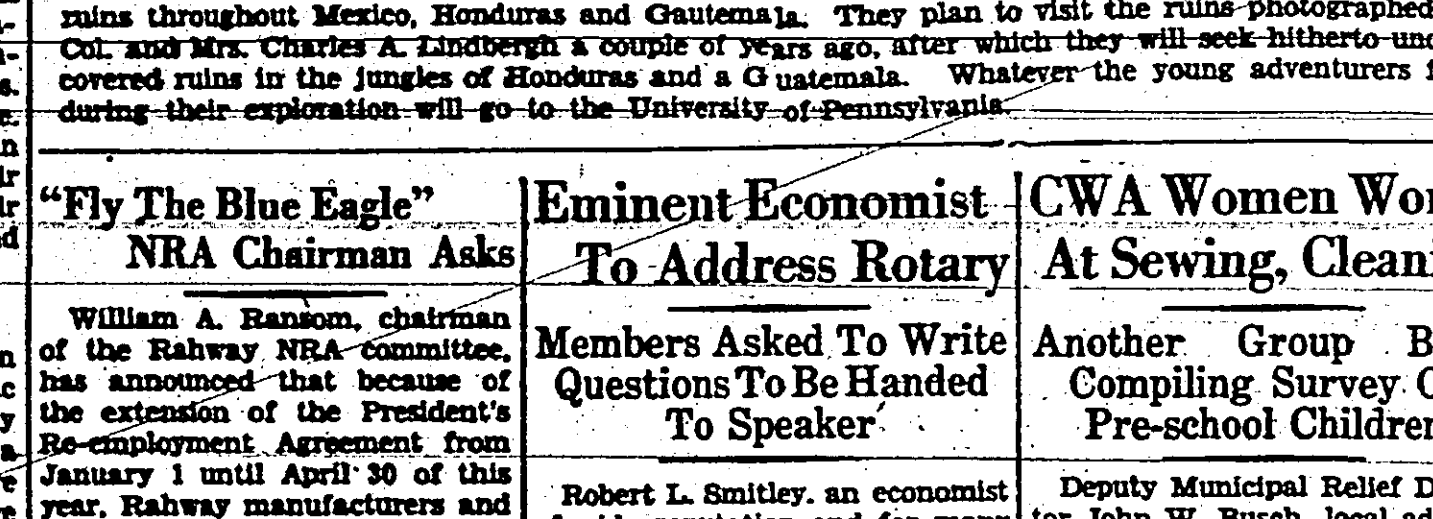

#### GOOD MORNING

#### They'll Serve Us

Now that the smoke of organization has cleared away, we can all sit down and calmly consider the municipal government that we may expect during 1934.

The type of government and what will be determined by one factor—the men who sit in place of responsibility. It will be these men who will be the final arbiters as to what government or bad government.

After giving due consideration to the experience the character and personality and the business ability of those men who now sit in responsible public offices, we can see nothing but substantial grounds for Rahway during this year.

The newspaper believes that through a policy of withholding comment on persons in public service until that comment shows the result of investigation and judgment, we have proven to our readers that what we say is not valueless talk but rather comment with some truth.

Keeping this fact in mind, we are extremely glad to say that we have every confidence in the men now in and out of office in this confidence, believe that Rahway is prepared for the difficult tasks of the "recovery year" of 1934.

We look forward with special assurance to the work of the Common Council committees and to the work of the appointive officials.

In the choice of committee members we believe Council has shown unusual foresight. It will be through these committees that the detailed work of the legislative body will be done and it is there that personal qualifications of appointive officials.

In their choice of appointive officials, members of Council have likewise shown judgment. Each of these officials are well-qualified for the particular tasks of their office, and because of these qualifications should stand out as one of the most efficient corps of appointive officials that has served this city in years.

In the new city clerk, Wilfred L. Baldwin, Rahway has an official with an open mind, one willing to serve to the very best of his ability.

City Clerk Baldwin is a comparatively young man—and as such will give to the performance of his duties something that no other official is able to give. He will give youth, enthusiasm and a desire to do his job for the best interests of the great mass of citizens.

Mr. Baldwin is not a "know it all." He has sufficient qualification to justify his position, but realizing that "the wiser the man the more he is willing to learn" he will conduct this important office in the manner it deserves.

In the re-appointment of City Treasurer John J. Hoffman, Rahway will receive the benefit of experience and good judgment—the most important qualifications for his office.

Mr. Hoffman has served this city first as its city clerk and then as city treasurer. In these positions he has gained a insight into the particular problems with which Rahway is continually faced that make him an especially qualified officer for his office. From him we may expect valuable service during 1934 when financial problems will be the most important facing the city.

And with financial problems bound to pay the part they will in our municipal life during 1934, Council was faced with the task of naming a receiver of taxes who understands city finance and the problems upon a collection of taxes, upon both sides, and tied commensurate to the needs of the city.

Here, Council has found a man who should justly carry the responsibilities of the legal advisor to the city. During this year there will be questions of taxing moment which Attorney Herer will be called upon to answer. His experience will enable him to properly give the city the legal advice necessary.

Attorney Herer is especially qualified to fill the position of municipal attorney. For 14 years he has been training for the post he now fills—training by constant study of legislative matters and municipal law. He is a constant attendant at the sessions of the state legislature, thus learning all of the statutes as they relate to the government of the city.

This year will be as important, if not more so, than any previous year in the history of the Rahway Valley Truck Service. In the naming of Councilman James Plunkett as this city's representative on the Joint Meeting, the body delegated with the task of supervising the construction of the sewer.

It is only right and proper that the city employes take a reduction in income as every other person has done, but they should be made to take more than their share.

There may have been ample justification for the reduction when it was made, but the truth of the matter, one of the city's most important connections between the administration and the people.

And so, as we run through the list of appointive officials, we find each of them particularly qualified to carry on the duties of their office. It will be these men and women who will "round out" the municipal government for this year, the people who do so much of the actual work of government.

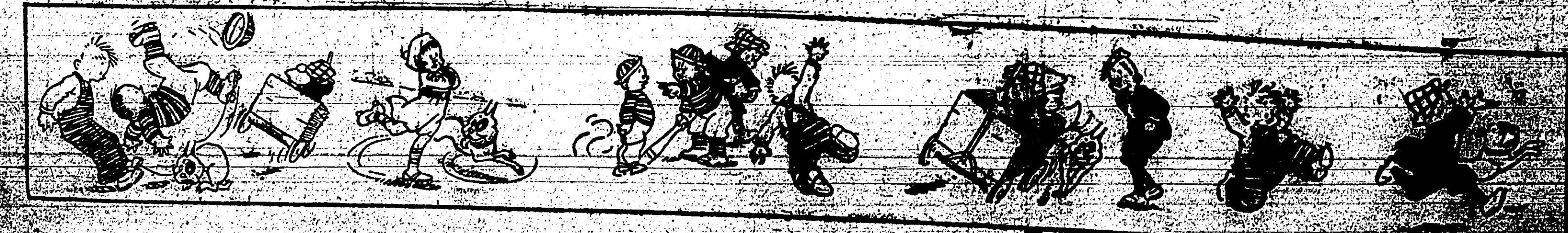

### Perth Amboy Child Crushed Under Carteret Man's Truck

Perth Amboy, Jan. 9.—Anthony Lombardi, 12 years old, was crushed to death near his home in Perth Amboy last night when a coal truck, backing up, knocked the boy down and ran over him. He was dead upon arrival at Perth Amboy hospital. The driver of the truck, identified by police as William Rossitas, 20, of Carteret, was held on a technical charge of manslaughter. He told police he did not see the boy.

### Drowns in Plainfield Lake

Plainfield, Jan. 9.—Stanley Hall, nine, was drowned in Watchung Lake, two miles from here yesterday afternoon when he sank through the soft ice which covered the surface of the lake. His brother, Richard, 12, and Arthur Dove, 11, also crashed through the ice, but managed to extricate themselves and reach firm ground. The boys all reside at Watchung, were on their way home from school when the accident occurred.

### Atlantic City, Jan. 9.—Contrary to expectations, William L. 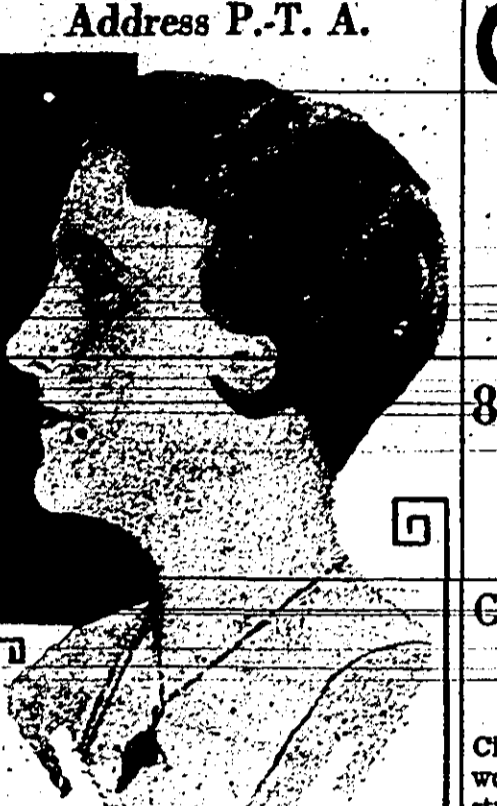
