See More Trouble in Germany; Von Papen To Resign Office

Berlin, July 3.—Wielding an iron rule, Chancellor Hitler yesterday carried his second revolution a step further by instituting a grand clean-up of all branches of the government.
Carloads of arrested Foreign Office officials rolled down the Wilhelmstrasse on their way to jail as Hitler served drastic notice he would brook no trifling.
Indications that trouble in Germany is not yet over were seen in reports from Oranienburg of a skirmish between Brown Shirts and Black Shirts, members of Hitler's private guard. The former opened fire when the Black Shirts attempted to disarm them.
President Paul von Hindenburg, aged and ailing at his Neudeck estate, sent a personal telegram to Hitler praising him for "saving the German people from great danger." He also thanked Premier Herman Wilhelm Goering for his swift action in eradicating anti-Hitler plotters from Nazi storm troop ranks.
He came to the aid of Vice Chancellor Franz von Papen his close friend. It was rumored Goering may take over von Papen's Cabinet post.
It was finally disclosed that Von Papen, when arrested, was given a severe beating.

Farmers Seek To Break Strike

Bridgeport, July 3.—As 1,000 New Jersey farmers petitioned Governor Moore to drive Communist agitators from their fertile lands, it became evident last night that strike breakers will be brought in unless striking farm hands return to work. Ascertaining he is faced with a \$550,000 crop loss unless harvesting and planting is resumed, Charles S. Seabrook, owner and manager of approximately 5,700 acres said:
"If those now on strike don't do the work, we expect others to do it. We also intend to bring in trucks to move produce already canned."

Dog Biscuit Importation Life Saver For City Prisoners

Restaurants And Officials Also Rush To Aid of Canines As S. P. C. A. Barks At Interpretation of 13-Year-Old Ordinance And Withdraws Help
The city went to the relief of its canine prisoners in the municipal pound on Haydock street yesterday as the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals announced withdrawal of its donation for the feeding of imprisoned dogs.
City Clerk Wilfred L. Baldwin, who usually buses himself with affairs of the pound, found the guards in the pound confronted with the operation of several local restaurants, he obtained sufficient food scraps and bones for the animals.
Dogs, William Philip Amador, further co-operated by driving his dog catcher's truck to New York for 100 pounds of dog biscuits when he was unable to obtain that quantity of the food.
The canine victims in the city pound were fed by the S. P. C. A. which has made it a practice to give imprisoned dogs to desirable owners who promise good homes, made a test case of the ordinance by inserting an advertisement in an Evening newspaper announcing that dogs for sale were being taken away at the pound Saturday afternoon from 2 until 4.
Only two persons answered the advertisement and they found Warden Armando and Clerk Baldwin, armed with Attorney Hever's interpretation of the ordinance, asking the \$3 redemption fee, took the dogs.

McIntyre Pleads Ignorance Of N. J. R. Break 17 Hours Later; Keeps Police Records Secret

AN EDITORIAL
Record Objects To Police Chief's Reluctance To Report Dept's Work

The Record today regrets that it must reveal the name of the only city official who has consistently shown a reluctance to co-operate with this newspaper. He is George McIntyre, Jr., chief of the Rahway police department.
When Chief McIntyre Saturday morning refused to tell The Record's police reporter of one of the biggest cases handled by the department this year—the escape of four convicts from the Reformatory—he showed his characteristic disregard of co-operation with the press since he became chief in 1931.
Later in the day when he told the same reporter that in the morning he did not know of the case despite the fact that it went over the teletype system from headquarters here late Friday afternoon, 17 hours before he forced The Record to discontinue its nonchalant policy of hoping for co-operation with the department for the interest of the city as a whole.
The Record, having no reason to believe that Chief McIntyre is not performing his duties as the head of a department in a city of more than 16,000 should, accept the "ignorance of the break" tale with a large lump of salt.
The Record, as a community newspaper feeling itself bound to report all happenings here for the benefit of its many readers, has consistently offered to co-operate with Chief McIntyre. Last night's news stories were written in the future, the newspaper Saturday asked for permission to inspect the records of the department. This is the custom in other cities, and was by no means a request of a special favor. This was stoutly refused by the chief.

The Record, believing that if Chief McIntyre performs his duties as he should, and we have no reason to believe that he is not filling his position capably, knows that he has not time to give detailed police reports to a questioning newspaperman. For that reason also The Record asked authority to see the daily records.
The Record is also aware of the fact that, because of the necessity for secrecy in investigations, it is impossible to place on view police information of a confidential character. But The Record's police reporter, in his experiences with other police departments, has grown accustomed to "do not publish" notations on police records. He has adhered to these requests in the same manner that he would follow here if Chief McIntyre would be reasonable.

Rahway's police appropriation this year is nearly \$50,000. The department belongs to the taxpayers who contribute this sum, not to Chief McIntyre. He, as their servant, is bound to give an accounting of his stewardship.

His monthly reports to Common Council are of necessity in brief form. Even members of Council cannot get a clear knowledge of police activities from these reports. Council members, along with other Rahway citizens, therefore must depend upon the press for their information of the work being done by their selected workers.
Chief McIntyre, by refusing The Record the news of the department, is in a manner, making a refusal to his superiors—the taxpayers. The Record has no quarrel with the chief. All it asks is an opportunity to co-operate with his department in its public duty of disseminating the news events of the community.

Chief McIntyre will find us ever willing to aid him. He knows that. Today he will also find us unwilling to remain silent about his unwarranted refusal to co-operate with The Record—and thereby the other taxpayers of this community to whom he is responsible.

Access To Desk Reports Raised Reporter After Co-operation Offer
Police Head Noted For Refusal To Aid Press

With police departments throughout the entire metropolitan area combating their respective convicts in a concentrated effort to capture four men who escaped from New Jersey Reformatory about 9 P. M.
