

Armistice Day
Sunday morning at 11 the world will halt in its routine activities momentarily to give thought again to the cessation of hostilities in the Great War on November 11, 1918.
Today is not a military day in the sense that it commemorates victory on the field of battle. The original Armistice Day was essentially a day of joyous thanksgiving on the part of a war-weary world for the first opportunity in more than four years to rest from the terrible slaughter that was slowly annihilating the manhood of the leading nations.
The original nature of the day, that of joy in the return of peace, should be preserved. If that is done the holiday may serve a highly useful purpose.
Sixteen years after the armistice, rumblings of dissatisfaction among countries is still evident. The recent assassination of the Yugoslavian king is closely analogous to the incident that started the world catastrophe at Sarajevo in 1914.
Germany and France are once more facing a problem fraught with many possibilities for renewed outbreaks of hostilities, in the determination of future control of the Saar basin in January.
Japan has signified her intention to demand equality with Great Britain and the United States in naval armaments.
If the 18th anniversary of Armistice Day could be brought to the attention of all peoples, with its real meaning and why it was such a memorable occasion in the grim days of 1918, it might serve to prevent a renewal of another general international conflict.

Gasoline War
Standard Oil company's official publication deprecates the "foily-of-senseless-warfare," referring to the current price cutting among gasoline refiners and distributors.
That sentiment is probably the general sentiment of the gasoline trade. And do doubt the various companies will soon work out a mutual settlement of the difficulties that have precipitated the price war.
Regardless of the destructive features which Standard Oil says are injuring established business to the ultimate disadvantage of the consumer, individual motorists must be pardoned if they neglect to worry about the destructive features.
Many automobile owners felt that the long-standard price of 17.8 cents a gallon for regular standard grades was high. It certainly made motorizing expensive enough for the man who earned barely enough to pay his living expenses, but who managed to include a modestly priced car among his family possessions.
Five gallons of gas for 50 cents is a considerable improvement over five gallons for 89 cents.
One fortunate feature of the price war has been the tendency of gasoline users to purchase quantities beyond current needs, against the time when prices advance again.
Storage of the inflammable liquid by persons not authorized is a violation of the fire regulations. In addition to being a foolhardy practice for the persons concerned, what small advantage might be gained by the practice is more than offset by the risk to life and property involved in attempting to store the gasoline.

The Red Cross
On Sunday the American Red Cross will conduct its annual drive for funds in the city. The quota is \$2,500.
The Red Cross is a worthwhile organization. It must be prepared to function in emergencies whenever they arise. For that reason it deserves public support in normal years of moderate need as well as in years visited by disaster.
The sum which Dr. Frank Moore, chairman of the drive, and the committee are asked to raise should be contributed quickly by individuals and firms in proportion to give.

The fact that part of the expenditures are being made with the aid of bond issues, which will not be paid until some future date, does not affect the principle at stake. The main fact is that most of the government is reaching the point where it will exceed the ability of the public to pay. A substantial part of the cost of everything we buy is represented by taxes. Taxes are part of the cost of a glass of beer or a gallon of gas; a fur coat or a pair of shoes, or of a coffee pot. The manufacturer who makes an article, the middleman who distributes it, the dealer who sells it—all are heavily taxed, each must pass his tax to the ultimate consumer—each of us.
It is our mutual interest, whether worker or employer, to demand that all branches of government cut expenses, precisely as business and individuals have been forced to do in order to survive. And that is the big problem that faces those officials elected all over the country last Tuesday.

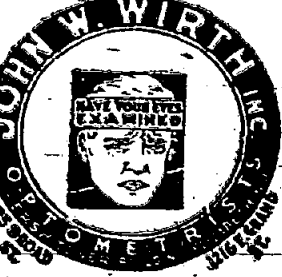

The problem of providing adequate relief for the unemployed has reached a climax. How that problem is met and solved within the next few months will mean much for the future of the country.

The Climax

The time has come when every individual on the relief rolls who is physically capable of work must be given some productive job. Otherwise the morale of a large number of our citizens will be sadly lowered.

But the problem sums up to one point—how are we to find jobs that will make a definite contribution to the upbuilding of the community and which will give the workers an opportunity to earn their relief money—thereby maintaining their morale.

In thinking about the problem we have considered the large number of sidewalks and stretches of curbing all over the city that are badly in need of repair. Is there, we ask, any way that that repair work can be done without undue cost with the aid of the labor represented by persons on the relief?

At the present time there is some of this work being done, but the city is paying for the materials and the ERA pays for the labor with food orders. The work is thereby limited, because the city cannot afford to spend a large amount of money for any materials.

Perhaps some way can be found to solve the problem along that line.

There is nothing so aggravating both to motorists and to proprietors of shops than inability, due to crowded parking conditions, to park near a store at which the driver wishes to do some business.

Naturally at busy hours there isn't anything that can be done about the situation. There are times, however, when a little thoughtfulness for others on the part of the motorist will make more parking space available.
