

It is not up to the government to tell business. large or small, how to operate, but rather to prove to it how government can help to bring prosperity back.

It is not government's place to develop water power in competition with private business, but rather to work with private business in order to develop that business for the public good.

And it is not government's place to enter the advertising field as it has with its new postoffice rulings, but rather to aid advertising to tell the public the truth about commodities thereby per-forming a service to the buyer and the seller alike

Nor is it government's job to give food, clothing and shelter to the needy when that giv-ing must necessarily be at the expense of self respect and personal-ambition on the part of those who receive.

These governmental activities are what might he termed extreme actions which very seriously lessen the speed of recovery in communities the size of Rah-way, and it is upon the business of the nation's small towns and cities that the prosperity of the entire country depends. . . . .
