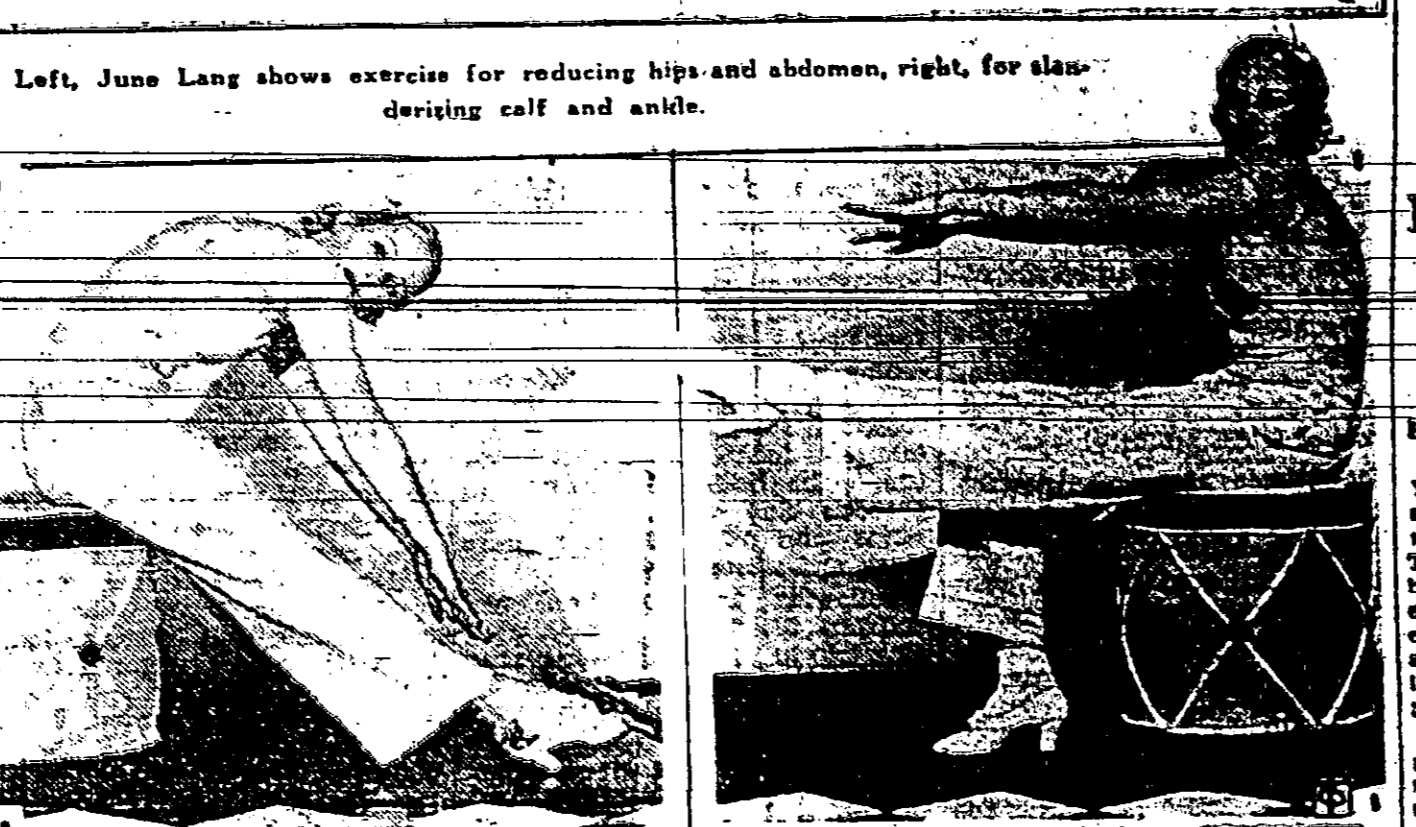

Reduced Interest Rates

The order of the Federal Reserve Board to reduce from 3 to 2 1/2 percent the rate of interest on savings accounts in member banks is an extension of the order which reduced this rate from 4 to 3 percent some months ago. As the banks who have federal deposit insurance have been ordered to make the same cut, the reduction in rate is practically a national one, anticipated in New Jersey a week or two ago when the state bank commissioner ordered the reduction.

Behind the order is the conviction that if interest on bank deposits is made low enough capital will be forced from banks, where it is not wanted, into industrial channels. The price of securities will rise and large corporations will find funds available for expansion. Possibly these earlier interest cuts had something to do with the improved bond market conditions.

When our 1929 boom was in full force we had no money in our banks and everyone was happy and prosperous. As soon as the depression started money gathered in depositories and, as it gathered, everyone became unhappy and poor.

One of the difficulties is that no matter how low a rate of interest banks pay, and how much money is available for business to borrow, investors are not convinced that money loaned to industry is safe and industrialists are not convinced that they can make a profit with borrowed money. This attitude is often attributed largely to the experimentalists identified with the federal government. Whether time will create more confidence in the government, or whether these theorists will convince the nation of the value of their beliefs, remains to be seen. But as things are now, there is some question about the beneficial results of reducing interest rates and offering to lend money to American business.

Being Sentimental

The murderer who, 30 years ago, set a bomb trap which took the life of the then-Governor of Idaho is permitted by the prison authorities of that state to live in a little white house above the prison to which he is sentenced and raise chickens.

Governor Murray, who hasn't been calling out the National Guard as much as he used to, recently felt compassion for a murderer sentenced to prison for life and gave him permission to leave prison for six days to shoot quail.

A few years ago one of our own New Jersey racketeers used to drive away from the prison farm at night to visit night clubs at our shore resorts. He was very fond of night clubs.

These incidents, presented by the Trenton State Gazette, give an idea of the way we treat criminals by police officers and civilians have lost their lives by virtue of the ruthlessness of our lawbreakers.

There might be some excuse for these humane acts of prison authorities if there happened to be any particular reason to believe that they reduced lawlessness. On the other hand, lawlessness is as prevalent as it ever was.

There is a growing inclination on the part of law-abiding citizens to insist that dangerous criminals be removed from society permanently once they are caught. Parole boards and prison authorities would do well to take this into consideration.

You Pay

Who pays the tax bill?

Everyone—the day laborer and the salaried employe and the millionaire.

Who pays the bulk of it?

The middle-income group—those who earn just enough to adequately support their families, educate their children, and put a little away for old age. In other words, the bulk of it is paid by the average American citizen.

Why don't the very rich pay most of the tax bill?

Because they can't—and here is one of the greatest tax fallacies ever perpetrated on the public. It's easy to say "tax the rich"—it's hard to find the rich to tax. Even in boom times, they are rare fauna, and extortionate taxes upon their incomes can pay for but a fraction of the cost of government. In depression times, they become still rarer—and almost the whole burden falls upon the ordinary citizen.

Who would benefit most from tax reduction?

The reader can easily answer that for himself. Today about 25 percent of the national income goes to support government, federal, state and local. If you earn \$2,000 a year, you must pay approximately \$500 of it on to the tax collector. It goes when you buy your groceries, drive your car, pay your utility bill, take a train trip, attend a movie, or eat a meal in a restaurant. The cost of everything you need and use, everything you buy, is partly represented by taxes. Every tax must be passed on to the consumer—manufacturers and middlemen and retailers have no way of producing money out of the air. No matter what the tax, it is diffused so rapidly all over the place.

Rahway 65 Years Ago

The officers of LaFayette Lodge, No. 27, A. F. & M., for the ensuing Masonic year were duly installed on Monday evening, last, at the lodge rooms, by W. Bro. John R. Chapin, P. D. G. M.—W. Bro. Thos. 300 Are Present At Ford Showing

Semi-streamlined Body And Ford Center Poise New Features

Co-incident with a complete renovation of their showroom and office at 777 St. George avenue and with the first showing of the new Ford V-8 for 1935, Dorsey Motors, Inc., Rahway Road, yesterday and Saturday entertained the largest group of present and prospective Ford owners ever to gather in the local showroom. Speaking yesterday about the first local showing of the greatly improved V-8, Joseph Bakalis, manager of the local agency, said that a large number of actual orders for the 1935 Ford were received from among the more than 300 persons who attended the first showing Saturday. Deliveries will be made this week, he said.

Optimistic For 1935

Optimistic over the business prospects of the new year, Mr. Bakalis conducted a private showing of the new V-8 on Sunday morning. As The Record representative took a preliminary ride in the new car, Mr. Bakalis explained the numerous improvements of the 1935 V-8 that would be sold in Rahway, pointing out that the car is "new from bumper to bumper." "The engine has been seen in the construction of the car to make it "unsurpassed" in beauty. This has been achieved by a "semi-streamlined" body with a poised V-8 engine in the hood, new cut-louver-lines, bullet-like headlamps, long, smooth arc from windshield to tall lamps, and smaller, trimmer wheels, Mr. Bakalis pointed out.

"Ford Center Poise"

An outstanding feature of the 1935 V-8 is the "Ford Center Poise" acquired by three changes described by Ford engineers as a major engineering accomplishment. First, the Ford transverse springs were entirely redesigned, making the front and rear springs further apart so that the spring base is increased six and one-eighth inches. Second, the V-8 engine was moved forward eight and one-half inches, thereby almost equally dividing the weight on the front and rear wheels. Passengers ride in a position eight and one-half inches further forward, thus completing the distribution of weight, and poising passengers in the front and back seats between the axle.

Henry Ford calls it "the best Ford yet produced."

Showroom Renovated

Offices of the Rahway Dealers have been moved from the first floor of the building to the second, thus giving up the entire front of the ground floor to display space. Here, three 1935 Ford cars now being shown. Both the showroom and the second-floor offices have been completely renovated.

Assisting Mr. Bakalis in demonstrating the 1935 Ford are William Philip and Chester Hart. Miss Marie Philip, who has charge of the office, is busily engaged in completing the mass of work incidental to the showing of the new car. Paul and George Kubler, brothers, have charge of the mechanical department.

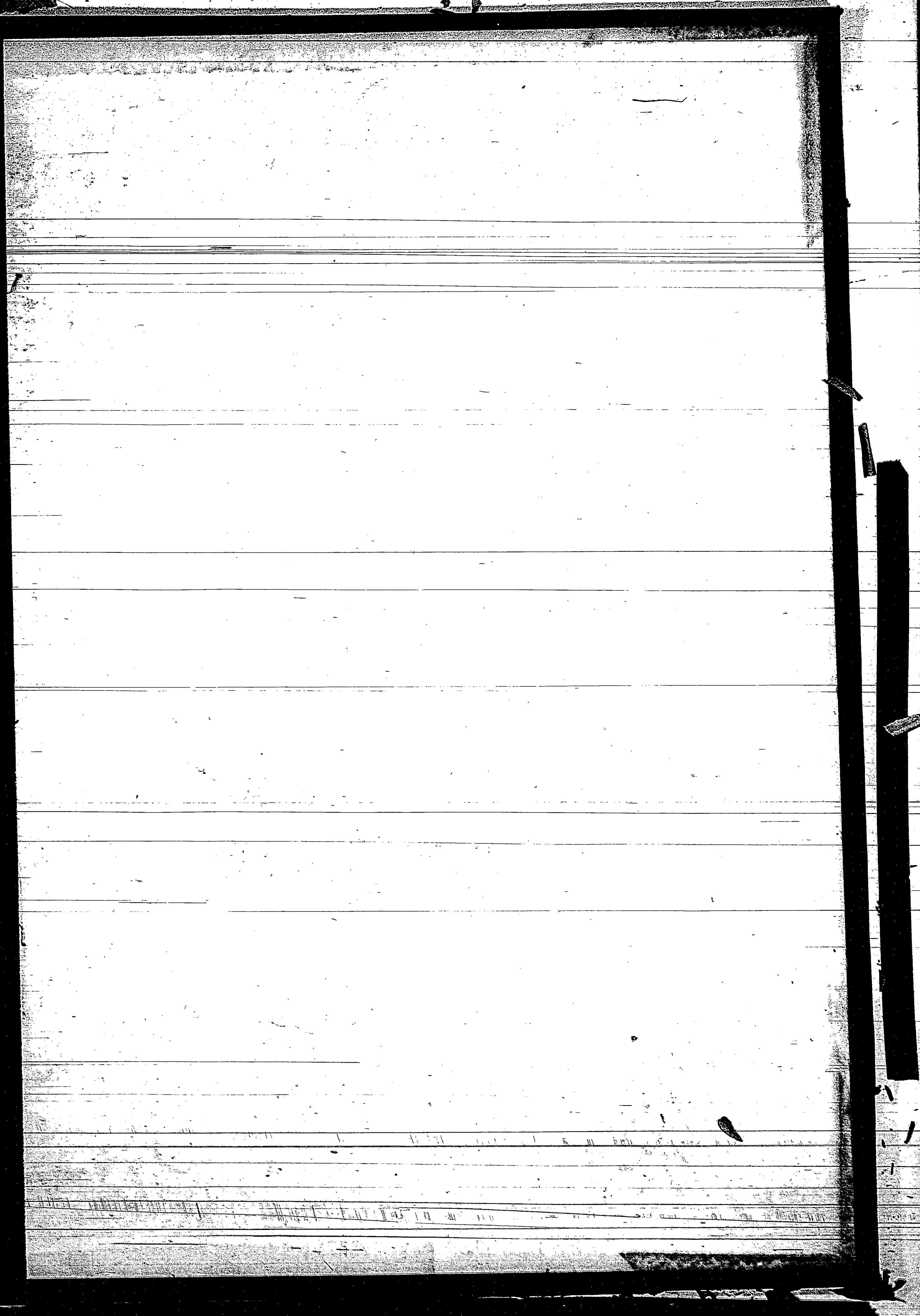
