## Local Police Will Support Lineup Plans

### County Jail To Be Site Of Weekly Lineup Of Week's Prisoners

Police Chief George McIntyre, stated yesterday that Rahway would fully cooperate with the provisions of the plan announced earlier in the day by the State Highway Dept. for a weekly lineup of prisoners in the county jail.

Such a plan was proposed by Sheriff C. Wesley Collins and Rigby and has received the approval of many county police departments.

The first lineup is scheduled for Saturday, which time the police authorities of Hudson county municipalities will gather at the county jail to witness the lineup. This will provide them with a "good" method of checking up on the men wanted.

Police Chief McIntyre explained that all men arrested during the previous week will be brought into a special lineup of the jail to give an opportunity of police officials to check up on the men and their photographs taken. Note will also be made of all persons released during the week so that a careful check of all persons who are at all times might be made.

Chief McIntyre has been made responsible for the supervision of the county jail and the supervision of the police authorities.

## Gettings' Election And Barger Speech Council Highlights

### Mayor Outlines Rahway Need For A Sounder Financial Setup; Urges Encouragement Of Industry

#### Stand On City Wage Cuts Impossible At Moment With Tax Burden Making Restorations Unlikely

#### The Inaugural Speech of Mayor John E. Barger, the election of Councilman Martin F. Gettings as Common Council president, and the Democratic appointments to fill the shoes of vacating Republicans in city officialdom for 1935 were the highlights of the organization meeting of the new council on New Year's day.

Mayor Barger outlined a policy of definite procedure for the city administration to follow during 1935 while Gettings in his short acceptance speech in his new post asked that Rahway residents foster a movement to patronize local merchants and pointed out the municipal benefits involved.

The new mayor stressed the necessity of creating a public relations committee to foster the city's industrial development, the necessity of adopting a sound financial plan which would give the city economic stability for the next 10 years at least, and delivered the promise that police department problems will come in for immediate consideration and treatment.

The importance of the favorable tax rate was also stressed with the speaker pointing out that such a rate would not only relieve the burden of some of the taxes which it is now forced to pay but that the adoption of a more favorable rate would encourage industries to locate in the city.

The speaker also stressed the importance of having a great highway industrial growth, declared that the city is ideally situated for industry, and has a wealth of natural facilities which would tend towards a quick development.

Barger stressed the disappointed attitude of citizens and officials alike in the city's industrial development, and declared that the city's facilities have been allowed to lie dormant or to waste and as a result while the city is open to the city have increased, the sources of revenue have remained about the same.

The mayor took no definite stand on the salary cuts for municipal employees declaring that present legislative uncertainties made it impossible to formulate a course at the moment.

Text Barger Henry However, he did emphatically state that the taxpayers of the city cannot stand a full restoration of the municipal salaries.

The restoration and the amount to be restored, if any, depends largely upon whatever increases in taxes this year's budget may call for.

The condition of city streets was also cited, with a plea to remedy present conditions as soon as possible.

The mayor also advocated the restoration of the city's financial condition.

Building Report

### Shows '34 Drop Under '33 Mark

#### Operations In City In Past Year Decreased \$20,000 In Scope

#### Reports of building operations in this city during 1934 showed a decrease of more than \$20,000 in the scope of the work undertaken as compared to 1933.

Totals for the past year reached a figure of \$44,400 with 1933 showing expenditures amounting to \$64,400.

The outstanding discrepancy, however, was registered in the money spent in the construction of dwellings with only \$1,050 being spent this year as compared to \$20,000 in 1933.

Total figures for 1934 in addition to the dwelling work included: business, \$4,100; garages, \$2,100; alterations, \$1,935; and factories, \$45,200.

Amounts for the preceding year were: business, \$4,100; garages, \$2,100; alterations, \$1,935; and factories, \$45,200.

There were more permits issued in 1934 than in 1933 with 192 being issued in 1934 as compared to 157 in 1933.

Additional figures show permit and water fees totaled \$30 in the past year as compared to \$75 in 1933.

There was an increase of more than \$3,000 in the money expended last year that a normal increase may be attributed to the increase given sewer work by the Better Housing Program, which was launched during the past several months.

Now comes the latest report of the Carnegie Foundation on American college football again condemning the institutions of higher learning for offering athletic scholarships and providing soft campus jobs to attract good football players. The Carnegie Foundation has now spent \$103,000 to investigate modern college football and its results are in the amount expended for the survey far over-balance the actual report in value. We could never see why the practice of awarding athletic scholarships was considered so great a sin by some persons. We have never been able to distinguish the difference between awarding a boy a scholarship because he was a superior student and giving him free tuition because he was a star in some form of athletics, particularly football. If a boy with brains can capitalize upon that virtue and get a scholarship, why doesn't it logically follow that a boy with muscles should also get a scholarship? Boys are given a chance to get an education because of their superior mental qualities and should also be allowed to have a free education if they excel in athletic activity.

We can't condone the practice of building a railroad siding up to the football field and simply a flock of miners, thugs and bootleggers coming to play football for a certain college team. But the present practice of importing athletes is to get muscular studs whose think tanks also work in educational subjects. Of course, the boys with the athletic scholarships aren't supposed to get the high marks that the boys with the mathematics or English scholarships do but the majority of the boys on football scholarships today are making their own way in the classroom without much aid from the professors. The depression, which we told us died with the new year, reduced the valuations of securities and real estate held by colleges and, in an effort to plug the holes in their revenues, they went out and ballhoofed football, imported good players and thus attracted crowds which pay the freight on all sports and also help to whittle down the mortgage on the stadium, the chem lab and the music conservatory. And now comes Dr. Howard J. Savage with his new report and asks them to cut off this source of revenue. Prof. Savage might just as well order certain big industries to reduce their profits and stop taking John Public's money.

Ballyhooed football and all the trimmings that go with it have made modern college football one of the most scientific of all games and a branch of activity which has moved baseball into the background as a national sport. In addition to paying off college debts, it has provided the American public with plenty of fun and in turn the customers have contributed to the college's treasury by buying tickets, uniforms, brochures and trainers, the purchase of safe equipment which has made the game safer for the boys playing it and has advertised the colleges and brought many of them increased enrollments which have enabled further progress in education. To promote a commercial venture such as big time football today, it is impossible to retain strictly amateur status. The college football player is training his brain for an education. He is bringing athletic glory to his alma mater in the same manner that a star in calculus or law will bring his school scholastic honors with his achievements in the classroom.

Athletic scholarships make it possible for poor boys to obtain an education by playing football and thus enjoy the educational benefits available only to some of rich fathers back in the old days. The awarding of these scholarships is in keeping with the American ideal which prescribes equal benefits for all. It is too bad the money spent for the Carnegie report was not given over to an athletic scholarship fund at some good school. It would have certainly have done more good.
