Class "A"—What Of It?

A dire need for careful discrimination between necessary and unnecessary school expenditures looms here as one of the most demanding local problems of the hour.

Rahway's official and lay workers on that most exacting of all municipal documents—their budgets—must look sharply to the needs of our educational system with one objective ever in mind—that of maintaining a high standard of schooling and at the same time "getting to the bone" on every item of school expense.

We have heard much during the last two or three years about the so-called "fills" in education. It would be difficult to dispute the fact that the present system of education we know today without including some items which we could do without.

Both views are, at the same time, both right and wrong. Just where they are right and where they are wrong is the problem and challenge that today faces every man and woman in Rahway who in any way contributes to the task of determining the amount of money we will spend this year for the education of our children.

In considering this all-important problem two facts must be constantly kept clearly in mind. First, the present system of education must be maintained. If our schools are to continue to be rated Class "A" by the state department of education, thereby making the city eligible to receive state financial aid, we must maintain the standard of education.

Secondly, while eliminating these deficiencies we cannot, we must not, under any condition, make any increase in the cost of operating our schools.

In other words, the problem becomes the difficult one of increasing the scope of our educational system without actually increasing the cost.

The thinking person will ask if our schools could not be made just as effective tools of education if we were to forget the Class "A" rating and the \$12,000 annual state aid.

Those same thinking persons are also likely to ask why, if we are really giving our children the education they might normally expect, we should be timid in permitting them to complete an examination for college entrance with those children admitted to schools of learning only upon the "rating" of the high schools which send them forth.

Those people might be expected to ask why we do not prepare our high school graduates to pass any college entrance examination that any other high school graduate might pass.

We merely point them out as laymen can, which must be answered before the next school budget can be honestly decided upon.

Another Blow At Crime

When Sheriff Collins and Under-Sheriff Rigby this week began the new practice of parading county jail prisoners before police officers of county municipalities, it marked inauguration of a plan which is sure to bring closer co-operation between the sheriff's office and county police departments.

Under the new arrangement, prisoners will be lined up weekly before representatives of municipal police departments, viewed by these officials and their records announced. This will not only allow police officers to view men who may be wanted for crimes in their own municipalities, but will also keep them informed on prisoners released and enable them to check upon these released prisoners.

Local police, who will co-operate in the plan many times arrest suspects on suspicion and have them incarcerated in the county jail for investigation for several days. It is easy to assume that many of the prisoners of this type will be linked to other crimes under the new plan. Thus, crime in Union county will find it more difficult to exist and crime prevention details can be considerably lessened.

Sheriff Collins and Under-Sheriff Rigby have struck a blow at crime in Union county by effecting this co-operative measure. They have our hearty commendation.

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A Party For Childhood

The presidential birthday party, by which a million dollars was raised last year by similar parties held throughout the United States, will be held again this month but on a different basis so far as distribution of funds is concerned.

Last year the million-dollar check presented President Roosevelt was divided between a \$100,000 fund for research, a \$500,000 fund to develop the Warm Springs institution in which the President is interested and \$250,000 to build up the Warm Springs Foundation as a head for America's work in infantile paralysis relief.

This year it has been announced that the municipal research laboratories of New York City have discovered a serum to immunize children against the dread disease. Further research is needed and to do this work and much of the proceeds from this year's parties will go toward its support.

There is also the recognition that local facilities should be built up to care for those infantile paralysis sufferers who cannot go to the Georgia institution. Every community has these problems and while the work is supported to some extent in most cities, it is difficult to find the funds in the present state of municipal finances.

Thus, this year, whatever is raised will be divided with 70 percent going to the communities that are raising the money and 30 percent to research. Nothing will go to the Warm Springs Foundation. It is to be the President's party for the nation to finance another blow by which it is hoped the country will be rid of the disease that cripples children.

From the glittering function attended by the country's most prominent socialites in the Waldorf-Astoria to the square dances in the little red schoolhouses in the mountain districts, Americans, rich and poor, will enjoy themselves in a night of festivity for the cause which is so close to the President's heart.

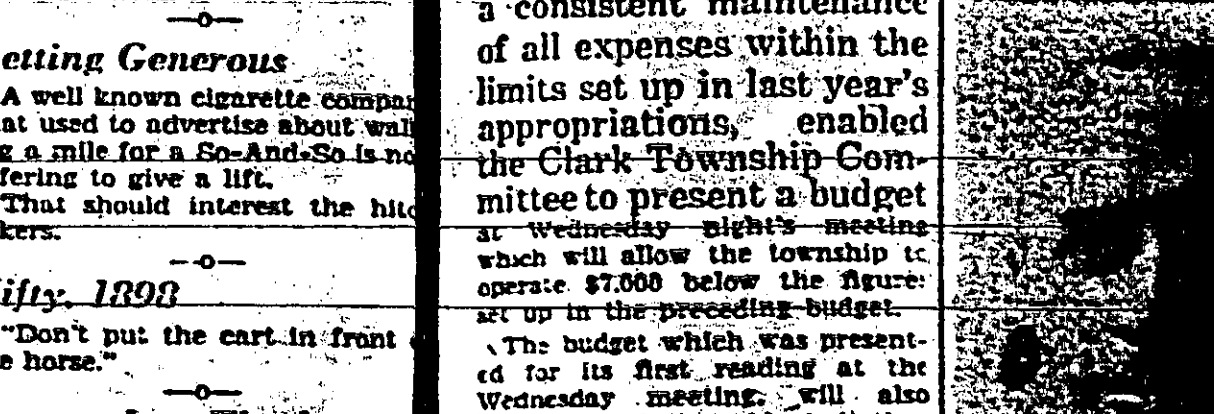

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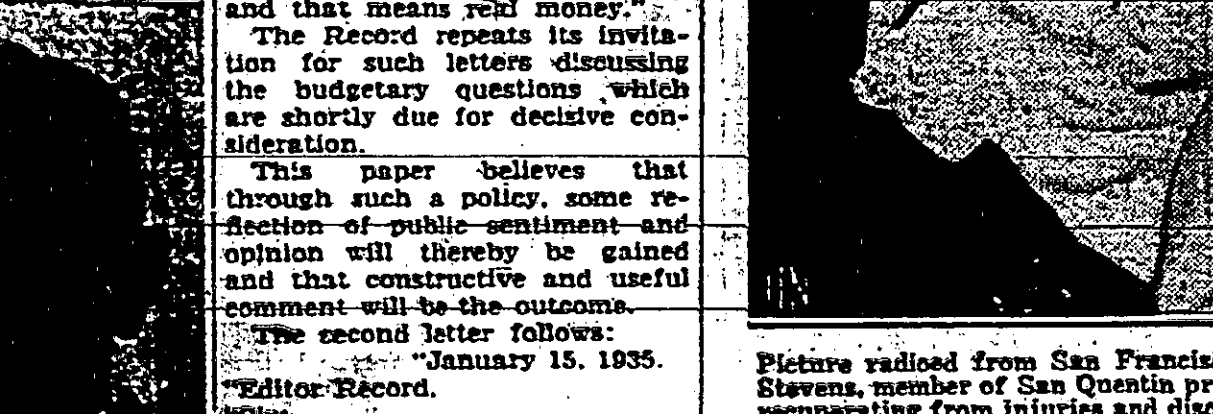
