



RULES

General

1. Classes are open to all amateurs unless specified.
2. An exhibitor is allowed only one entry in each class or each subdivision.
3. All exhibits must be placed between 8:00 and 9:00 am on the day of the show and must be removed between 8:30 and 9:00 pm. Members only may make horticulture entries from 7:30 to 8:30 pm the night before the show. Juniors make entries at the same time. Design exhibits may be placed the previous evening upon receiving permission from the consultant.
4. The club will exercise every precaution but cannot be held responsible for loss or damage of property.
5. Native plants of New Jersey may not be used or exhibited unless grown by the exhibitor or obtained in a legal manner. If used, a statement of how acquired should be made on a card to accompany exhibit.
6. The Standard System of Judging will be used and the decisions of the Judges are final.

Design Division

7. All designs must contain plant material.
8. All exhibits must be checked by the consultant before the exhibitor leaves.
9. If the registered exhibitor is unable to exhibit, she must provide a substitute.
10. Bases may be used wherever desired.
11. Accessories may be used.
12. All entries must be accompanied by a list of the plant materials used, list to be on a 3" x 5" card.
13. A novice exhibitor is one who has never won a blue ribbon in a Standard Flower Show.
14. Contrived flowers or plant forms of recognizable plant materials, fresh and/or dried, are permitted. No embellishment or treatment of fresh plant materials is permitted, except conditioning. Treated dry plant material is permissible in all classes except those eligible for the Tricolor Award.
15. No artificial flowers, fruits, foliage, nuts or vegetables are permitted.

Horticulture Division

16. Horticulture entries will be entered at Rooms C and D, YWCA, 220 Clark Street.
17. Horticulture classes are open to all amateur gardeners.
18. All horticulture exhibits must be grown by exhibitor.
19. Container-grown plants must be in exhibitor's possession for a minimum of three months and exhibited in container in which grown without additional adornment.
20. Plants grown for bloom must be shown in bloom.
21. Only one plant per container, unless otherwise stated.
22. Containers for cut specimens will be supplied by the committee.
23. Horticulture specimens shall be correctly labeled as to variety or cultivar if possible. Only NAMED exhibits are eligible for top awards.
24. Entries must be approved and passed by the Classification Committee after they have been properly assembled with entry card and placed on the classification table. Each entry card must be completely filled out.
25. Entry card must state if exhibit is greenhouse grown.
26. Classes may be subdivided, reclassified, combined or limited at the discretion of the committee.
27. Scales of points for the judging of the Horticulture Division will be found on pages 150 through 154 of the Gold Handbook for Flower Shows.
28. Lava rocks (class 65) must be approved by the committee.

Junior Division

29. Adult rules apply where applicable.
30. In classes 14, 15, and 16 all arrangements must contain fresh plant material. A minimum of dried material is permitted.
31. All children, whether members of a Junior Garden Club or not, are invited to exhibit. Those not members of Rake and Hoe are asked to make advanced entries.
32. All entries must have exhibitor's name and age on entry card.
33. All design arrangements must be made at the home of Mrs. Sidd Kravitz, 424 Roanoke Road, between 3:00 and 5:30 pm on the day before the show, in the presence of the Junior Advisor.

NATIONAL COUNCIL AWARDS

The Standard System of Awards will be used. One blue (1st) and one red (2nd), one yellow (3rd) and one or more white (honorable mention) ribbons may be awarded if merited.

1st Blue Ribbon	90 Pts. or above
2nd Red Ribbon	85 Pts. or above
3rd Yellow Ribbon	80 Pts. or above
H. M. White Ribbon	Meritorious entries - 75 Pts. or above

TRICOLOR AWARD (2) may be awarded to a blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or over, one in classes 4, 5 and 6 and another in classes 7, 8 and 9. All plant material must be fresh. One or more accessories may be used. Color: Rosette combining blue, red and yellow ribbons.

CREATIVITY AWARD may be awarded to a blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or more in classes 1, 2 and 3. Exhibit is to be designer's choice of fresh and/or dried plant material with or without other components. Treated dry plant materials may be used. Color: Rosette of purple ribbons.

AWARD OF DISTINCTION may be awarded to a blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or over in classes 11, 12 and 13. All plant material must be dried. One or more accessories may be used. Treated material may be used. Color: Rosette of brown ribbons.

JUNIOR ACHIEVEMENT AWARD (3) may be awarded to outstanding design, educational and/or horticultural exhibits in the Junior Division. Color: Red, white and blue ribbons.

AWARD OF MERIT (5) may be given in Sections I, II, III, IV, VII of the Horticulture Division to a NAMED blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or over. Color: Rosette of orange ribbons.

ARBOREAL AWARD may be given in Section VI of the Horticulture Division to a NAMED blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or over. Color: Rosette of two shades of green ribbons.

AWARD OF HORTICULTURAL EXCELLENCE may be given to a NAMED blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or over judged as the finest in the entire Horticulture Division. Color: Rosette of green, orange and blue ribbons.

ADDITIONAL AWARDS THAT MAY BE AWARDED BY THE FLOWER SHOW COMMITTEE:

AWARD OF APPRECIATION may be awarded to invitational exhibits and to special non-competitive exhibits. Color: Rosette of orchid ribbons and gold lettering.

SWEEPSTAKES AWARD may be given to the exhibitor winning the most blue ribbons in the Horticulture Division. An Award of Merit, Arboreal Award and Award of Horticultural Excellence will each count as one extra ribbon. In the event of a tie, red ribbons, etc., will be counted. Color: Rosette of green and white ribbons.
