One point was reluctantly deducted for labeling of the horticulture, and confusing subdivisions which went vertical then horizontal.

The Design Division was outstanding in both quality and distinction. Again only a point was deducted for some exhibits not filling allotted spaces. These children have certainly mastered the elements and principles of design.

Exceptionally well executed exhibits more than fulfilled all the requirements of educational and State and National Objectives.

The quality of this show as a whole was OUTSTANDING!!
The entire atmosphere filled the air with the holiday spirit, and my congratulations to all the members of the Rake and Hoe Junior Garden Club - and their marvelous leaders for presenting a flower show truly upholding the highest objectives of National Council.



- 5. House plants need repotting at this time if they appear to be pot-bound.



# 1875 Farmhouse Promises To Be "Fresh and Fragrant"

"Deck the Halls" is a holiday house presented by the Rake and Hoe Garden Club on Wednesday Dec. 3 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Five Westfield homes will be decorated for the December holidays following different themes appropriate to each house.

"Fresh and Fragrant" is the theme for the circa 1875 farmhouse of Mr. and Mrs. William Tittle. During the first 100 years of this house's history it underwent extensive changes and lost much of the charm and character of an older home.

The Tittles have restored these qualities with renovations, decorations, and furnishings. The original two front rooms have been combined to form a sunfilled living room that includes an antique mantel found in Pennsylvania by the owners and set above the original slate and brick hearth.

Antique furniture is from a variety of periods mixing elegant 18th and 19th century pieces with simpler primitive ones. Of special note is an unusual papermache tray table.

A country kitchen and the library lead to the large dining room. This room has been restored to show off the original stone floor that includes a stone lined well.

The wreath for the front door is planned to include pheasant feathers and an arrangement inside will center on Mrs. Title's pheasant. The library which features a striking painted floor done by the owner will be the setting for an elaborate tiered citrus arrangement including pomanders, and herbs from the owner's garden.

In the dining room fresh flowers will coordinate with the collection of china. The back hall, which includes part of the Tittle's basket collection, will have a

canes. The exit from this room leads past the working pump connected to the stone well.
