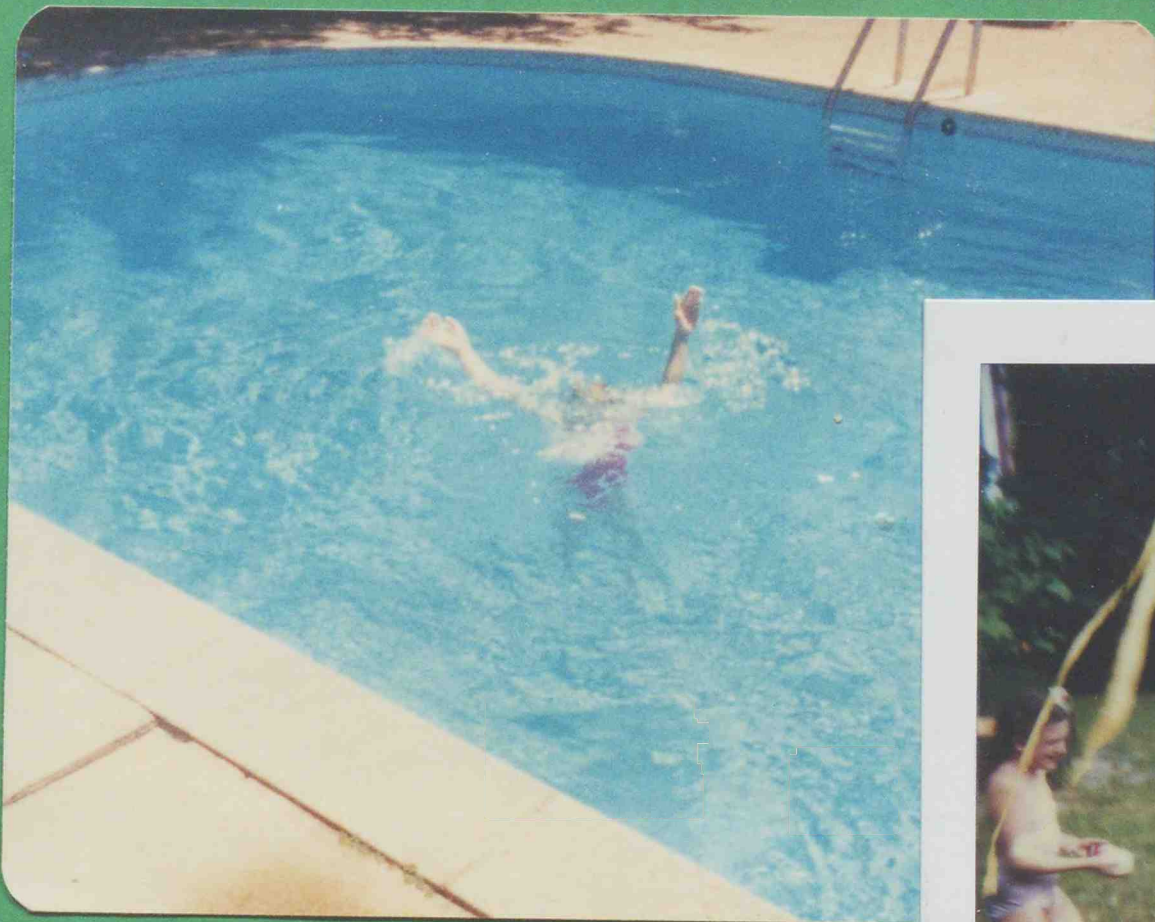

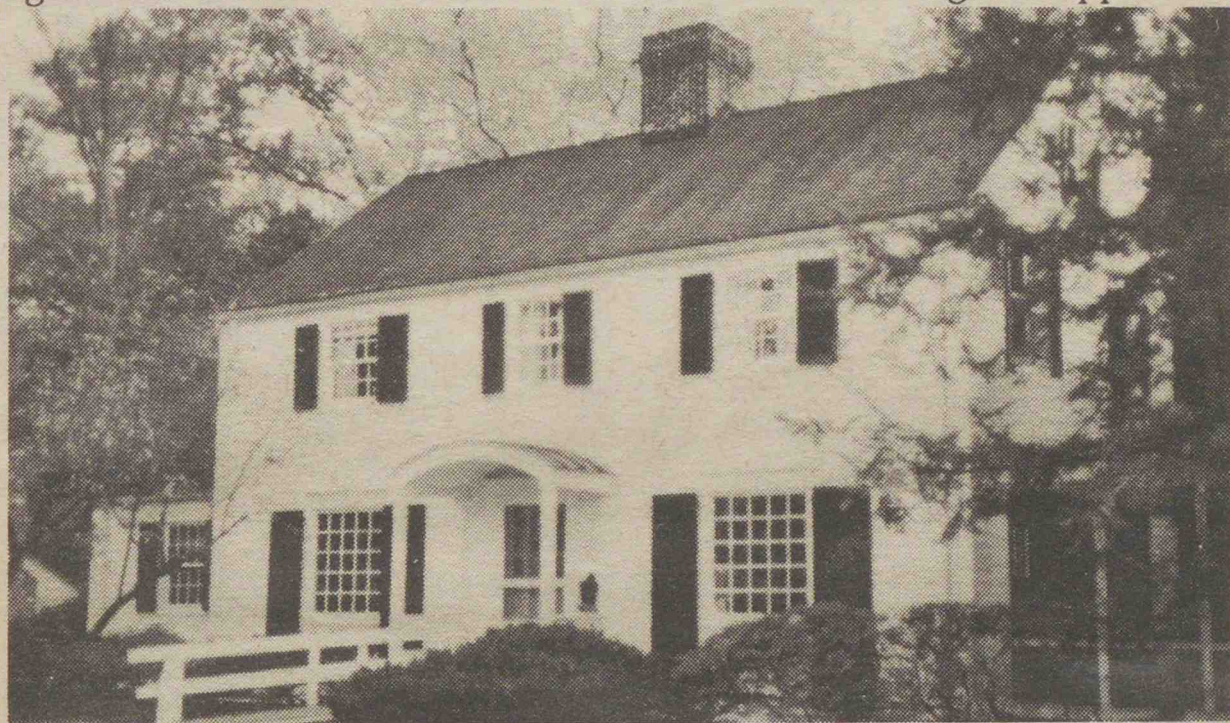
Deck The Halls With Rake And Hoe Club

"Sentimentality and Romance" is the theme for the Victorian home of Mr. and Mrs. Warren Rorden. The 19th-century home will be decorated to give the flavor of a Victorian

Christmas. Decorations will include garlands, swags, and a kissing ball. The tree will be decorated with lace fans, tussy mussies, and baby's

breath. The dining room will be set for a holiday tea and will showcase an antique dollhouse. A child's Christmas, including antique dolls, toys, dollhouses, and teddy bears will be set up in the den. The kitchen will feature decorations using edible materials, including an apple tree

centerpiece, food wreath, popcorn, and cranberries. The kitchen will be the site of a sale of homemade baked goods and a food boutique.

The background for the holiday decorations will be the owner's collections of primitive American furniture, quilts, decoys, candleholders, wooden Santas, and cookie cutters. Natural materials are featured in decorations that include pinecone trees, applesauce balls, della Robbia wreaths, a grapevine tree, a partridge berry bowl, and a Swedish mantle decoration using apples and gingerbread. A sale of holiday plants, such as pointsettias, amaryllis, and paperwhite narcissus, will be held in the Short kitchen.

The three other houses included on the tour are the homes of Mr. and Mrs. Gary Gadek, Mr. and Mrs. William Tittle, and Mr. and Mrs. Richard Griggs. Tickets are available from members of Rake and Hoe and at Rorden Realty, Jeannette's, and the Westfield Y.

It's hoe, hoe, hoe for the holidays

WESTFIELD — Members of the Rake and Hoe Garden Club brought the freshness of spring, the warmth of summer, the color of fall and coolness of winter into five town homes yesterday.

The organization christened the holiday season with "Deck the Halls," the theme of a tour of Westfield homes, and incorporated different themes for each home ranging from an early American "apples and gingerbread" presentation to a more contemporary "peaches and cream" holiday display as well as "fresh and fragrant" and "sentimentality and romance."

"The purpose of the tour is to raise money for educational and community projects and to show

different holiday decorating ideas," said Judith Camp, a club member.

A spotlight of the tour was a flower show presented by the Rake and Hoe Junior Garden Club, which took place in a frilly and conservatively decorated home on 909 Wyandotte Trail, where the theme was "dainty and delectable."

Many young horticulture enthusiasts demonstrated their talents by walking away from the contest with blue, red and yellow ribbons and may qualify for national recognition if judges from the Garden Club of New Jersey give the displays at least 95 points, said Kay Cross, director of the garden club.

"We should find out if we qualify soon," said Cross.

Cross said the club must submit a booklet on the presentation within two weeks to the state garden club. If the junior displays qualify, the results of the national contest will be received next spring, she said.

The junior show carried a musical air with the theme, "We Wish You a Merry Christmas" and other favorite Christmas carols.

The show featured a design division, a horticulture division, and an education division and required the participation of the entire 16-member junior club.

Many floral arrangements were decorated with Christmas ornaments such as trumpets, angels and ribbons.

Kimberly Cross, 9, won a first-place junior-achievement award in the design category for an arrangement she created centering on "Hark the Herald Angels Sing" for a music-oriented display.

Kimberly, Cross's daughter, admits that her interest in the club stems from her mother's influence: "I like it because my mom's in it and she got me interested in it and I think flowers are pretty," Kimberly said.

Other juniors who took first-place awards are Adrienne Mazzaresse, Lauren Mazzaresse, and Jessica Humphries.

Adrienne also received the first-place junior-achievement award for the horticulture division.

All the participants received an award, said Cross.

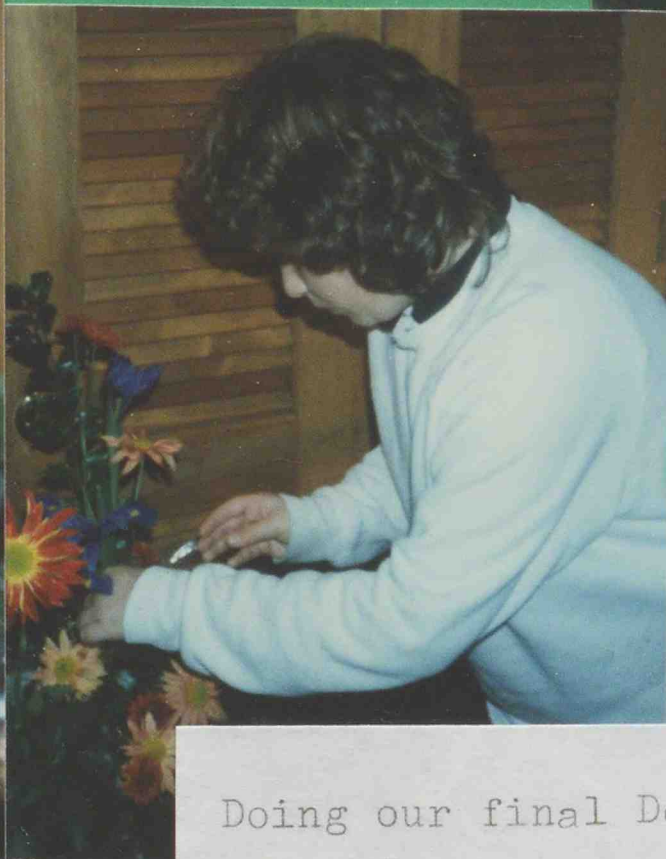

CONCLUSIONS

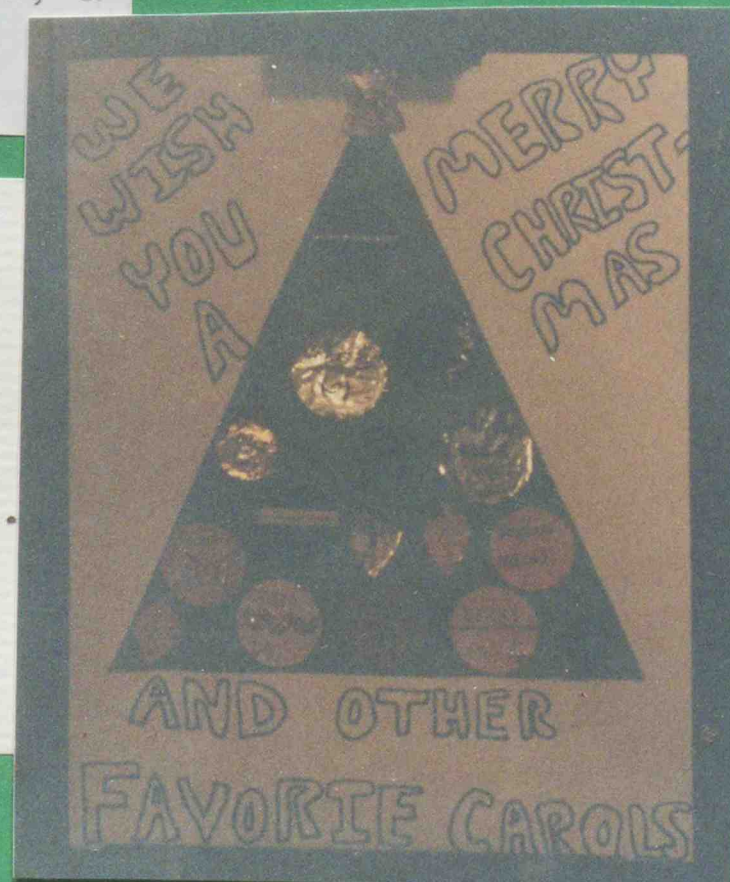

FLOWER SHOW APPLICATIONS MUST INCLUDE: Three signed Evaluation Forms, two copies of schedule, pictures, publicity, expense records, names of judges, Junior Club participation, conservation and educational exhibits. #11 must list 10% member clubs exhibiting, #17 must list garden visited, #18 must list 5 or more clubs participating, #5, 18 and 20 not eligible consecutive years.
