JUNIOR GARDENERS MANUAL

FOR THE JUNIOR LEADER AND SPONSORING GARDEN CLUB

In the past the majority of the population was engaged in agriculture. Children grew up having participated in the growing of plants and the raising of animals and had learned first hand the interrelationship of all living things.

As we approach the twenty-first century only a very small percentage of the population is actively engaged in agriculture and few children have an intimate knowledge of plants and their importance in their lives.

To understand the importance of plants and animals and how they contribute to the well being of people, it is necessary for children to have first hand experiences with the growing of plants. They need to learn their needs and what they contribute to the world. They need to be aware of the interrelationship of all parts to the earth. As Chief Seattle, a North American Indian chief said, "The earth does not belong to us; we belong to the earth. All things are connected, like the blood which unites one family. Mankind did not weave the web of life. We are but one strand within it. Whatever we do to the web, we do to ourselves. All things are bound together."

It is important that opportunities are provided for our children to grow plants whether in a garden or in a container. Many members of garden clubs have the expertise and time to share this knowledge with young children.

In these busy times when both parents work, leadership for Junior Gardeners is difficult to obtain. However, it is possible for many members within a club to give some time — to give a demonstration on preparing the soil and the planting of seeds, how to transplant seedlings, providing the proper environment for plants (enough sunlight, turning of container-grown plants to ensure a well rounded plant, proper watering techniques and proper fertilizing procedures, which are to be used with adult supervision). It has been said that the love of gardening is a shared rather than a self-acquired experience.

JUNIOR GARDENERS NEED LEADERS WHO CARE.

THEY NEED YOU.

NATIONAL MEMBERSHIP REQUIREMENTS

Requirements for a Junior Garden Club or Unit:

1. Be sponsored by a senior club federated with the National Council of State Garden Clubs, Inc.

2. Age Preschool through Sixth grade

If 6th grade students attend a middle school and would be more comfortable with seventh and eighth graders, they should be included with Intermediate Gardeners. Leaders should use their own judgement as to how to form their youth groups. It is important that the children enjoy working with the group and age divisions should be determined by the leader. School systems across the country differ as to how the children are grouped together which makes it difficult to set standards.

3. Meet at least FIVE TIMES during a school or club year. These do not all have to be organized meetings. They may also consist of trips, Arbor Day celebrations, visits to nursing homes, participation in flower shows, sharing a meeting with the sponsoring garden club, etc.

4. Have a minimum of FOUR members.

5. Complete and mail the Annual Registration Form to the State Junior or Youth Activities Chairman by December First or designated State deadline. A copy of the Annual Registration Form is included in this Manual.

6. Each State Garden Club sends ten dollars (\$10.00) annually to N.C.S.G.C. to register all Youth groups within the State. (Some State Garden Clubs require Junior Gardener dues — check deadline to insure eligibility for awards.)

7. Awards are listed in the September-October issue of The National Gardener in odd numbered years with corrections and additions listed in the even numbered years. Watch for contests for Juniors in The National Gardener in other issues. It is important to keep up to date by reading The National Gardener carefully since this is the way the Junior Chairman keeps in touch with youth leaders and sponsoring clubs.

HOW TO ORGANIZE A JUNIOR GARDEN CLUB

N.C.S.G.C. encourages the formation of all types of Junior Garden Clubs or Units

HOW TO ORGANIZE:

1. CLUB OUTSIDE OF SCHOOL—

A club may be formed when a group of children show interest in being together to learn about their world — growing plants, preparing their own gardens, or learning about the environment — litter control, recycling and conservation of water, trees, and clean air. The sponsoring club should interest someone to lead the group. Although one enthusiastic leader works well, leadership responsibilities may be shared by all of the members of the club. Parents who garden can also share their expertise. The older children can learn to form their own club with adult help. These children can learn how to conduct meetings and learn the duties of club officers and also the responsibilities of club members. Rules should be kept simple.

2. CLUB IN SCHOOL

A club may meet during school hours or after school. This type of club is established with school cooperation with the teacher or teacher's assistant acting as the leader. A club may sponsor such a group when the teacher includes the study of horticulture and related subjects or other National Council areas of interest. The club could provide materials for projects which the teacher feels will enhance her objectives. Members may also help arrange field trips or provide specialists in areas which the teacher feels will enrich the program.

3. ESTABLISHED YOUTH ORGANIZATIONS AND SCHOOL CLUBS

A club may work with established groups (Scouts, 4-H, FFA, etc.) and need not be organized into clubs as long as the National membership requirements, as outlined, are fulfilled. At least five meetings or activities during the club or school year should include some National Council objectives, ex. Arbor Day observances, garden therapy, gardening, conservation, flower shows, trips to historic homes and gardens etc. Workshops on a variety of subjects may be offered.

PROGRAM SUGGESTIONS

Club programs should include at least two areas which are promoted by N.C.S.G.C.

PROGRAM SUGGESTIONS

Program material will vary with the type of Junior garden club you are working with. Several examples follow.

I. SOME CLUBS HOLD THEIR MEETINGS DURING THE LATE SPRING AND SUMMER MONTHS SINCE THEIR PROGRAM IS THE CULTIVATION OF A GARDEN.

Seeds are made available to students at the correct time for planting and the proper instructions are given for:

1. Preparation of soil.
2. Correct planting of seeds—depth and spacing of seeds—thinning of seedlings.
3. Correct procedures for cultivating, fertilizing and watering.
4. Harvesting flowers and vegetables and how to prepare them for a Flower Show.
5. Encouraging them to harvest and eat their vegetables and to realize the importance of this contribution to the family budget.
6. Flower arranging classes are given to teach the children how to make designs. Table setting classes have great appeal as well as constructing fun characters and animals from unusual vegetables.
7. Children should help with planning the Flower Show, make their own entry cards and place their entries in the proper classes. They should also learn to act as clerks.

In this type of program, the help of parents should be enlisted to encourage children to care for their gardens.

II. CLUBS WHICH MEET YEAR ROUND would have a more varied program which could begin in the fall with the:

1. Gathering of dried materials for crafts
2. Collecting fall leaves and seed pods for identification
3. Flower arranging, using roadside materials
4. Making favors for Thanksgiving, Christmas and other holidays—study evergreens which are used in swags and wreaths at this time of year
5. Study of birds—make a simple bird house
6. In the spring—plant seeds and care for them
7. Study wildflowers
8. Take trips to historic places
9. Visit shut-ins

III. CLUBS WHICH ARE FORMED TO STUDY ONE SUBJECT such as the ENVIRONMENT could limit their programs to the study of trees and learn how they contribute to the well-being of the planet.

1. Field trips to tree farms to learn how to plant trees and care for them
2. Talks with foresters to learn of the different kinds of forests and how they are managed
3. Study the products which come from trees
4. Take part in an Arbor Day observance
5. Plant a tree

DOES YOUR COMMUNITY OBSERVE ARBOR DAY?

If not, perhaps your club could initiate the observance of this important day.

HISTORY OF ARBOR DAY

Arbor Day was observed on April 10, 1872 in the state of Nebraska. Julius Sterling Morton, founder of the Arbor Day movement, was one of the earliest advocates of tree planting. When the early settlers arrived in Nebraska, they found no trees on the plains as they had known them in their Eastern homelands, and they suffered from the lack of shade trees.

Mr. Morton, born in New York and reared in Michigan, was a settler on the treeless prairie of Nebraska when it was still a territory. Mr. Morton was a journalist and a member of the Nebraska State Board of Agriculture. It was here that he introduced a resolution to set aside a day for tree planting, to be known as Arbor Day. In 1885 the Nebraska State Legislature made Arbor Day a legal holiday and designated April 22 for the continued annual observance in Nebraska.

These early settlers had a knowledge of how plants reduce soil erosion. This coupled with a longing for the shade trees they had known, prompted them to plant millions of trees. The idea spread and today every state recognizes Arbor Day. Dates for its observance range from November to April. Arbor Day is the only commemorative day we celebrate that looks to the future. Those who follow us will enjoy the benefits of the trees we plant.

WHY PLANT TREES?

TREES, the renewable resource, provide shade and sound barriers for our homes, food, energy, medicine, wood and paper products. They collect pollution from the air, provide homes for people, give shelter for birds and small animals, build up the soil and hold it with their roots and prevent erosion.

OUTLINE OF SAMPLE JUNIOR YEARBOOK

Format of book:

May be a single sheet folded in half or may be several sheets.

Should include:

1. Name of sponsoring garden club
2. Club name
3. Names, addresses and telephone numbers of members
4. Time and place of meetings
5. Leader's name, address and telephone number
6. Meeting dates: programs could be filled in later if not known at the beginning

For younger children:

1. Name of sponsoring member garden club
2. Name of club
3. Name, address and telephone number of leader
4. Names, addresses and telephone numbers of members
5. Times and place of meetings

Each child may decorate the cover of his own yearbook.

IT IS IMPORTANT THAT PARENTS RECEIVE A COPY AND THAT PERMISSION SLIPS BE OBTAINED FOR TRIPS AND SPECIAL EVENTS.

Parents should be encouraged to participate in meaningful ways. The leader should not be expected to act as a baby sitter.

HOW THE JUNIOR PROGRAM FUNCTIONS.

The N.C.S.G.C., Inc. is a service and educational organization dedicated to the development of gardening, the betterment and beautification of the community and the exchange of ideas. It was founded in 1929 and is now the largest organization of its kind in the world, with members in all of the states and throughout the world.

The Junior program was begun in 1932 and has been an important part of the N.C.S.G.C. program ever since. Dedicated garden club members have acted as leaders and have shared their knowledge and expertise with many different generations.

As the time has passed many changes in lifestyles have taken place but children still need the attention of caring adults to help them become responsible and happy adults.

WHY SHOULD WE REGISTER OUR JUNIOR CLUBS?

The registration form gives the information which enables the various chairmen at state, regional and the national levels to learn of the interests and activities of each individual Junior club. With the information which is gleaned from the forms the Junior chairmen are able to organize programs which are meaningful for each age group.

The key to any successful organization is communication. It is important that Junior leaders keep in touch with the various Junior chairmen and communicate their successful projects and also their concerns.

The chairmen need the input from the leaders who are working with the children. Problems are different in different parts of the country. If the chairmen learn of problems which the leaders are encountering, the program may be adjusted to meet the needs of the Junior clubs.

SERVICE TO HOME AND COMMUNITY

It is never too early to introduce children to their responsibilities to others. For the younger children: their responsibilities in their homes. In the older groups this may be extended to the larger community.

SERVICE TO THEIR HOMES

Young Junior Gardeners love to take home a gift to their parents to express their appreciation.

SPECIAL HOLIDAYS like Mother's Day and Father's Day in addition to general holidays are fun times for children to show what they have accomplished.

1. Construct a pine cone bird feeder.
2. Design a dish garden or terrarium.
3. Make an environmental poster to show their concern for their community.
4. Force a bulb to bring into flower for a late winter project.
5. Bring home seed pods and pine cones to make winter designs on a wooden plaque.

JOINING HANDS WITH SENIOR CITIZENS

Large numbers of older citizens welcome association with young gardeners. Such an arrangement is very meaningful to both groups. Many older people are lonely and yearn for companionship. Sharing their experience and knowledge can mean much to them. In turn, Junior Gardeners can bring joy and happiness as these groups join hands in the wonderful adventure of gardening.

SUGGESTIONS FOR PROJECTS TO INITIATE THIS SERVICE:

1. Start cuttings to pot up to take to nursing homes and hospitals.
2. Make tray favors and decorations of natural materials to take as gifts.
3. Individual handmade wreaths for patients' rooms would also make appropriate gifts.
4. Special holidays offer perfect occasions for this interchange between generations.

ARRANGEMENTS SHOULD BE MADE IN ADVANCE WITH NURSING HOMES SO THAT THE VISITS COORDINATE WITH THEIR PLANS FOR THE RESIDENTS.

SAMPLE INSTALLATION CEREMONY FOR OLDER GROUPS

NOTE: This ceremony for older groups may be adapted as needed. Installation for preschool through second grade unnecessary, as younger groups do not usually have officers.

"Let us think of this Junior Gardeners Club as a TREE.

"Each of you represents a leaf of this stately TREE.

"As President, _____, you are the trunk or center. It is your duty to preside at all meetings; keeping the TREE in balance.

"_____, as vice-president, you are one of the branches of this TREE. You will assist the president whenever possible, and preside at meetings during the president's absence.

"As secretary, _____, you are another branch stemming from this stately trunk, keeping this TREE in perfect balance. You will keep the minutes and records of the meetings and take the roll call.

"As treasurer, _____, you are another branch of this beautiful TREE, guarding the treasury and collecting dues, in order to help keep this growing TREE in balance.

"Do all of you accept these respective duties? If so, answer 'Yes.'

"I now declare the officers duly installed."

"Will the committee chairmen please stand as I call your names?"

"You are the roots of this TREE, whose center trunk and strong branches go out in every direction. It will be up to you to see that this magnificent TREE is well cared for, fed through your roots with love and activity, and watered with understanding and loyalty."

"Do all of you accept these duties? If so, then answer 'Yes.'"

"Will the entire club membership please stand?"

"You represent the leaves of this lovely TREE with your radiant smiles. Will you give of your time and talents to keep this TREE growing? If so, then answer 'Yes.'"

"I now declare all of you as one lovely TREE."

(Tree seedlings are then given to each member.)

Additional Information which may be used at meetings.

N.C.S.G.C. JUNIOR GARDEN CLUB PLEDGE

"As a Junior Gardener, I promise to do all in my power to take care of our trees, flowers and birds; and watch for opportunities to make and to keep my community clean and beautiful."

AWARDS FOR JUNIOR GARDENERS

It is exciting to win an award because it means recognition of work accomplished. There are National, Regional and State awards offered, but all requirements must be met. Study awards; follow rules. National awards appear in full in the September-October issue of The National Gardener in odd number years. Any changes or additions will appear in the September-October issue of The National Gardener in the even numbered years.

Additional contests and their rules will appear in The National Gardener from time to time.

Remember the Smokey Bear Poster contests. Juniors are eligible to compete in these contests. The rules will appear in The National Gardener, usually in the November-December issue.

The National Gardener is the official publication of The National Council of State Garden Clubs, Inc. and contains valuable information for all garden clubs. It helps everyone keep in touch. It would be helpful if the sponsoring garden club would supply the Junior leader with her own copy so that she could keep abreast of any changes which relate to the Junior program.

FLOWER SHOW AWARDS FOR JUNIORS

Junior Achievement Awards may be awarded to outstanding horticulture, design and/or educational exhibits in a Junior Standard Flower Show or the Junior section of an adult Standard Flower Show. Winning exhibit/s must score 90 or more. There is no minimum number of exhibits required in the Junior section of an adult Standard Flower Show; in a Junior Standard Flower Show all requirements of a Standard Flower show must be met. (Consult Handbook for Flower Shows)

One (1) award may be given in each of the above categories for a total of three (3) in a Standard Flower Show.

The Junior Achievement Award shall be represented by a rosette of red, white and blue ribbons.

Judges, who are chosen for Junior Flower Shows, should be familiar with the work of Juniors.

JUNIOR NATURE CAMP

Some State Federations have established permanent Nature Camps in buildings owned by the respective Federations. A number of other State Garden Clubs have Nature Camps in state parks and similar locations. Information concerning these may be requested.

HELPFUL INFORMATION is available from many sources, such as U.S. Forest Service, Boy and/or Girl Scouts, etc.

REFERENCE AND SOURCE MATERIAL

School, garden center and public libraries have helpful books and magazines on crafts, nature study, horticulture, etc. Seed and bulb catalogs should be ordered for additional information.

4. Encourage Junior clubs to have yearbooks.
5. Urge all Junior leaders to send in Annual Registration Forms.
6. Write articles for state publication about current Junior projects, deadlines for registration and dues and other information of value to sponsoring club and leaders.
7. Send reports to State President, and Regional Junior Representative when due.
8. Work with District and/or State Awards Chairman in applying for Youth awards.
9. Coordinate exhibits for state and district meetings.
10. Sponsor a Youth Leaders Training Workshop, if possible.
11. Answer all mail promptly giving information, encouragement and suggestions.
12. At close of term, send all records to successor.

REGIONAL REPRESENTATIVES

1. Promote and support vigorously the Junior Gardeners program.
2. Send pertinent information to all states in Region.
3. Urge organization of Junior Garden Clubs in States of the Region.
4. Plan exhibit for regional convention.
5. Secure reports from each state in region.
6. Send comprehensive report to National Junior Garden Club Chairman.

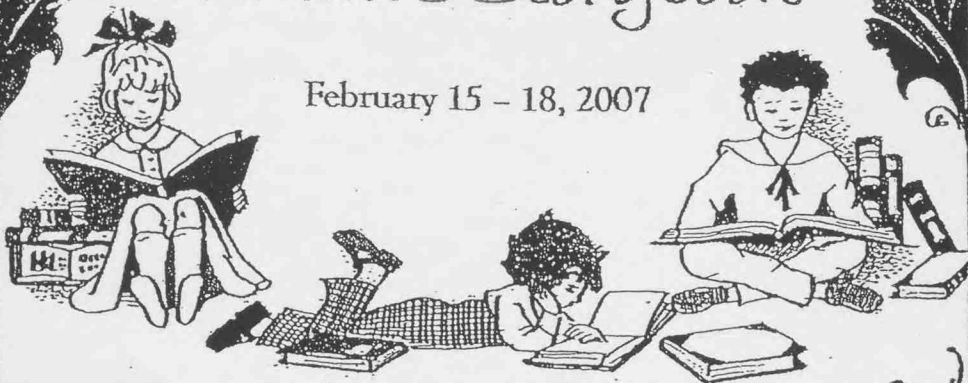

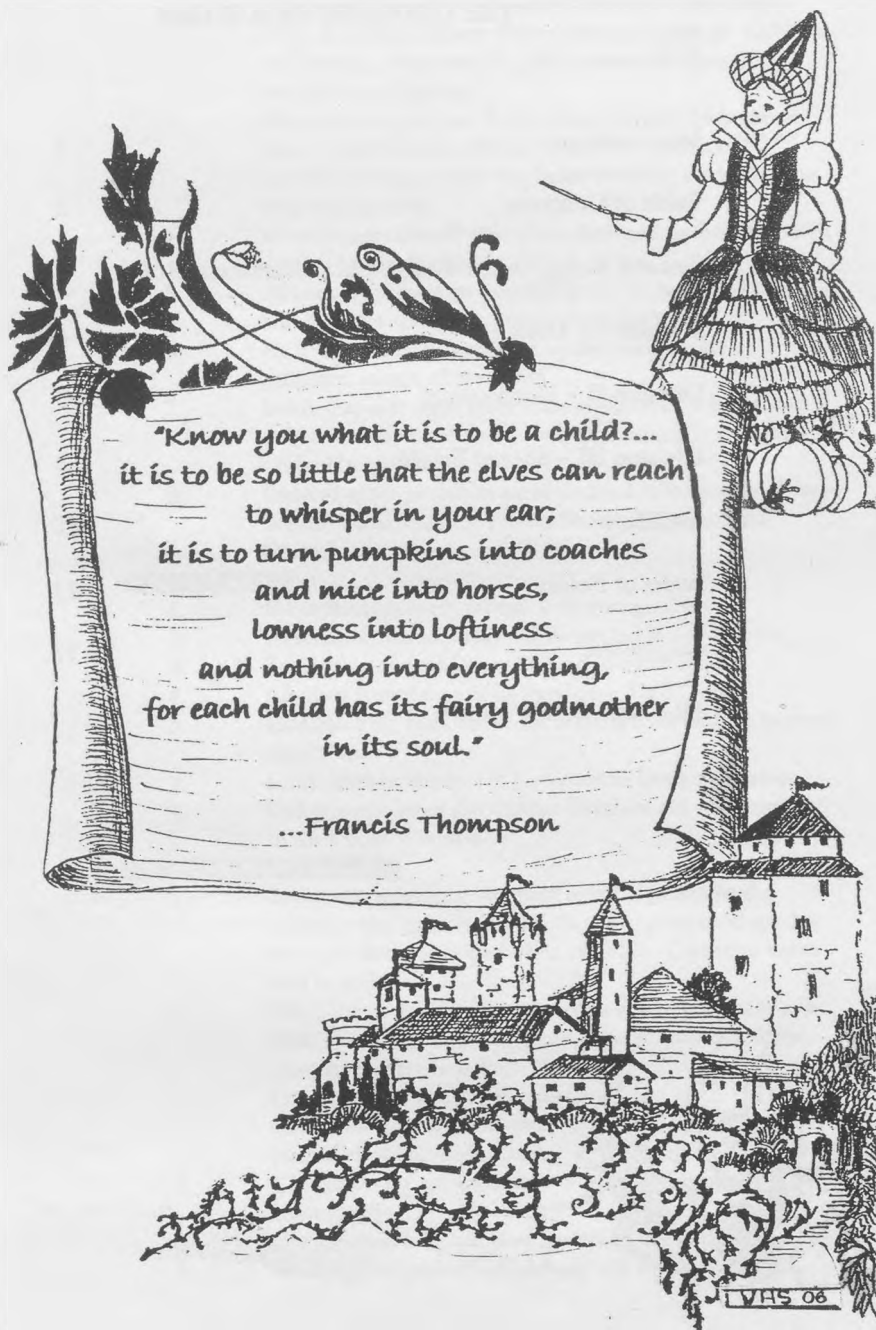

3. All entries received on Wednesday, February 14 between 9am – 3 pm; designs only on Thursday, February 15 between 8:00 am – 9:30 am. **Enter building through door with blue awning.**
4. All tabletops covered with white cloth and to the floor with skirting by MacEvents.
5. All properties must be removed at the show closing on Sunday, February 18 at 6 pm but **not before.**
6. Each entry to be judged must be the work of one exhibitor, except where noted.
7. Exhibitors may enter more than one class or subclass, but only one exhibit per class or sub-class. Exception: See rule #2 under Horticulture.
8. **Limited space prohibits more detailed information. Please consult Handbook for Flower Shows, 2005 or Class Consultant.**

DESIGN RULES:

1. No artificial flowers, foliage, fruit or vegetables.
2. Fresh plant material may not be treated in any manner.
3. Some plant material must be used in every exhibit
4. All plant material must be listed on a 3"x 5" card.
5. Exhibitors are responsible for keeping their designs in good condition.
6. Landscapes or scenes not permitted in Design Division.
7. Living members of the Animal Kingdom are not permitted in the Design Division.

HORTICULTURE RULES:

1. Specimens must be fresh plant material grown by the exhibitor and **must** be NAMED, giving genus and species; variety/cultivar provided when available. Common name may be added.
2. Exhibitor may make more than one entry per class or subclass, if each is a different genus, species, variety, cultivar, type, form, size, or color.
3. Committee may subdivide classes.
4. Container-grown plants must be in exhibitor's possession at least 90 days; multiple planting growing together for 6 weeks.
5. Containers for cut specimens to be provided by the committee.
6. Cut specimens should have no foliage below the water line.
7. Wedging material of bubble wrap will be used.

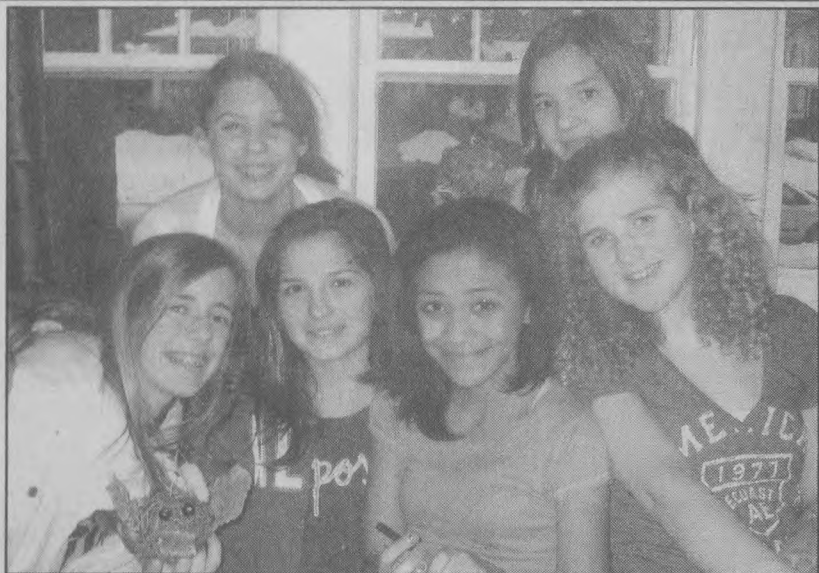

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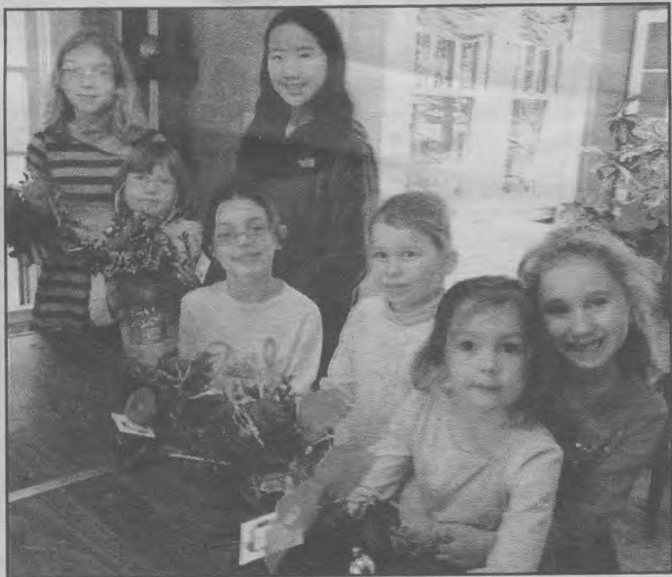

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2007 Central Atlantic Regional Unified Project "Kids and Plants, Naturally...."

Participants: Rake and Hoe Junior Garden Club of Westfield, NJ
A group which began this school year with 4 children, ages 10-12, grades 4-6.
After the first clean-up session, members asked if they could bring a friend.
All the friends decided to join, so the group is now at 9 children.

Sponsoring Club: The Rake and Hoe Garden Club, Inc. of Westfield, NJ
Youth Chair: Alice Cowell, 1417 Orchard Rd, Mountainside, NJ 07092

Project: Create a new shade garden by planting native fern varieties to be designated as
The Fern Garden at The Miller-Cory House Museum, Westfield, NJ.

All plants on the Museum grounds must be researched for authenticity of what was actually grown in New Jersey in 1740. Knowing they needed shade plants, the Juniors went to the Native Plant Society of N.J.'s web site: <http://www.npsnj.org/references/Ferns.pdf>. Clicking on ferns brought us the following quote from Herbert Durand in "The Field Book of Common Ferns", 1928:

"...knowing nothing of the ferns is like visiting an art gallery in which the finest paintings are turned to the wall."

The Juniors thought it would be fun and a challenge to learn more about ferns. The Internet was used by the children to choose and identify native ferns. Google-ing "ferns + nj" took us to web site:

www.fhwa.dot.gov/environment/rdsduse/nj.htm. The fern varieties we chose include: *Matteuccia struthiopteris* (Ostrich ferns), *Osmunda cinnamomea* (Cinnamon ferns), *Onoclea sensibilis* (Bead or Sensitive ferns) and *Polystichum acrostichoides* (Christmas ferns). We chose these varieties due to their heights. Our 40'x20' garden plan: Ostrich is tall so it will be in back, Christmas is low so it goes in the front and Cinnamon and Bead are planned for the middle.
(See our plot plan to right.)



The area was overgrown with huge raspberry bushes and invasive, non native weeds. The only plant we left is a *Hamamelis virginiana* (Witch Hazel) which was planted by the adult club in honor of a founding garden club member. It is the tall plant pictured. (See "before garden picture" left.)

The Juniors, with the help of Boy Scouts from 3 local troops (ages 10-15), parents and adult members of Rake and Hoe GC spent a couple of sessions weeding. (See Juniors, Scouts and adults right and original 4 Juniors below.)



Comments by the Juniors when planting:

"Can we come back tomorrow?"

"My Mother said I can stay until 6:30 or 7 pm."

"This is so much fun."

"Any more plants?"

"I get to rake next."

"Yay, I found some more mulch."

"I love planting things!"



On subsequent sessions, the Juniors enriched the soil with composted manure, planted the ferns, added crystals to insure moisture, put down wet newspapers ("lasagna gardening"), thoroughly mulched and watered the garden. (See below.)



This is our Fern Garden. It is actually more beautiful than it looks in the picture. Next year all the ferns will really fill out. We plan to make our Fern Garden an ongoing project. We will add more ferns next year. Relative to the drawing of the Miller-Cory House below, our garden is in the back yard, behind the house. (See "after planting garden picture" left.)

Historic Miller-Cory House Museum:

Built in 1740, the Miller-Cory House stands on the "road to the mountains" in Westfield, New Jersey. The Millers and the Corys were rural farmers. The "West Fields" were at the crossroads of colonial America, the main route from New York to Philadelphia. www.westfieldnj.com/history/m-c.htm
