A winter's outing at the State Flower Show

WESTFIELD-See the winter magic unfolding at the State Flower Shows on Feb. 15-18 at the Edison Exposition Center. The theme of this year's adult show is "A Child's Storybook" and the Youth Show, "Mother Goose." The tandem shows are presented by members of the Garden Club of New Jersey and chaired by a Rake and Hoe Garden Club member, Erica Fried. Among floral designs and horticulture, characters created by members will enhance the show.

The adult show, "A Child's Storybook," offers fabulous fairy tale floral designs by masterful state designers. The Fairy Godmother invites the public to "Tea in the Secret Garden," "The Teddy Bears' Picnic" and "The Mad Hatter's Unbirthday Party." Miniature floral designs will delight any "Little Mermaid" and Cinderella will be staged as a duo design, "At the Hearth" and "At the Ball" .To brighten the winter doldrums, forced amaryllis bulbs of multiple colors in all their glory will add bursts of color throughout the show. Educational exhibits will teach how seeds germinate how to make a bird bath and how to recognize poison ivy.
