

What a busy and exciting start to the new season!

First, celebrating our new 'home'. There were many distinguished guests! From the Garden Club of NI, the Westfield Garden Club, as well as local dignitaries who told us all about the Scotch Hills Country Club. The team of speakers included Scotch Plains Mayor Kevin Glover, John Shippen Foundation Chairman Thurman Simmons, Restoration Specialist Barton Ross, and SP Township Manager Alexander Mirabella, They combined to reveal the history, the current restoration, and the future of our new meeting place.

The clubhouse started life as a farmhouse in the mid-1700's. In 1897, the building became the George Osborne tavern, but only three years later, the Westfield Golf Club converted the land into a 9-hole golf course. When WGC merged with Cranford to create the Echo Lake Country Club, the sold the property in 1921 to a group of black investors, who created the Shady Rest Golf and Country Club for golf and tennis. Scotch Plains acquired the facility and land in 1938 and renamed it Scotch Hills Country Club. Earlier this year, the Scotch Plains Council voted to approve a bond ordi-

nance of more than a half million dollars to undertake interior and exterior improvements at the clubhouse. The restoration project is in its final stages.

Shady Rest was the first black-owned golf club in the U.S. It became an active center for African-American society during the lazz Era, featuring performances by musical legends Ella Fitzgerald, Duke Ellington, Count Basie, Sarah Vaughn and



many others, Simmons, the founder of the John Shippen Youth Golf Foundation, explained the painstaking process of preserving the clubhouse. With his wife, Ruby, they have invested more than three decades of time in bringing awareness to the historic building.

Following the above program, Certificates of Appreciation were presented to husbands of R&H members who have made significant contributions to the Club in time and efforts: Doug Blumenfeld, Charlie Cowell, Richard Greenstein, Warren Hanscom, John Kazazis, Ray Pietruszki, Jim Williams, and Greg Winter.

Gain a Hawk's Eye!

Hawks are among the world's most popular birds, but can be some of the most difficult to identify. To become more comfortable with identification, there are three silhouettes to become familiar with that are seen in the Northeast.

Buteos - broad wings and broad rounded tails, often seen soaring in wide circles in the air. i.e. Red-Tailed Hawks





Falcons - streamlined, long pointed wings, longish compressed tapered tails; strong rowing wing beats. i.e. Peregrine falcons and Osprey

Accipiters - short, wide, rounded wings, long tails; strong rowing wing beats. i.e. Sharp Shinned Hawks



New Jersey and Pennsylvania are prime viewing areas as the hawks migrate south to their wintering grounds. Hawk Mountain in Kempton, PA holds their hawk count from August 15 through December 15. Cape May's hawk count occurs from September 11 through Nowmber 30th.

And in our own backyard there is Washington Valley Park in Martinsville. Look for an email regarding a Pop-Up trip this Fall.

October's Flower of the Month Calendula, or "Pot Marigold"

Romans and Greeks used the golden calendula in many rituals and ceremonies, sometimes wearing crowns or garlands made from the flowers. One of its nicknames is "Mary's Gold," refer-

ring to the use of the flowers in early Catholic events in Europe. Since early times Calendulas have been sacred flowers in India and are used to decorate the statues of Hindu deities. Ancient cultures also recognized their healing properties. In early medical writings, the calendula was recommended for treating digestive ailments. It is still considered a powerful antioxidant and a strong antiviral herb. During the Civil War, calendula flowers were



used on the battlefields to stem hemorrhaging in open wounds and as an antiseptic in dressings. The calendula is still important in alternative medicine and is used to treat a number of skin conditions. Today it is present in almost 200 lotions, shampoos and cosmetics.

Not to be confused with the common marigold. Tagetes sp., the related Calendula species have been used in cooking for centuries. The flowers may be dried to color butter and cheese, or as a replacement for saffron. They were a common ingredient in German soups and stews, hence the nickname "pot marigold." The flowers are traditional in Mediterranean and Middle Eastern dishes. My research indicated that marigold petals may be used fresh in salads, so I went out to my garden with snips in hand to do a tasting. When I planted my marigolds this year, I noticed a very strong onion-like odor. I found no onion aroma this time, but the petals had a bitter, pungent taste, reminiscent of... grass! Stick with johnny-jump-ups for your salads, or try nasturtiums, whose petals and leaves will add a peppery dimension to your meal.

WASHINGTON APPLE CAKE

Heat oven to 350 F, butter a 13 x 9 x 2 cake pan. Set aside

- 3 large eggs room temperature 1/2 tsp. salt
- 2 c. granulated sugar
- 2 tsp. cinnamon I c canola oil
- I tsp. vanilla
- 2 c. all-purpose flour
- 4 c. peeled, thinly sliced tart apple (about 5)
- I tsp. baking soda

Slice apples and spread them evenly in the bottom of the buttered cake pan. Set aside. Sift together flour, cinnamon, baking soda and salt. Set aside. Beat eggs with a mixer until light and fluffy. Combine sugar and oil and pour into the eggs slowly while mixing on a medium speed. Add vanilla. Fold in the sifted flour, salt and baking soda by hand. Fold in the chopped walnuts. Pour batter over the apples in the cake pan, spreading evenly.

Bake in the pre-heated oven for I hour. Remove and cool. Frost with Cream Cheese Icing. Cake improves with time. If serving in the evening, always bake in the morning or the night before.

CREAM CHEESE ICING

- 2 (3 oz) pkg. cream cheese I tsp. lemon juice
- 1/4 c. melted sweet butter I Tbl. lemon jest
- 2 c. powdered sugar

Soften 2 (3 oz.) pkg. of cream cheese. Beat until fluffy. Beat in melted butter. Beat in lemon juice. Gradually add the powdered sugar. Add lemon jest. Beat until fluffy. Frost cooled cake.

Help Bumblebees with Your Garden



Lathweek brought the news that seven species of bee have then added the US endangered species list, while a bumblebee species is being watched for addition to the list, too. Here are simple ways to support the wild bumblebees in your area.

ஒ o Provide them with pollen and nectar from late winter through early fall. Plan your garden to start blooming early and figiab late.

NeterChoose flowers that welcome the bumblebees. Plants native to your area are a good choice because the bees have evolved alongside them. Exotic (but not invasive) species can work, too. Just be sure to use the straight species, or pick cultivars that retain the general look of the species's flower. That is, avoid cultivars bred for double petals or other fancy forms that make it hard for the bumblebee to access the pollen.

- Bumblebees best like purple, blue and yellow flowers. They
 cannot see the color red.
- Avoid using pesticides.
- Help bumblebees, which typically nest underground, overwinter by leaving some ground undisturbed—that is, not planted or mowed. Bumblebees may also take up in compost piles, woodpiles, stone walls or empty bird houses.

For more pointers on how to help bumblebees, plus an identification guide and recommended plants by region, see Conserving Bumble Bees by the Xerces Society.


