COCONUT GROVE OPEN HOUSE LOTS OF FUN



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
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PERSONAL

"FOLLOW THIS ARROW"

DICK KEARNS of the Sanibel Chamber of Commerce, along with Dr. FRED SNIDER of the Fort Myers Beach Chamber of Commerce and DON BOTTORFF of the Lee County Chamber, met with City and County Officials to discuss the relocation of directional signs pointing to Sanibel, Captiva and Fort Myers Beach. WILDLIFE NEWS

With the current cold snap playing havoc with our palms, fruits and ornamental foliage, I find it perhaps noteworthy to mention the adverse predicament such weather places upon our native and migratory wildlife. Most migrating birds have grown accustomed to the feeding areas the Islands offer, usually rich in seed and insects. If the far below normal temperatures persist much longer, these birds will be faced surely with starvation. It is recommended that those Islanders who have bird feeding stations utilize these to full capacity. The ordinary wild bird seed mixes may be supplimented with suet and "crunchy" peanut butter tidbits. Shore birds and the large water waders have food available in their habitats, but the tiny insectivorous birds will feel first the absence of natural foodstuff.

Of course as land temperatures lower, the water temperatures do also, and will have serious effects on marine life. Several years ago, during the cold 1957 and '58 winter, there was considerable loss in the areas Manatee population, and some mortality of porpoises. It is requested that anyone encountering dead or disabled marine mammals contact this writer at the Lighthouse. as soon as possible upon locating. Exposure to the extremely low temperatures over a two to three day interval usually results in pneumonia to these animals and often is the chief cause of

bird mortality.

To those avid birders who are here to add other species to their list, birding will remain poor, as birds, especially transients, seek refuge in the grass and densly wooded areas of the Islands. With warmer temperatures predicted soon, it is safe to say that loss of wildlife will be slight, but losses will exist. Seldom does Florida wildlife face such problems that they have been experiencing in 1962 -- drought, fire and freezing temperatures. These are the three of living things worst and most hated enemies, enemies that unlike disease, will always be with us and wild creatures thru-out the world.

TO THE ISLANDER:

What's Going To Happen To Sanibel 2

I am sure that most everyone in attendance, at the November 23rd meeting on Sanibel must have left the Community Center with at least one question uppermost in their minds; "What's going to happen on Sanibel?"

The presence of Dr. Barkley, Professor of Political Science, from the University of Florida, was for the expressed purpose of answering any and all questions that might arise relative to Planning and Zoning on the Island.

It is not the intent of the writer to report on this meeting, instead, what I shall try to present is a few of my personal observations. It is because of my interest in Sanibel that I have, on a few occasions, attended the meetings of the local Board, My purpose was to better acquaint myself with their procedure and to learn as much as possible about Planning and Zoning on Sanibel. I had for a long time been aware of conflicting attitudes, towards the Authority, not all of which could be considered complimentary.

I can assure you, that this Board does not arrive at all their decisions in a harmonious manner. I have seen those members who opposed a line of thought, stand up and be counted on the issue, and abstain from voting when the vote was taken. I cannot rightfully say that I have been in agreement with all of their decisions, but neither can Itruthfully say that these decisions were not arrived at in a most democratic way, for I believe that they were. There was one observation that I made at the meetings, and one which I think would be worth passing along for others to think about, and that was the small attendance of Islanders at these open meetings It struck me that if there was a great deal of controversial feeling about how this Board functioned, why were there not more people present to let the Board understand that their procedure was being closely observed?

With a limited amount of knowledge about Planning and Zoning, I attended the November 23rd meeting with a mind as open as possible to listen and to learn. I remember thinking as I listened; Could it be possible that here on this small Island of Sanibel, where nearly everyone is a neighbor, that I detected in a few voices, a resentment that was so dangerously close to contempt, and there was an air of defiance that seemed to welcome any opportunity to be publicly aired.

It is a forgone conclusion tha wherever Americans get togeth er to express their viewpoints o matters of Civic interest, differences of opinions are certain to arise, and God forbid that this ever be discouraged. It is only when any one of these opinions becomes so influenced by personal predjudice, used to satisfy a ruptured ego, or short sighted quick monetary gain, that it becomes dangerous and harmful. When this practice is used, none suffer more acutely than the Community itself, even when a majority of 4 to 1 has voted for Sanibel's present zoning.

I doubt if there is a Community of Sanibel's size, either in the North or South, that has so many qualified leaders, or one that can boast of so much talent and experience in Civic matters, and I speak of Sanibel as a whole. With this in mind, it appears that the future of this Island should be in good hands. One thing is sure, we had better settle our differences and combine our efforts while there is. still time, or we will be standing by the bridge, at this end, when the first cars start to arrive, with a confused look on our faces and it will be too late then, to ask the question, "What's going to happen on Sanibel?"

A STATEMENT OF POLICY

by the Editor and Publisher of the Sanibel - Captiva Islander

In the past few weeks, we have been asked, by persons on both sides of the zoning issue, what the stand of the Islander is. We have been told that our articles are biased for one side or the other, even to the point that one person said that a certain story showed we were in favor of local zoning and another person said that the same story showed we were in favor of County zoning.

The news is reported as we hear it, or as it is told to our reporters. We would welcome letters or verbal comment that we can quote, on both sides of any question.

We know that the decision between local and County zoning means a lot to many people on our Island. It is an important decision and one that will affect the orderly growth of the area, no matter what the final decision

We do not believe that any Island resident is against zoning. Only as to who is to administer it. If this could be settled, to the satisfaction of all, then there would be no problems. It is the settlement of "who," not "what"

The Islander is a "community newspaper." As such, we are in favor of what is "good for the community." We believe that zoning is good for ANY community, as we have seen other areas spoiled and ruined by lack of any zoning. We have also seen areas ruined by improper and lax zoning. The Islander believes in zoning - that is one statement

of our policy.
What the Islander does not believe in is improper or lax zoning. We do not have any policy as to who should do the zoning. We believe that the community itself should make this decision and that the community itself is the ONLY one who has

the right to do so. The Islander is in the same place as the young lad walking a fence - he trys to stay upright and in the center, but in keeping there, he sometimes inadvertently sways slightly from side to side, but does not mean to. In reporting any story, it is very hard to remain unbiased. It is hard to remain "in ballance" and still show both sides to a question.

To repeat: The Sanibel-Captiva Islander believes in proper and orderly planning and zoning but it believes that the decision of who is to do it must be left the the community as a whole. and that the Islander will support the community, not one side or the other.

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
