SHELL FAIR COMING SOON

SHELL PICTURE DONATED

MARY K. CUNNINGHAM of Captiva has donated one of her most beautiful shell pictures to be raffled off at the Sanibel Shell Fair. (All proceeds from the raffle go to the Fair's Driftwood Shop.)

This particular shell picture is undoubtedly one of the finest that Mary has created—and furthermore, quoth we, the frame is made of Maine "Punkin Pine," which is 140 years old and has a beautiful patina. The wood was given to Mary by a friend who salvaged it from a piece of furniture that had been in his family for years.

You may go feast your eyes on this lovely art form at the Sanibel Community House Monday thru Friday each week—and if you feel lucky, you may get your raffle tickets right there at 25¢ each, or five for a dollar. (Many other people about the two Islands have tickets for sale, also) You may be the one to go home with that beautiful picture on March 9, the last day of the Fair.

REFUGEES HELPED

The Cuban refugees who landed on Captiva a few weeks back, after escaping from behind Castro's Bannana Curtain, visited the Islands again last weekend—this time to reclaim the very small boat in which they sailed all the way from Cuba. The U. S. Immigration Authorities had gotten in touch with PAUL STAHLIN via Deputy Sheriff RALPH SMITH, to find out what the charges would be on their boat. Paul, the Chairman of the South Seas Plantation Association, had had the boat taken from the beach and stored in the Plantation yacht basin when the four refugees were taken to Miami. When he learned that any charges would have to be paid by the Cubans, Paul said, "No charge, it's the Plantation's contribution to Cuban—American friendship."

Deputy Smith brought the four men back to the Islands where they got their boat, sailed happily cross the bay to Punta Rassa and put it on a trailer to be pulled back: Miami. We understand that relatives there have gotten jobs for the four men, and that the boat in which they escaped will be instrumental in helping them to start a new life in a land of freedom.

NEW ZONING ADMINISTRATOR

According to JOHN KONTINOS, Chairman of the Sanibel Planning and Zoning Authority, Mr. ANDREW MELLODY has been selected to replace Mr. FRANK HITNER, who resigned, as Administrator of the Authority. Mellody, well known and liked on both Islands, has terminated his association with the Sanibel-Captiva Real Estate Office to devote his full time to the Authority. The full Board of the Authority interviewed all candidates for the position, and it is thought by most Islanders that they made an excellent choice to fill the vacancy.



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


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PERSONAL

By the way, the Legion wants to sincerely thank all those who came -- and all those who worked to make the dance the great success that it was.


HELP!!

INSIDE SANIBEL

The full moon brings the high and minus tides on our Island, as it does on every ocean beach in the world. Small wonder, with such terrific power over millions of tons of water. that it can addle the brains of us mere mortals so that we sleep restlessly, and the shore birds twitter and feed all night long on the beach. The harvest of shells was bountiful what with the moon and the northwest wind last week ... and many of those gathered in will be shown at the annual Sanibel Shell Fair, which is only one moon away. (March 7,8 and 9) It's high time we made a note of it, for collectors must begin to think of categories (see Islander of two weeks ago) and arrangements... and those who are clever with their hands, Islanders and winter guests alike, are urged to bend their talents and hands towards making articles for the Driftwood Shop. Our Shell Fair is the only big money raising effort put on by the Community Association, whose annual budget has now reached an approximate \$2,000 a year, serving more and more actively as a center of Community life. The Driftwood Shop provides the only straight sales counter whose intake goes entirely to the Association.

MARGARET JONES (Mrs. OTTO JONES at Tradewinds) heads this important committee and she has asked me to list some suggestions for those who are willing to spend their time and energy to provide articles to sell in the shop. Here is a list of things to make. Don't limit yourself!...Let your imagination take over:

Shell decorated plastic boxes and bags, hand mirrors and wall mirrors; Mobiles made with shells, driftwood, sanddollars. etc.; Dried arrangements, permanently mounted; Small shell collections in plastic boxes; "Ming" trees; cigarette package holders, made of painted band - aid boxes decorated with shells; Shell wreathes on circles cut from plywood or heavy cardboard.

BEACHING AT BAILEY'S






