ART COMMITTEE EXPANDS




BULKHEAD EXTENTION OPPOSED

The Captiva Civic Association Board of Governors met last Thursday and are preparing to oppose the proposed extension of Bulkheads in Chadwick Bayou, where the Essential Oils Corp. is requesting permission to create approximately 40 acres of land in the area now occupied by the Bayou. Limited bulkhead extension are generally acceptable, according to the Board, but this proposal eliminates the major portion of the Bayou, and it is to this extensive fill that the Captiva Civic Association objects.

When we talked to Mr. WILLIAM MELLOR, the President of the Lee County Conservation Association, about this bulkheading he said, "Anytime that some one trys to project any bulkhead line into spawning & feeding grounds, or into public recreation lands, the L.C.C.A. will do all within its power to stop such action. That is the purpose of the Association.


We will have to wait until the actual maps are drawn up before we know what our action will be."

INSIDE SANIBEL

The Annual Meeting of the Sanibel Island Improvement Association was held on Monday evening, February 11, with President GERALD MARTIN presiding. Fifteen members were present, and a sufficient number of proxys from those not able to attend made up a quorum for the transaction of business. The Board of the Sanibel Community Association had issued the following invitation to the S.I.I.A.:

"Four years ago, with the inception of the idea of Planning and Zoning for Sanibel Island, presented at the January meeting of the Community Association, the new organization which was to impliment this idea, was developed. Since then, the S.I.I.A., with great vigor and continuity, has been responsible for the Enabling Act creating a Special District for Sanibel, and has backed and aided the Planning and Zoning Authority.

"After the successful launching, the S.I.I.A. took over various needs of the Island, influencing the County to pave beach accesses, paying for Island Cleanups, arranging for meetings and speakers for the Islanders information and education.

"In 1963, the S.I.I.A. stands with needs well met and achievements unquestioned, and like many fine missionary organizations, has instigated much which has been adequately taken over by others. The Community Association as parent organization, so to speak, suggests at this time that for the benefit of both groups, and for the salvaging of man - power, the S.I.I.A. return to the Community Association as a Standing Committee.

"Therefore, the Community Association of Sanibel Island hopes the S.I.I.A. will accept this invitation which the Community Association tenders, with the gratitude of its members for past achievements and with the following guarantees for continuing freedom of work:


"1. The present S.I.I.A. Board would make up the membership of the new Committee for one year. Thereafter, the Board of the Community Association would appoint seven members to the Improvement Committee.

"2. Funds in the treasury of S.I.I.A. would be dispersed by the Committee, at their discretion. When said funds are gone, the Community Association would allocate a proper budget for the Committee.

FRANCIS BAILEY moved that the S.I.I.A. accept the invitation as outlined in the Community Association's letter, and that the S.I.I.A. respectfully request that the appointments on the new Improvement Committee, after the first year, would be made for staggered terms, and that at least one Committee member would sit on the Board of the Community Association. ANN JOR-DAN seconded the motion, which was passed unanimously.

With the dissolution of S.I.I.A. as a separate entity, and its transference to the Community Association, new strength may well be added to the function of both. During the past year there have been five overlapping Board members on the two Boards, and the Chairman of S.I.I.A. is Vice-President of the Community Association... so that consolidation would seem to assure time and person saving, as well as guaranteeing a continued lively activity in the area of Island Improvement. Thus S.I.I.A. does not die, but assumes a anew form for greater service to Sanibel.

ROADS CLEAN ... ELSEWHERE


