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... And They Walked Away

A quiet Saturday afternoon on Sanibel was suddenly shattered as a small airplane with four persons aboard crashed into a cabbage palm near the Casa Ybel airstrip. The result -- one totally demolished plane (1.) and four unhurt passengers! In an era of shocking major airline crashes, it's indeed a pleasure to be able to report one like this.

Last Saturday, February 23, Mr. & Mrs. ROBERT R. HOLMES and Mrs. Holmes's brother and sister-in-law, Mr. & Mrs. ALLEN STEVEN-SON, decided to fly up from Vero Beach to Sanibel for the day. As the small Piper Comanche set down on the airstrip, Holmes, who was piloting, noticed that the left wheel brake had locked, pulling the plane off the runway to the left and towards the large ditch spoil banks. He immediately applied full power in attempt to get off the ground and make another try-but the runway was wet and the plane skidded, giving him only enough altitude to get across the road and canal.

At that point, the plane still might have made it, except for the unwanted interference of a cabbage palm (just about the only one in 200 feet) which sheered off the right wing and spun the plane completely around facing the road and into the ground. The plane hit, spun, and slid about 50 feet, stopped -- and the passengers clambered out unhurt.

Deputy Sheriff RALPH SMITH and the Sanibel Fire Truck arrived

shortly and made sure that all were in good condition.

Later the Holmes and the Stevensons left the Island with Smith for Punta Rassa where they were met by relatives and taken back to Vero Beach. The Sanibel Fire Department stood by near the demolished plane to make sure that fires did not start from the leaking fuel tanks.

We are sorry that these people were not able to spend the day, but we are exceedingly thankful that they were unhurt, even the plane was a total loss.







The President of the Community Association allocated the store room at the West end of the Community House ... and volunteer labor cleared and painted it. and installed book stacks which were made by Chairman ART SWANSON. Last week, the many cartons of books were unpacked and placed on the shelves in alphabetical order; pockets and slips will be pasted into each book, and in the very near future, opening date will be announced. The Library will be open on a two afternoon a week basis as a starter -- Wednesday and Saturday from 1 P.M. to 4 P.M., and will be staffed, of course, by volunteers. Books may be taken for an established time limit, with fines imposed if overdue.

So far, the Sanibel Public Library has been running on faith. The Community Association sponsored a Library Night Covered - Dish Supper in December, attended by nearly 100 people, and \$30 was taken in as donations. Art Swanson has underwritten the cost of lumber for the four stacks, and at least three more are needed already. It is estimated that \$200 will launch the Library safely...a small sum, it would seem for the benefit to Islanders and visitors alike thru future years. Miss PAULINE WIL-SON is Treasurer of the Committee and of the Library Fund, and the support of everyone on the Islands is asked at this time. She was Curator of Geology at Oberlin College and belongs to a scientific societies. She has published many papers on living and fossil mollusks.

She has collected in Jamaica, Bermuda and other West Indian Islands, as well as in Mexico, New Zealand, Hawaii, the West Coast of the United States, and New York State. She specializes on fossils of Florida and Southern Coastal U.S.A.,

and the Cenozoic geological age of the world. Dr. Palmer will be assisted in the judging by Dr. EDWARD A. SCHUMANN, retired Professor of Obstetrics and Gynecology at the University of Pennsylvania. Dr. Schumann and his wife have shelled on Sanibel for 22 years and have given their collection to the Chestnut Hill Academy in Philadelphia as the Hazel and Edward Schumann Collection.

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
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MADE WITH

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
FISHING PIER AND MARINA
