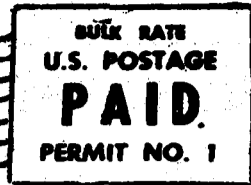
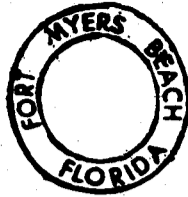

U. F. DRIVE GOING WELL

The Island United Fund Campaign is nearing a successful finish. Most of Sanibel has been solicited and Captiva will soon be completed.

To date the amount of cash and pledges collected total \$1142. Most of these funds will be divided among eight agencies; Boy Scouts, Clothing Center, Community Welfare Council, Girl Scouts, Lee County Association for Retarded Children, Mental Health Association, Red Cross and Salvation Army. Some of the monies, however, have been earmarked especially for one particular agency by the donors.

In case anyone on the Islands has not been contacted by a United Fund Worker, his contribution may be mailed to MRS. JOSEPH GAULT, Sanibel, or check may be left at the Sea Horse Shop.

It is the hope of all the workers that the campaign may be wound up this week and that the goal set for our community will be exceeded.

MORE ABOUT LIBRARIES

For the benefit of "off Islanders" and possible newcomers to Sanibel and Captiva not yet aware of it, both Sanibel and Captiva have a free circulating library with no charge except a nominal one for overdue book returns.

We also have a fine school library.

We are well stocked with a good supply of fiction, non-fiction and reference books.

We can secure any book or series of books not on our shelves for those requiring them from the State Library.

Whatever the outcome of the vote on November 5 (not known at this writing) in respect to County wide service, it is not necessary for Sanibel and Captiva people to go far afield for their reading requirements.

We would like to point out that last edition's article was not submitted to the Islander by the Fort Myers Beach Library. We had been told by Island sources that many school children and adults use the Fort Myers Public Library, and that these people had been informed that they might not be able to use the Fort Myers Library in the future.

Knowing that the Fort Myers Beach Library was well stocked with reference books, we thought that Islanders would be interested to know that such a supply was nearby.

We will, of course, be more than delighted to print a regular Sanibel-Captiva Library article if we are supplied with the information.)

JACK COLE

Jack Cole died October 31 at his home on Sanibel Island. He is survived by his wife, Gertrude, and two daughters, Mrs. Dewey (Mary) Miller and Mrs. Ralph (Martha) Woodring. Jack was born in Lynn Creek, Mo., on February 11, 1901 and brought his family to the Islands June, 1946.

He worked at Casa Ybel for about two years before he and Gertrude opened their first restaurant --- called the "Old Tin Shack" --- where they served sandwiches, beer & cold drinks. "The Old Tin Shack" grew into "Jack's Place," and for many years was the only restaurant on Sanibel, excepting the hotel restaurants at Casa Ybel and the Island Inn.

At one time, Jack was one of the few who had a telephone and consequently was kept on the run delivering messages to friends and neighbors. On a particularly busy day once, he said "It looks like I'm just the old goat" --- and that name stuck with him for the rest of his life.

In the early years, Gertrude ran the restaurant mostly by herself, while Jack worked at carpentry and other available jobs, but as both the Islands and the business grew, he started devoting all his time to the business.

Jack was a well known figure to visitors and natives alike --- especially children, who were presented with Island specimen shells.

In the past few years, Jack and Gertrude took up trap shooting and were so good that they had to build additional shelves in the restaurant to hold all their trophies.

Jack will be sorely missed by all his friends, but we are glad to let you know that Gertrude has decided to continue with "Jack's Place."

GLEN STAHL

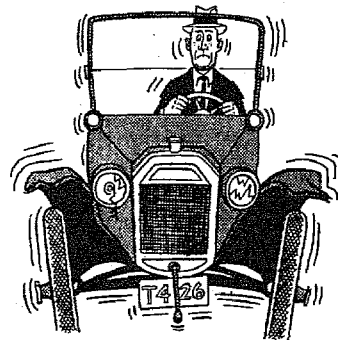

He is survived by his wife. The funeral and interment took place this week in Ravenna, Ohio. Mr. Stahl will be missed by his Island friends.

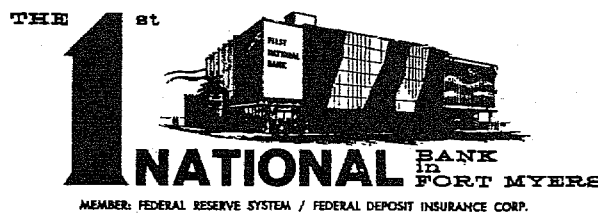
THRIFT SHOP OPEN

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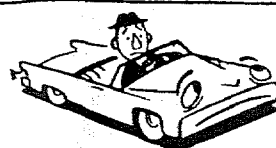

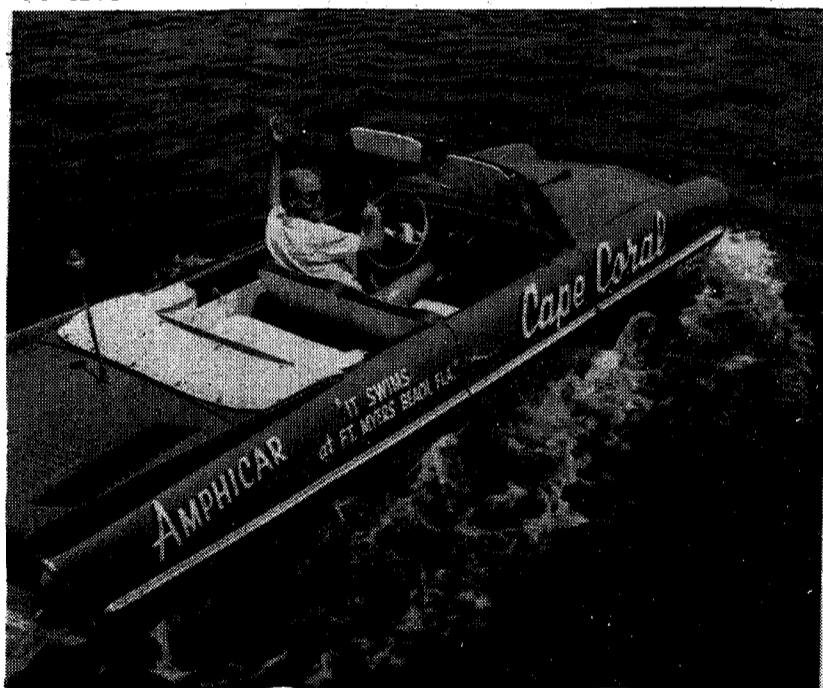
Mr. R. M. STOTT spoke on a free medical self-help training program that is available to the community if it is wanted. Everyone seemed so interested that the first well-

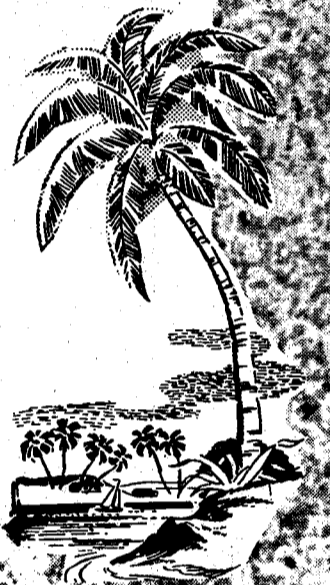

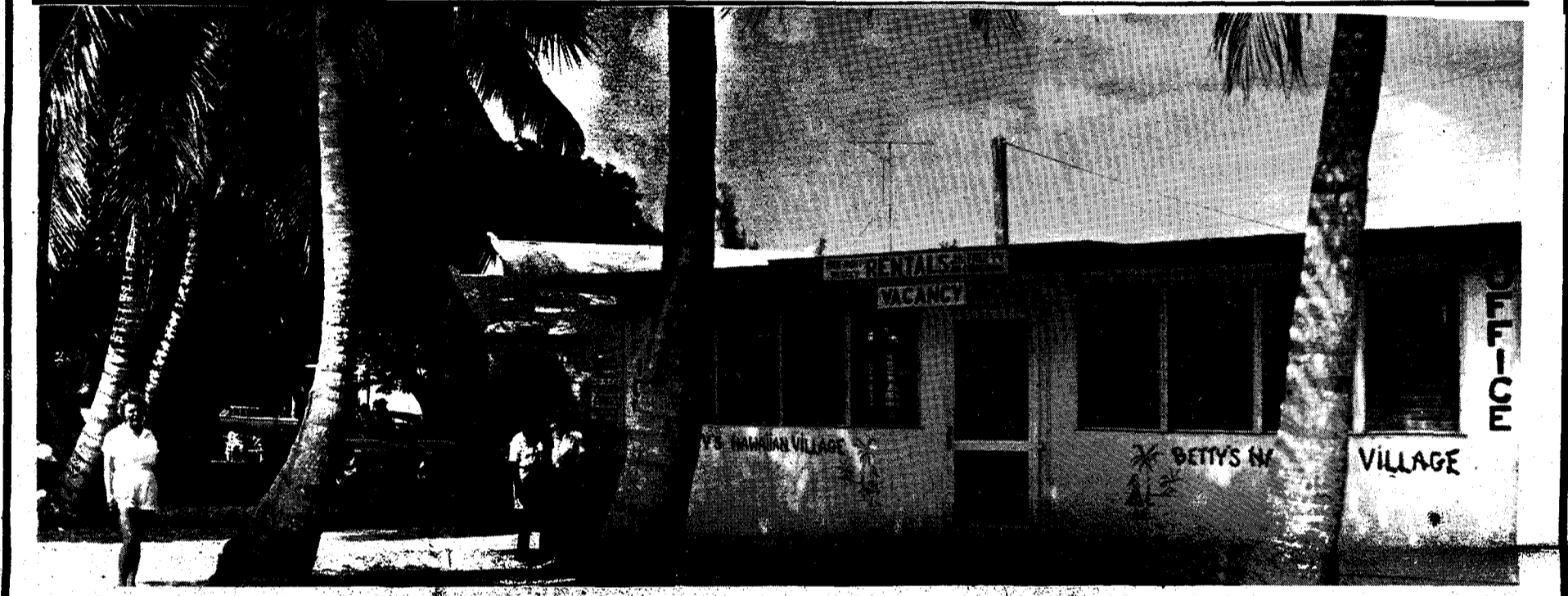
