drop the mail at Sanibel by 7:30 and at Captiva, by 8:30 a.m.

Mail will undoubtedly be delivered to homes earlier in the day. Outgoing mail will be accepted on Captiva until 3 p.m. and on Sanibel until 4 p.m. Any mail taken to the Post Office later than that will go out the following


(Ed. Note: If you haven't taken a mail boat ride yet, and would like to, we would assume that now is the time to do so.)



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

This was one of the most neighborly and gracious open house affairs that the Islands have ever seen. The Webbs served and smiled and smiled and served 'til way past usual closing time and until their guests were just about to pop.

We all came away feeling that we wouldn't eat again for at least three days, but we did--and at Castaway's too!

By the way, we were so entranced with all that lovely food that we almost forgot to tell you about the scrumptious "new look" of the dining room. It really is lovely--a perfect setting for a perfect dinner.

Depending on how long you've been here, you may or may not k wthat some of the world's best wooks live on our Islands. When space permits, the Islander plans to sneak some secrets away from them and give you the recipe. Here's one that's been making quite a hit at parties here and there. It's called "Shew pye Gulf" or barbequed spareribs.

CHOW TIME

- 6 tablespoons honey 6 tablespoons vinegar 1 tablespoon sugar
- 6 tablespoons soy sauce 2 cloves garlic, minced.
- 1/8 teaspoon powdered ginger 1 1/2 cups stock or 2 bullion cubes dissolved in
- 1 1/2 cups boiling water 2 tablespoons sherry 3 lbs. spareribs

Combine in a bowl everything (except the spareribs) and mix well. Cut the spareribs into individual ribs (or servings) and place them in the bowl. Spoon the sauce over the ribs

for at least three minutes and marinate at room temperature for at least three hours, basting frequently.

Remove ribs from marinade and place them on a flat roasting pan and roast in a 350 oven for one hour or until done. Pour off fat as it accumulates in the pan--at least four times during the roasting period--and at the same time, baste the ribs with the marinade . When properly roasted, the ribs will be crisp, but not dried out.

One three pound rack of ribs is enough for four to six people as an appetizer If they are to be the main course, use two racks of ribs and serve

The quantity of marinade in this recipe is sufficient for

two racks.

WILD RECIPE FOR TAME RICE

I medium or two small onions 1/2 cup of processed rice (such as Uncle Ben's) that has to be cooked, but does not have to be rinsed during cooking water, salt, pepper & butter

Peel and chop onion coarsely. Put in heavy-bottomed pan with rice, water, butter, salt and pepper to taste. Cover and cook over low heat until water is down to the level of the rice. Uncover and cook until dry (But don't let it scorch.) Serve. This should be enough for four to five persons.


CAMPAIGN FOR SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA UNDERWAY


PERSONALS




LORA LEE TAKES THE CAKE



WHOM I WUZ

(Ed. Note: We're sorry that we missed telling you in the last Islander edition who the "Guess Who" was--Father Madden of St. Michael's, who said:

"Born more years ago than I care to recall in Perth, Scotland. Spent the first 12 years of life there, six at St. Andrew's School in Edinburgh. Came to the U.S.A. with an aunt...but two years later, at the insistance of my maternal grandmother who detected some 'alien Yankee habits,' I was hustled off to His Majesty's Dominion of Canada. Graduated from University of Toronto, Trinity College, where I was organist for

six years.
"Ordained to the Diaconate at St. Paul's Cathedral, London and assigned to a slum parish in Hell's Acre, Brantford. Ordained to the priesthood in Grace Church, Brantford and remained in the Canadian city for ten years. Was Director of War Services from '39 to '44. Accepted a call to St. John's Church, Milwaukee in 1946 and in 1950 was appointed Canon Precentor of the Cathedral. This, of course, is just a hi-falutin title for nothing more than being able to caterwaul louder than the other Brethern--maybe being able to handle temperamental Prima Donnas helped a bit.

"In between parish work, I picked up my Masters degree in social science and a bad case of ulcers. The latter forced me to seek more congenial surroundings, so came to Florida on a six month's leave of absence. Got sand in my shoes and the six months has stretched a little--almost seven years, to be exact!

"Just as soon as I discarded the last bottle of Bisodal I was persuaded by Emmy Lou Read (Mrs. Lewis, now!) to take some interest in the straying Episcopalians on Sapibel


