





'TIS THE SEASON...




LEGION DINNER FULL OF FUN


PERSONALS





A HOMESICKNESS WITHOUT A CURE by peggy

These are thoughts that creep unbidden into the subconscious of an elderly Floridian who was transplanted years ago from a region in southern Illinois where snow and sleet and ice are an integral part of Christmas.

Home was in an area where evergreens do not thrive and the finding of the Christmas tree was a big part of the fun. Even if you wanted to, you couldn't buy a tree out there. They just weren't sold.

If one had a Papa like mine, you and your brother were allowed to go with him in the search and you helped (or thot you helped) select the one that was just right in height and roundness and closely placed branches. Then trudging home thru the snow to find Mother at the door with her "Oh's" and "Ahh's" as she inspected the tree, making us feel that we were very extraordinary children indeed to have accomplished such a feat.

Inside we were allowed to hold the tree upright, with Papa saying "a little this way" and "a little more that way" and finally, "That's fine! Hold it steady!" He would nail the base on tight and fast and brother and I were sure we had done the entire job.

Then Mother would cut cotton batting in narrow strips and we were permitted to help wind the branches with the makebelieve snow. No matter how bulky and awry your branches were, you were sure that they were the most beautiful... and you certainly were never told they were not.

Now came the rich, red cranberries and corn popped on the kitchen stove that the whole family strung with needle and thread and hung on the tree in garlands. Next, and for this you had to be particularly careful, was the clamping of the little green, red and gold holders with the tiny wax candles.

Finally came the crowning glory -- the big star cut from cardboard and covered with tin foil. Papa always put the star in place at the very tip-top of the tree; he was a great big tall man who could always accomplish the impossible. Now the rest of the cotton "snow" was swathed around the base of the tree and all was in readiness for Santa's arrival. He was to find our stocking hanging from the mantlepiece or in back of the wood-burning stove, depending on where we lived.

A good-night kiss and we were off to bed, determined to stay awake to catch Santa when he came. But we never sawhim and we always were astounded in the morning when Mother and Papa called us to "see what Santa Claus brought."

Oh, what joy to fly down-stairs in our nighties and find the tree with candles lighted and the little (sometimes the most precious) gifts tied to the branches. The large gifts were stacked in the "snow" under the tree.

We found our stockings stuffed with goodies but before breakfast we were only allowed to eat the big orange from far-away Florida that was stuffed in the toe. Then, before we had our real big breakfast, Papa extinguished each little wax candle. These would be lighted again Christmas evening and for as many nights after that as we could make them last.

We wanted to hold in our memory as long as possible our joys of Christmas.



DEAR SANIBEL FRIENDS:






