

#### OPERATION CLEANUP

Saturday, Feb. 15, is Sanibel Island clean-up day. The improvements committee of the Sanibel Community Association decided to wage a campaign against the litter strewn along the roadways and Bowman's Beach.

The causeway has meant more cars on the Islands --- and more cars have meant more empty beer cans, bottles, candy wrappers and other trash thrown out of car windows. This litter is not only ugly --it is actually dangerous to bare-footed Islanders and visitors.

Volunteer workers --- adults and teenagers --- are asked to report to the Sanibel Community House at 9:30 a.m. Saturday morning, Feb. 15. Wear appropriate old clothes. The volunteer workers will NOT be asked to do any heavy work (for which trucks and helpers have been hired) but will merely be collecting litter in bags or baskets for pick-

This cleanup day can only be a success with your help --- it won't be so much work if everyone pitches in. Oh --- and if you see anyone throwing trash from a car window, get the license number and report it to Deputy Ralph Smith. Littering is against the law and can cost offenders \$100.

### BAILEY NOW HEAD COACH


Mrs. Marguerite Flores of Mid-Island Cottages, Captiva Island, has joined the ISLANDER staff as our Captiva reporter.

ENGINEERS' HEADACHE

Redfish Pass is engaging the attention of the Lee County engineers. In conversations with Toby Bryant and the late Clarence Chadwick something of the history of how Redfish Pass came into being was disclosed. It started out as a man made ditch, dug to float a new boat first down to the bay and later across to the Gulf of Mexico. The latter endeavor was a sad mistake!

According to Toby Bryant, the oldest building believed still in existence on Captiva Island is the little building near the Manor House on South Seas Plantation. It was built in 1898. At that time a squatter, Montgomery, ran a sailboat, the Monty, to Cuba peddling necessities to and fro. Capt. Frank Smith had homesteaded south of Montgomery and had planted 1,000 coconuts and while Montgomery was away, Smith put another man on the place to help him. When Montgomery returned, since he had prior rights, Smith and the other man gracefully retired

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

#### SUPER PRIZE SHELL TABLE ON DISPLAY NOW

The grand prize --- a lovely seagrape wood coffee table laden with a distintive shell collection contributed by Island shell shops --- is now on display.

Yesterday, it was at Glory of the Sea. Today it is at the Island Bake Shop, tomorrow it will be at Friday's House of Treasures.

Feb. 1 will find it at Bailey's, Feb. 2 - 4, at the Coconut Grove, Feb. 5, Sea Horse Shops and Feb. 6, Sea Gull Studios.

Mary K. Cunningham of Captiva contributed the actual table, as well as a number of shells. She was also in charge of arranging the collection of Sanibel and Gulf of Mexico shells. Other shops donating shells were Clara Stran's Shell Shop, Captiva, Sea Gull Studios, Sanibel Sea Shell Industries, Glory of the Sea, Reynold's Crafts Shop and La Hacienda Shells, all of Sanibel.

Of course, no one can tell who will win this beautiful table—but we do know one thing ——you can't win it if you don't have a ticket! Proceeds go to the Sanibel Community Association, and the drawing will be held on the last day of the Fair, March 8, 1964. The winner does not have to be present, and the table will be shipped anywhere in the U.S.A.

## PROF. MYERS ADDRESSES SHELL CLUB MEETING

Harvey Myer, Professor emeritus of the University of Tennessee, gave a very interesting talk at last week's Monday night Shell Club meeting in the Captiva Community House.

He said that in the beginning, he gathered only what was pretty. It takes time to develop the ability to recognize and reject specimens, he said, but the eye can do it with incredible speed.

He got Junonia fever and went about chanting, "Come on, you Junonia!" --- and he kept it up for five years, until he finally found his first one.

He said part of the game is out-witting other shellers, but it is now agreed that it does not matter when or where you go on the beach, someone has always been there before you--

and has possibly missed the best ones! Captiva experienced the "finest shelling in 30 years" on Jan. 17, when three foot high mounds appeared and disappeared --- quite enough for everyone.

Prof. Myer suggested that Louise Perry and Jean Schwengle's book was very helpful to those who wish to identify miniatures.

Originally from Wisconsin, he spoke of the fabulous fossil beds in upper Michigan and of finding fossils at an altitude of 11,000 feet in the Rockies. Some of the fossils are two and three HUNDRED THOUSAND years old.

Prof. Myer, by the way, was wearing traditional dress -- a bolo tie with a fine polished Cellana nigrolineata, tipped with

## FREE SHELL BOXES FOR CHILDREN

TOM NIX has really been putting his spare time to good use. Since the Islands's school children have shown such an interest in shell collecting, he made up some display boxes so that every child will have an equal opportunity to show at the Fair, either alone or as a family group endeavour.

The boxes are 3 inches deep, 16 x 20, painted black and have a glass top. All any child has to do to get one IS TO ASK either Tom or Mary Nix. Any child who wins an award --- first, second, third or honorable mention, may keep the box after the Fair so the prize collection is not disturbed. If the child

enters his own box and wins, he or she will be given a new box to start a new collection.

Just let Tom and Mary know that you want a box by Feb. 10. All you have to do is ask -- no one need go without.

The finder of the gold heart cockle reported by Jim Williams, turned up at Glory of The Sea to have a special box made to display it in. CAESAR CAMPE, the gentleman who - "came and saw, etc.," a guest at Casa Ybel. In order to keep the hinge intact, the box has to be high enough to clear 3 1/2 inches, and the shell is about 4 inches across. Click heels, man!

### DRIVERS SIGNED FOR SEBRING RACE


The March 21 Sebring 12 hour race entry list even now equals a page from the "who's who" in the world of fast cars and top drivers.





but unfortunately Montgomery died before he could file a claim.

Toby Bryant took over Frank Smith's place and Carter squatted on Montgomery's site. This led to some confusion because Montgomery's heirs had sold the land without filing a claim to Judge de Costa (a self admitted captain of a Union Army regiment of negro militia who had fought against the South and therefore not particularly welcome in Confederate country.) Both de Costa and Bryant wrote to Washington but in the end Bryant and Carter won by having their applications in first.

In those days Captiva and what is now called North Captiva was all one island and more than a mile wider than it is now. In 1872 it was surveyed for the Government by Mr. Jenkins. They meandered the outside beach (Gulf) by chain and meandered the bay side with a boat, counting the strokes. Six feet was a stroke but with a fair tide and fair wind, it might go only three. Then the two crews got together at night and drew an imaginary line from the outside to the inside and never did run a definite line. Toby estimated that a good two-thirds of the Bryant homestead was washed away the last time he saw it but Judge Bryant's Manor House survived BECAUSE Redfish Pass went through where it did. The pipe of the artesian well remained above tide level for a long time and boatmen could get fresh water from it until a boat ran into the pipe and broke it off below tide level. It was then fifty yards off shore. When put in, it was 150 yards inland. Miss Scotia Bryant, Sanibel Postmistress, said the house she was born in is now a mile out at sea!

#### HELP FOR BEGINNERS

CONCH is a Greek word and like phychology, is pronounced KONK. i.e., When you konk a man on the conch with a conch he konks out.

CHITON . . . Kite-on.

THAIS is Ta-eece, "th" being like T.

JANTHINA . . is correctly pronounced EEan-teena, the J being like i of it.

L. stands for Linne, Latinized to Linneus, the master mind who recorded all established names of shells (and other things) and when he found something which varied or had not been given a name up to his time, he gave it one. Changes made since are due to subsequent studies of the animals within the shells, the only correct way to establish to which family a shell belongs. Hence the "horse conch" was found not to be a fasciolaria and had to be renamed. (Pleuroploca gigantea.) With advanced knowledge of oceanography and with world scientists pooling their knowledge. Latin bridging the language gap, considerable advance has been made in removing duplication of names for world species. This work will naturally continue.

Of the fasciolarias, F. tulipa is always mottled, may be various shades and often distinctly different by area. F. branhami has a brilliant high porcelain gloss. The F. hunteri is the most common and our distans is a subspecies of the hunteri, but we do not get the prototype F. hunteri different in structure as well as color, never as large and many scientists retain the name F. distans, the "little banded tulip."


