


"SANTIVA" NOW "ISLAND QUEEN"


The "Santiva" --- which brought our mail for many years --- has been bought from Capt. Palmer Ladd by the original owner and his son, Ray Singleton, Sr., and Ray, Jr. It has been re-named "The Island Queen," and will be adapted for pleasure sightseeing trips along the Caloosahatchie (hatchie, by the way, means river, so "Caloosahatchie River" is actually redundent --- just a point of information to start --- or stop --- conversations!)

If you missed the mail boat ride, take a trip on The Island Queen. Cruises will be run four times a week from the Fort Myers Yacht Basin, leaving at 10 a.m. Tuesday and Thursday downriver for Sanibel. Wednesday and Friday the boat will cruise east on the river. (Or should we say hatchie?) Box lunches will be available on the boat.

Ray, Jr. and Captain Ladd will handle the cruises. Ray, Sr. built the boat in 1940 and operated it with his brother, Capt. C. L. Singleton for 12 years before selling it to Capt. Ladd. Full circle,

The tragic bereavement of Dr. Tucker Abbott of Philadelphia will shock and grieve many people on these islands. His letter to Helen and Jim Denny brought the first word of the loss of our dear friend Mary Abbott, and we all grieve for Tucker in his sorrow.

'Dear Helen and Jim: I know you will be shocked to learn of Mary's sudden death on January 29. She died of a stroke in her sleep. She was being treated for very high blood pressure for several months.

"The children are taking it like soldiers. She left a legacy of three fine, self-reliant children.

'Mary was so thrilled with the great kindness you showed her during our visits to Sanibel. She often spoke of it.

"We shall continue to go on 'as usual' as best we can.'

Mary was more than a wife and companion. She was the inspiration of his books on sea shells and often accompanied him on his lengthy trips.

It will be remembered that Tucker and Mary spent their honeymoon on Sanibel as guests of the late Captain and Mrs. Robert C. Cockerill. Lillian Cockerill and Dr. Louise Perry were among the first to recognize the young man's ability and urged him to write a much needed book on American sea shells. With Mary's help and encouragement, AMERICAN SEA SHELLS was published in 1954. It was dedicated to their three children, Bobby, Carol, and Cindy. All who knew her will miss her greatly.


CHURCH SCHOOL GROWS



A HONEY OF A TALE


Mr. Kirkus Dugdale tells this story on himself:


