of a Mayan god carved from dark amethyst from Brazil.

Other items of interest in the shop are utility and ornamentals carved from Shesham wood from India. Enameled bowls, ceramics and copper items designed by Sascha Brastoff, a former ballet dancer. This young man seems to have transformed the grace of his former art into his new creations.

The carvings of birds of all kinds, both miniature for jewelry and large for shelf or wall, carved and colored with accuracy, are done by Jonathan Jones who describes himself as "an old man who likes to whittle."

There are also some new pieces carved by Hope Brown. Married to a farmer and with eight children, Hope began to carve to augment their farm income. Encouraged to try her hand at pelicans, which she had never seen, she came up with almost lifelike perfection and has gone on to many other Florida water fowl. Some day she hopes to come south and see what they really look like. The demand for her birds is unending and now she has no time for kittens, her first carvings.

Among other treasures, Enid Collinshanddecorated box-bags made of mahogany are unique design, no two pieces alike and they go extremely well with the spring fashions.

Assisting the regular staff of Friday's House of Treasures for this event was Grace Rosche of the Nutmeg House. There were from 150,000 to 200,000 carats on display for this first annual gem and jewelry showing. A very beautiful display.



From the fragrance of the House of Treasures, we moved on to the Open House party in Priscilla Murphy's new building, now housing her real estate office, Wm. MacIntosh's Book Shop and Elsie Malone's new Shell Shop. Lois Van Arsdell of the Rocks and Admiral Ed Konrad greeted the guests and served refreshments at a table exquisitely decorated with blooms of spring, carnations, chrysanthemums, huge yellow daisies and, believe it or not, pussy willows. It was the perfect spring touch, augmented by a lovely blooming orchid spray. The orchids were donated by Mr. Mattison, owner of Key Biscayne and the Reef Motel on Sanibel. They were blooming in his East coast garden. Refreshed with punch (with or without) we discovered that Priscilla has what we believe is the only real estate office with a patio overlooking the garden in the rear.

Priscilla's office was filled with more spring flowers in beautiful arrangements, and we loved the touch of St. Patrick with Bells of Ireland grouped with snap dragons and gorgeous Japanese chrysanthemums. 
Shells for Easter: Pearly chambered nautilus, angel wings and of course, the crucifix bone from the channel catfish.



J., Mr.& Mrs. ERNST VON derLINDEN, also of Chatham, Mr. & Mrs. NORMAN CLARK of Bucks County, Pa., Mrs. DELLMAR REYNOLDS, Mrs. A. JOS. DONAHUE, Mrs. W. P. GLASS with all her guests, who were: Mr. & Mrs. T. GUNTERGLASS of Mount Vernon, Ill. (He's an oil geologist---or do we call it oilogist?) Mr. A. K. McKENZIE, father of Mrs. Donna Glass, Mr. & Mrs. FRANKLIN E. GLASS, JR., (their three children missed the pictures but are here,) Mr. & Mrs. FRANKLIN GLASS, SR., (Franklin Jr. is editor of The Dayton Herald, Dayton, Tenn., and Franklin Sr. is publisher,) Mrs. ROBERT BEASLEY of Virginia Beach, Va., Mr. & Mrs. ROBERT WEBB, Mrs. HARRY Du MONT and LINDA, Mrs. ALLEN WEBB, SR., all from Ashville, N. C. and Mr. & Mrs. ALLEN WILLIAMSON & daughter JEAN of Mount Vernon, Ill. (The children of Mrs. Beasley and the Robert Webbs are also on the Islands, but this was a grown-up party.)

Mr. & Mrs. Bert Porreca are from West Henrietta, N. Y. He began his pictures with snow scenes taken near Rochester. Each scene was like a Christmas greeting card, trees glittering with ice (fortunately no wind,) red pyracantha berries touched with snow, contrasted suddenly with July greenery and autumn scenes from Lake George. Then Bert took us into his iris garden where he raises and hybridizes new species. With extraordinary telephoto lens he showed scenes taken from a distance and then in close-ups that even showed one flower with a bee in its beard. Magnified shots of one species after another showed the care with which each is separated. studied and crossed to achieve specified effects. Every conceivable shade and shape of iris is something to strive for, and once established where it can reproduce its own kind, is given a name: Morning Sunlight, deep purple of Congo, rosy Mary Randolph, indigo quality of Deep Black, Indiana Night, Golden Sunshine, Fire Dance, Heart Beat with muted tanderine Center, Pinnacle, Rainbow Room, Happy Birthday, Curled Cloud (worth \$25 a bloom,) Dancing Tiger, Black Taffeta, Golden Garland, Palamino, Limelight with crinkled petals, copper toned Inca Chief, the gorgeous triple bloom of Olympic Torch, Celestial Snow, Storm Warning. (Don't the names speak of a quality?)

Bert described how the beard and fall of the iris is removed to prevent bees from accidentally pollinating specimens under development. Sweet Mystery, for instance, has a rare fragrance. Blooming Fool produced 165 blooms in 18 days. Brave Banner has the true tints of the shell Janthina.

Moving from the cultivated garden into the wild flowers with his Reflex Camera, Bert showed us what we never saw before in the woods: Hepatica with six, seven, even twelve petals; trillium with a dozen variations growing within feet of each other, butterfly weed with its starred center invisible to the naked eye, Queen Ann's Lace in fine detail, and many other wonderful close-ups, magnified to show the detail in which they are constructed.

Highlights of the evening were amusing shots taken of Sanibel Morning and Evening Devotions --- shelling on the beach. He closed with five shots taken of one sunset from pale gold to crimson with sea birds coming home to roost silhouetted against the sky. The Porricas returned north Saturday morning, but Bert has promised to show the slides again in a place where we can all enjoy them. It was a lesson in horticulture and in photography.

Last Wednesday an old European custom was followed in the raising of the "roof tree" over the new home of Col. and Mrs. PAUL G. KENDALL on Captiva. As the last rafer was nailed into place, a small pine was cut and placed upright on the unfinished roof to bring the blessings of God upon the new house.

NED and JEAN BROWN of Scotsville, N.Y., presently staying with friends at the Iona Trailer Park, came over to the Sanibel Trailer Resort again for a pot-luck wupper prior to Ned's travel tour shown in the home of VELNA and JOHN RIDGE. Ned began with scenes he had taken of the luau given for E-DITH ELSTON and RALPH SPADE'S pancake breakfast. Also, some gorgeous shots of sunrises and sunsets taken over Sanibel from the Punta Rassa side. He then took us to various trailer resorts where the Browns had stayed.

At the Anhinga Trail at the Flamingo we watched these noted birds swim with their bodies submerged and heads like snakes lifted clear. The anhinga spears a fish, often at incredible depths, then has to juggle it off the beak and head first into its mouth before swallowing. Any fisherman with two hands will tell you its a trick just to hang onto a lively, slippery fish. The bird does it without hands.

At the Herndon Trailer Court at Sugarloaf Shores Ned got wonderful shots of the U.S. Navy Blue Angels flying in their classic formations at the Key West Naval Base. We also saw the lazy pelicans waiting to be fed at the charter boat dock. One pelican had the misfortune of getting a fish sideways in his throat, and after several vain attempts to chuck it into place, finally had to retire from his front row stake-out to a plce he could cough up the fish without losing it to a neighbor

without losing it to a neighbor. A second film started at Encenada, Mexico, on the Baja Peninsula. The Browns went south to Estero Beach and over the mountains to Punto Benda. They traveled from Morro Bay along 65 miles of cliff-hanging road from which they could view sea lions and seals 500 feet below. They shelled everywhere that they could get down to the beaches, most of which are pounded with high waves. At Seacliff State Park near Santa Cruz Ned captured some beautiful pictures of the sea roaring in under the natural bridge, foam racing up the cliffs to forty to fifty feet. Limpets survive in this water, and there are many varieties of chitons in California waters. When the Browns return to Sanibel, presuming they will, these pictures should be shown at the Sanibel Community House.

Forgive me, my dear, for not winning Blue ribbons or trophies and such But the judges and I couldn't see eye to eye And I don't care for trophies--not much!


I sold out dear Mother's collection For a museum here on the isle
