Erosion Discussed at C.C.A. Meeting

NUMBER 14

Beach erosion was the main topic of discussion at last week's Wednesday night meeting of the Captiva Civic Association in the Community Center. General Jesse Lindsay introduced county engineer, Stanley Hole, who showed slides of erosion on Captiva. He compared the beach to that of Naples, and said that since the beaches are so similar, the same kind of groin which helped them halt erosion might well be used on Captiva.

Harold Bixby said that county help and private contributions have given Captiva residents enough capital for at least two such groins, It has not yet been decided where these groins would be placed.

History Today & Yesterday

An interesting letter was received from Mrs. David Kite of Gaines-ville, Florida who tells us: "I was born on Sanibel in 1898 as were four of my brothers. My father, grandmother, and grandfather Reed are buried on the Island. My husband and I went down after Christmas to relocate the graves.

We have many happy memories, my brothers and I, of our years on Sanibel. A friend of mine was down about three weeks ago and brought me back the February 20 issue of the ISLANDER. I enjoyed it very much. Thanks." Signed by Mrs. Kite.

This recalls our late postmaster, William S. Reed who was postmaster 1895 until 1939. His father, Captain William H. Reed, was

the first settler on Sanibel, homesteading here in 1887.

In the beginning, any mail which reached Sanibel came down in the wood burning steamer "Belle of Myers" from Punta Gorda. George Cooper, who lived in the house on Tarpon Bay Road across from the present site of the Coconut Grove Restaurant, rowed over to Pine Island twice a week to the dock at St. James City to pick up the mail from the steamer. He carried this to his place and dumped it on his wife's sewing machine where Islanders could come and get it. There was Henry Shanahan, for instance, who walked up from the lighthouse which was built in 1889. The Casa Ybel Hotel was built in 1890. Mrs. W.J. Matthews who from 1895 kept adding rooms for guests until her home became Island Inn also came up for her mail, along with Frank and Ernest Bailey and a few other hardy souls.

There was a little post office up on Wulfert, but that was a long way to go on foot.

Bailey, who was reputed to be the only mule owner on the Islands, opened the Sanibel Packing Company in 1900 to ship out produce. Johnson managed to create a general store on the Tarpon Bay Road,




CATCH A TRIP TO THE WORLD'S FAIR



LOCAL FISH LIKE LOCAL SHRIMP

Did you know that Captiva and Sanibel Island have never been without shrimp bait 365 days out of the year? This is all due to the efforts of a hard working and conscientious man who keeps all the marinas on these Islands well stocked by trading many a comfortable night in bed for a night out in the Gulf gathering these little creatures for the fisherman's pleasure.

He explains how Sanibei and Captiva islands lie between the wide and famous Pine Island and the Gulf of Mexico. Pine Island Sound is the spawning ground for many species of bait and especially shrimp. Shrimp come into the sound to spawn and grow to a size that is perfect for bait for most varieties of salt water fish, before returning to the Gulf.

Because these Islands have two natural passes for the shrimp to travel in and out, there are great schools of small game fish waiting for the shrimp to come into the sound to spawn and grow. On the Gulf side there are larger fish waiting for the young and tender shrimp to come out through these two passes after their awakening to greater seas to conquer. Because of the back bays and the sounds being natural spawning grounds it is hoped that great consideration will be given before any dredging is done that would interfere with our 365 day gift from the sea.

the Coconut Grove site.

During the 1910 hurricane, Belton Johnson said they piled all the bags of fertilizer on the windward side against the wall and some fifteen or so persons took refuge in his father's store.

Later, Bailey's Packing Co. became the general store and Mr. Reed had his post office just a bit west of it. Although the road and Bailey's dock were wiped out during the 1926 hurricane, the post office remained.

If Mrs. Kite can add anything to this brief history of those years, we would be glad to have it.





Regardless of what you enjoy most garden-wise, you will find it at the Caribbean Gardens; from the roughest natural growth to the exquisite orchids carefully tended in their jewel-like setting in the greenhouse. Between the two extremes are the areas which are so subtly cultivated, one isn't sure whether man had a hand in the grooming or not, and others which are obviously and carefully manmade and tended---flowering shrubs and trees.




From Cincinnati, Ohio is Butch Fabian, 17, staying in the Pectin house at Shell Basket.
