#### COUNTY TO ERECT PUBLIC FACILITY **BUILDING IN TURNER PARK**

County Commissioner P. A. Geraci told the Islander this week that the County would be erecting a prefabricated building in Turner Park "within the next 60 days" which would contain not only rest rooms, but also a section where bathers could change their bathing suits and get in out of the rain (if any.) He said the building would be attractive and that they were planning a prefabricated structure so that it could be moved if ever necessary.

The County's recent clearing of a roadway to Bowman's Beach on Sanibel had sparked speculation that the Turner Park option would be dropped, and that a park would be created on the partially Federal owned Bowman's Beach. Mr. Geraci said that there was absolutely no foundation for this idea.

(Editor's note: We think that Sanibel and Captiva are most fortunate to have a County Commissioner who not only seems to be working for the good of the Islands, but who is also easily accessible when one wishes to ask him something. Availability, we feel, is a most important asset in public office.)

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


And here's a poem--perhaps more of a word picture--from the December 26, '37 issue.

#### THE SHIP



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BIRDS, BIRDS, BIRDS by george weymouth

I moved to Sanibel about 21/2 months ago for two reasons; I love the island, and I've always had a keen interest in wildlife, particularly birds, and as we all know, Sanibel has plenty of birds. I've made a large chart (which I've hung in our home) and I've listed in a vertical line all the species of birds ever seen on the Islands, and across the top every day of the year is listed. Every day I am able, I mark down on this chart the different species seen that day and the approximate number seen.

For instance, I heard a Gray Kingbird at the lighthouse on April third; two days later I saw one, and two other people reported seeing them. By the eighteenth they were very com-mon. Their sudden abundance ( assume) has forced the Loggerhead Shrike and Sparrow Hawks to move to the mainland, as their diets are basically the same.

On April fourth, I saw two Least Terns on the Causeway; by the twentieth they were common all along the beaches, and were nesting by the first of May on the causeway. (Tried to mark these nests with red flags, and was able to find around 1,200 on the South end of the Island, and figure there were around 400 on the North East end of the Island, I managed to band 400 young before they got too big.)

The Night Hawks arrived on the ninth of April and on the thirteenth I heard 1964's first Black-wiskered Vireo. Within two weeks they had also become very common, and on May 14th Mangrove Cockoos made their appearance.

Around April 14th Charles LeBuff, who lives at the Refuge Headquarters, saw a Red-Headed Woodpecker (a former resident of Sanibel) and also saw around the lighthouse a Scissor tailed Flycatcher. We've also been seeing a Starling around the lighthouse and are a little concerned that it might start nesting.

A smooth-billed Ani (a very rare bird) flew by me at the Bird Tower on May 10th and 22 days later William "Tommy" Wood-Refuge Manager saw one by the rookery near by. Charles and I also saw one on May the 29th near the Mounds.

There have been approximately 100 Black Terns out on the Causeway in the last two weeks, on the same Island the Skimmers are nesting.

past year, and later will be associated with her husband in the real estate office. We wish them well in their new endeav-




TED WORSHAM, 17, a fre-
