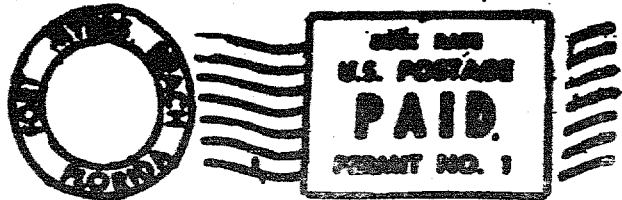

SHELLS WANTED

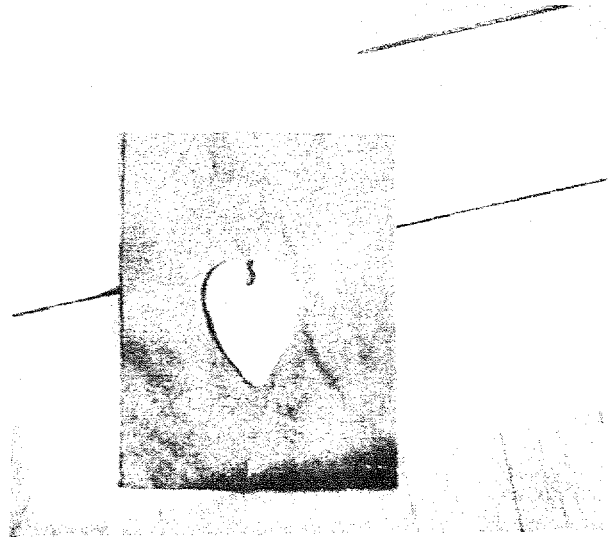
20,000,000 YEARS OLD . . .

The Sanibel-Captiva Shell club contributed a number of shells to the Natural History Museum in New York. The following is a letter by Debby Bixby which was recently mailed to Shell Club members. Of course, one does not have to be a Shell Club member to help the cause.

"While I was in New York early in May, I called on Mr. Old, the man who is in charge of shells at the Natural History Museum. He was very pleased with the shells we sent him. He called it a good and generous donation but he would be most grateful for more. So will you please look over the list below of the shells we have already sent and try to get as many varieties as possible which are not on the list."

The shells which have already been contributed are chalky buttercup, pointed venus, lefthanded whelk, brown ribbed cardeta, cross barred venus, florida cone, common atlantic slipper shell, elegant oosinia, florida spiny jewel box, true tulip, morton's egg cockle, zebra periwinkle, king's crown, apple murex, angel wings, atlantic wing oyster, green jackknife clam, rose tellin, prickly cockle, fargo's worm shell and shark's eye. Anything you have not on this list would be appreciated.



This is a fossilized Cackle Cardium (heart cockle) measuring four and a quarter inches long and three inches wide, found on the Captiva beach by Mrs. Dale Ballinger while she was leisurely strolling along while she was waiting for her husband to complete a job in one of the Gulf homes. An expert on the Island says it could well be 20,000,000 years old and the size of two good sized fists when alive.

Serving will start at noon --- we'll see you there. If you've been to a Legion fish fry before, you won't miss it --- if you've never been, DON'T miss it!

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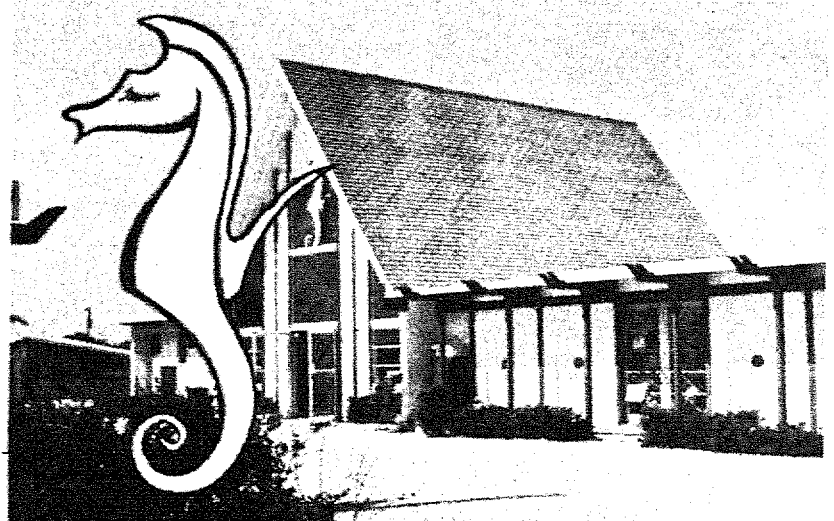

The Church will be closed during the month of September and will reopen Sunday, October 4, with a Communion service at 9 a.m.

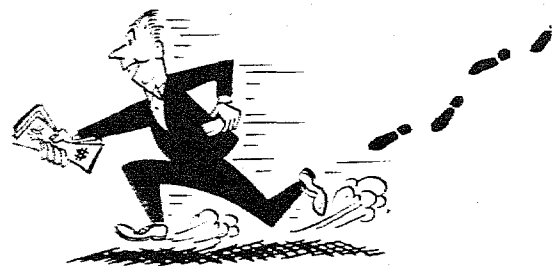
SANIBEL COMMUNITY ASSOC.



TIM SLATER and STEVE MUENCH went to St. Petersburg to visit CHRIS GAULT at Florida Presbyterian College last Saturday.



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
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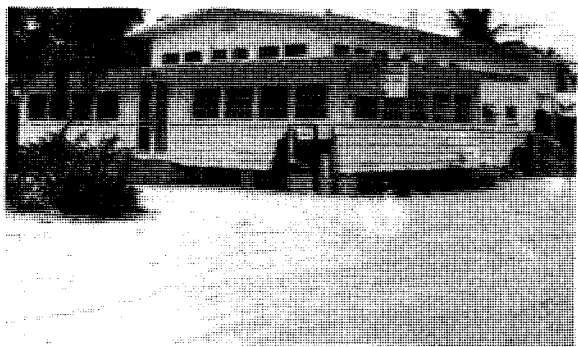

**WILDLIFE NEWS
A WILDLIFE SCRAPBOOK**

Over the past few weeks Sanibel Refuge headquarters has been the recipient of numerous inquiries relating to the nesting and general reproductive habits of the islands' indigenous marine turtle, the Atlantic Loggerhead. Questions relative to the reptile appear not to be confined to any one phase of turtle biology, but span the entire complex in which the creature resides. In order to present information on a broadened scope, and encompass all general knowledge in but one short writing, many factors of interest must be eliminated for brevity, yet it is hoped that an insight into the life cycle of this endangered creature will result.

Q. When do sea turtles lay their eggs and what kinds come ashore on Sanibel and Captiva Islands?

A. The normal period of egg deposition is May 1 to August 30. The Loggerhead turtle is the species utilizing local beaches. Other species of marine turtles inhabit our area. Among them are the Ridley, Green and extremely uncommon Luth or Leatherback.

Q. Why is the Loggerhead the only type that lays on our beaches?

A. It is apparent that other forms, although in some areas they surpass loggerheads in density, migrate to traditional breeding grounds on the Central American and Texas coasts, as these beaches are traditionally used only by the Loggerhead.

Q. I have heard that sea turtles lay only once per summer and when they come ashore, they always lay eggs at the same spot. True?

A. Recent investigation conducted in areas along the Atlantic coast, where these turtle are abundant, have proven that a female loggerhead may deposit eggs six times during one summer season, NEVER IN THE SAME LOCATION.

Q. I would like to see a turtle lay her eggs. When would be the best time to see this?

A. There are no controlling factors that allow the time or place that these turtles will nest to be determined. Popular beliefs that the nesting is controlled by time, tide or moon phase are inaccurate. One must stroll the beach nightly only hoping to encounter a nesting female.

Q. Do sea turtles only lay at night?

A. This is true in most cases, although there are rare instances where loggerheads have been observed nesting during daylight hours. As in most natural things there are exceptions. One of the great mysteries of herpetology was solved when the nesting site of the Ridley turtle was found on Padre Island, off the Texas coast, when the Ridelys were nesting during daylight.
