



AUTOS ROBBED

We regret to have to tell you about an unfortunate by-product of civilization which occurred on our Islands recently. Two cars, belonging to Island visitors, were broken into on Tarpon Bay Road and articles valued at approximately \$300 were stolen. We find this shocking, especially since this is an area in which we haven't had to lock our doors for years. According to the Sheriff's Department, the criminals were from out of town.

Please, if you are visiting, do not leave valuables in the front or back seats of your car --- either lock them in the trunk or take them with you.

THE NEW BILL

We found the following article in Sunday's Miami Herald. It contained information we had not realized, and we thought that perhaps there were other people as confused as we over the civil rights law.

RIGHTS LAW: WHO, WHAT IS COVERED?

The Justice Department is preparing a simple pamphlet to clear up confusion over the new civil rights law.

Department spokesmen said last week that the guide should be completed within a week or so. They do not yet know when it will be distributed or how.

It will attempt to answer most of the questions which have arisen since the bill was enacted.

Most of the questions involve who is covered by the new law and who is not. Despite a year of public debate on the proposal, this still puzzles many people.

The new law is indeed a long, complex document that contains some points on which even judges will disagree. Most of the confusion centers around the public accommodations section.

Basically, this section prohibits racial discrimination in three particularly troublesome areas -- eating places, lodging places and places of entertainment.

Under this section, it is unlawful to discriminate by race or religion in the following:

RESTAURANTS, cafeterias, lunch counters, soda fountains, or other facilities "principally engaged in serving food."

HOTELS, motels, inns or other places of lodging that serve transient guests. (A rooming house occupied by its owner and offering five rooms or less for rent is exempt.)

THEATERS, movie houses, concert halls, sports arenas, stadiums or other places of exhibition offering entertainment which has moved in interstate commerce.

Further, it is unlawful to discriminate in any place of business which:

CONTAINS one of the above types of establishments, or

IS CONTAINED by one of the above types of establishments.

For instance, a department store is covered only if it operates a cafeteria or lunch

Or a beauty or barber shop

is covered only if it is in a hotel or motel or other establishment mentioned above.

All businesses outside this basic area -- eating places, lodging places or places of entertainment -- are not covered and may continue to discriminate.

FOR INSTANCE, a bar or tavern is not covered unless it serves food or is in a hotel or motel, airport, but or train station.

Also, the law does not cover privately-owned places of recreation, such as pool halls, bowling alleys, swimming pools, golf courses and gymnasiums.

HOWEVER, PUBLICLY-OWNED OR OPERATED SWIM-MING POOLS, GOLF COURSES, GYMNASIUM OR RECREATION AREAS ARE COURSED.

Further, the law does not cover retail stores unless they offer eating facilities. This exempts most lingerie shops, hat shops, dress shops and shoe stores.

Nothing in the law relates to housing. Nothing in the law relates to employment until July 2, 1965, when that part of the law takes effect.



COOK'S CORNER

Mrs. JIM DENNY is known to Islanders and off Islanders not only for her marvelous knowledge of shells and sea creations, but for her cooking, too. Joe Green, staff writer of the Cincinnati Ohio Enquirer, is one of her most recent appreciators, and devoted a whole column in his paper to praise not only Sanibel ("Nature's yet unspoiled domain in the Gulf of Mexico . .) but also (and mainly) Helen's delightful cockle cookery . . . in this case, scalloped scallops baked in cockle shells.

The recipe is:
1 pint (1 pound) scallops
2 cups coarse soda cracker crumbs

1 cup soft bread crumbs 3/4 cup melted butter or margarine.

Wash scallops in cold running water, drain. Cut in half crosswise. Combine crumbs, butter, salt and pepper. Alternate layers of scallops and crumb mixture in greased dish, ending with

crumbs. Pour into heart cockle (or other) baking dishes. Bake in moderate oven for 25 minutes.

Mr. Green assured all his readers that the results were absolutely delicious --- and we're inclined to agree with him.

While we're on the subject of food, we discovered a marvelous recipe for charcoal broiled spareribs t'other day. Here it is:

1/2 cup olive (or cooking) oil 1/2 cup lemon juice salt and pepper

garlic to taste (powder or mashed thoroughly)

1 teaspoon oregano 11/2 teaspoons sweet basil 1/4 cup wine vinegar

1/3 jar (approximately) of commercial hickory smoked bar-

becue sauce.

Combine ingredients in order named and let stand 20 minutes, while you clean one to one and a half racks of spareribs, which should be cut in half by the butcher. Place racks in shallow baking or cake pan and brush thoroughly with sauce. Pour remainder of sauce over racks and marinate at room temperature for one to one and a half hours, or cover in refrigerator & marinate for three to three and a half hours. Start charcoal fire in grill. (we find a handy and inexpensive grill can be made from three cement blocks and the rack from an old refrigerator. It is not only handy, but puts the meat just about the right height above the coals --- 10 inches or so.) Just before you start to cook, put two handfulls of water soaked hickory chips on top of charcoal. Broil meat thoroughly until brown, turning frequently and brushing with sauce.

Beat off the neighbors (who

will be attracted by the delicious aroma) and cut meat into individual ribs. Serve with lots of napkins, corn (roasted in the husk or wrapped in tinfoil) and a tossed green salad with an oil-vinegar and herb dressing.

This recipe is enough for three to five people.

COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION DINNER

About 50 members of the Community Association attended a covered dish supper and brief business meeting Tuesday a week ago. The highlight of the evening was the food, of course. To quote one extremely satisfied attendee, "It's always so wonderful that I can't eat for a week afterwards ---perhaps we should have weekly meetings!" (which we think is a sneaky way to diet!)
