CAUSEWAY BEING RESURFACED

Resurfacing of the causeway roadway was scheduled to start yesterday or today (or possibly Friday) depending on weather conditions, County Engineer Stanley Hole said last weekend. Trucks started bringing the rock to be used in the resurfacing onto the causeway on Saturday.

The new surface, paid for out of construction issue funds, will be finished three or four days from the time work is started. The original surface was a light one, Hole said, and wore down very quickly.

When the causeway was being constructed, it was not known what unforseen expenses might pop up--extra filling or extra pilings, for instance -- so a light surface was put down in case the money might have been needed elsewhere. Later it was found that the construction issue funds would cover all needed costs, including the present resurfacing, so it is being done now before the tourists arrive for the winter season.




ZINA is a former Washington, D.C., Auto Show Queen and presently models in Atlantic City and New York.






woman of strong mind and high character, she refused to dwell upon this disappointment. We will all miss her this year.



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
