GULF DRIVE BEING COMPLETED

The bulldozer, caught in the act of plowing through jungle to create an 80 foot right of way extension of Gulf Drive east to Casa Ybel, is on its way because Floyd Pflough of Sanibel Cottages kept fighting for five or six years through a jungle of correspondence, traveling and conversation in his attempt to open up the Gulf Drive extension as a county road. He secured the cooperation of landowners along the heretofore private road. which was only 30 feet wide, who are Mrs. Angus Laird of Tallahassee, Bob White of New Hyde Park, New York, the late Charles R. Hook of Middletown, Ohio, and Howard Dayton of Casa Ybel, who all signed deeds to the County allowing for the 80 foot right of way. The property was accepted by the County Commission last December.

The new roadway will bypass Casa Ybel Hotel and will make a

straight line from Tarpon Bay Road to Casa Ybel Road.

Lee County Road Foreman Lester Norris is on this job and Islanders may look forward to riding over the new road within two weeks ---in spite of all those stubborn trees.

P. A. Geraci, County Commissioner for the Sanibel-Captiva District, should get a vote of thanks from Islanders for his work in the County Commissioners office which made this new road possible.

The road will, of course, benefit the Islanders as well as the tourists. The late Mr. Charles R. Hook made it possible to get the original Gulf Drive extension through, and now, with the help and hard work of all those mentioned, the Islands will benefit by the new, wide road.

CHAMBER BUILDING, WATER SUPPLY DISCUSSED AT C. OF C. MEETING

In case you missed out on the Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce meeting, Wednesday, August 19th, here's a brief sketch of the goings-on.

The financing of the new Chamber of Commerce building was discussed and voted on. If you've a yen to draw 6% per annum interest, inquire further into this new project.

An even more important issue, a look into a water system for Sanibel and Captiva Islands, a water supply of one million gallons per day from Pine Island.


John Kontinos of the Coconut Grove Restaurant was appointed chairman of a committee to investigate the feasibility of creating a Sanibel-Captiva Water Association to work in conjunction with the Greater Pine Island Water Association Inc.


The water system, which would cost users \$9.50 to \$10.00 a month for a 7,000 gallon water supply, can be financed for approximately \$750,000. The loan, which would be through local sources, would be backed by a government guarantee through the Farmers Home Administration, which will guarantee loans to small communities for up to \$1,000,000 at 5% up to 40 years.


Application for approval of the plan was sent Washington for approval, and Kontinos said Sunday that the Islands should know by the middle of next week whether the plan is considered feasible. If Washington approves, application will be made for the loan.

Kontinos also said that the \$9.50 to \$10.00 figure was tentative, and if it were to be changed, it would be lowered. The price is based on a figure of 600 users. This does not mean 600 connections, of course, as motels and hotels would use much more than 7,000 gallons a month, even though they would only have one connection. Each motel unit, Kontinos said, would be considered as one half of a family unit.


