




We all give our appreciation to the Woosters for giving such a very nice party for the children.



LINE UP FOR THE SANIBEL FERRY by ethel snyder


The first ferry in the morning from the Islands across San Carlos Bay to Punta Rassa left at 8 o'clock. The trip took a half an hour. THE BEST was the original ferry for this service and Captain LEON CRUMPLER was in charge. The ferry could only take nine cars and if there were more than that number waiting, The Best returned immediately to pick them up. THE REBEL, flying the Confederate Flag, was the second ferry on the run, which greatly speeded up service -- but when that boat was put on, more folks were coming over.


Everyone took their proper place in the line. Sometimes there was a long space between cars, as the son was hot and all tried to get into the shade of the palm trees lining the road to the landing. There was space, but no one ever thought of pulling into one of the spaces ahead of whoever had come first. It just wasn't done! Sometimes that wait could be a real adventure. Many times the mosquitoes were terrific. One debated if it was wiser to suffocate with the windows shut tight to keep the skeeters out, or to get air and be consumed by them. There really was no choice so you took some of both and rejoiced when the ferry came and you could leave. The trip across the bay was invigorating and conversation with Captain Leon was highly entertaining, so the half hour was much too short what with the porpoise rolling alongside the ferry, and those off black ducks that turn upside down and swim as much as fifty feet underwater (we bet upon where and when they would come up). Many interesting incidents occurred over the years but one stands out and it only happened once.

One early moring the sun was already hot and the first car for the ferry stopped in the shade of the first large palm tree and the other cars lined up after him-but farther back. That left a little more space than usual in front of the first car but we were obviously in line. The Best was just about to dock when a large new and expensive car with a chauffer and one quite distinguished looking man (one could not have called him a gentleman) in the rear seat, dashed down the entire length of the line and pulled into the first place ahead of everyone! It all happened in a flash! But Captain Leon had seen the performance as he docked the ferry and came ashore at once and motioned the cars to hold back. He never was ever known to raise his voice to anyone or anything. He didn't have to. But at all times he was in complete command whatever the situation and no one EVER doubted that. No one present that morning knows what he said to the occupant of that shiny car. It wasn't much. But immediately the chauffer (with a big grin on his face) pulled out of line, turned that car around and drove to the last place in the line. The ferry was, of course, the only way one could get a car off the Islands. The man's face was very red, I noticed, as they drove past. It might have been sunburn -- but it didn't look quite like sunburn!

Everyone feld like cheering Captain Leon, but nobody did. That wouldn't have been cricket. He was the tenth car that morning and had to wait for the Best to make the return trip. We were all glad as everyone wanted to congratulate the Captain and also laugh. Leon's grin was broader than usual that morning.

A victory had been scored for fair play and good manners that morning and the Islands have always stood for both. Captain Leon pushed his cap to a more rakish angle and we all saluted with our horns as we drove down the gang plank at Punta Rassa!


Welcome back also to JOHN FRENETTE. John lives in town where he has a job, but comes over to the Islands on the weekends to stay with his parents at the Beachcomber.
