DO DEER SHED THEIR ANTLERS **EVERY YEAR?** by george weymouth

Yes, they certainly do! The antlers here in South Florida fall free from the buck's head about the last of February. Immediately they start growing back, and by the last of July are fully developed. At this point they have a soft cartilage. cartilage, covered with a thin layer of skin called 'Velvet' for it, in turn, has a covering of hair like a man's beard. In about two months, the cartilage turns to a very hard bone, and apparently an itching sensation sets up, which causes the buck to scrape his rack against trees etc. till the velvet hangs bleeding in shreds from the bone. This continues till the 'tines' (each point) are shining like sabers. After the 'rut' (mating season) the antlers drop and the process starts all over again.

I have watched this annual cycle for five years while I was the lecturer at the Everglades Wonder Gardens in Bonita Springs, Florida.

According to Clarence Rutland deer at one time were fairly common here on Sanibel He has seen as high as 30 in one herd. The last one he saw was just after World War One.

Mr. & Mrs. Willes Combs. who live at the West end of Gulf Drive, showed Charles Le Buff and I the skull of a 4 point buck (eastern count) they found in their yard. Since the antlers had become fully de veloped it meant he had died some time during fall or winter Since the Combs live on fairly high ground we figured it may have drowned in a hurricane.

Deer down here are much smaller than the Northern White Tail, rarely does a buck get near the weight of 150 lbs. They are so small if they lower their heads, most of them could squeeze between your legs.

Their antlers are not anywhere as massive as the northern race but much more symmetrical
