ISLAND WATER SYSTEM BEING STUDIED

The Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce, the Community Association and the Captiva Civic Association have appointed a committe to study the proposed water system for Sanibel and Captiva Islands. The Farmers Home Administration will loan up to a million dollars to a rural community for a project such as this. The 40 year loan has a low interest rate, and must be able to be paid back by the community's present population.

The proposed plan calls for buying water in bulk from Pine Island and piping it across the bay to storage tanks and pumps on the Islands. The plan would take about 3/4 of a million dollars. The project is not allowed to be a profit making organization, which means the rates would get lower as more people joined the plan. Joining will be optional. There will be an agreement signed with Pine Island to insure a continuing water supply without an increase in rates.

The ISLANDER has been told that public reaction to the plan so far has been favorable, and that a continuing supply of good water would

be a great asset to the community.
