
They said that the Islander has been their touch of Sanibel up in the cold north for the eleven months between visits, and that it is a bright spot on dreary days.

FLIP PHILLIPS OPENS TONIGHT AT GOLDEN SANDS

In the world of jazz, Flip Phillips is considered to be one of the top tenor sax men of all time. Noted for his harddriving jazz and swing, he displays amazing versatility and plays a ballad with a sensitivity and feeling that few tenor men achieve.

Flip has played with the top bands of the jazz era including Russ Morgan, Red Norvo, Woody Herman, Benny Goodman, and jazz at the Philarmonic in addition to playing and recording with his own groups. He was one of the major sparks in the Woody Herman herd and most of the saxophone solos in that first and unequaled herd were his, While with Woody he wrote "Apple Honey" which became a jazz classic and a favorite of musicians and fans alike. He also recorded "Sweet and Lovely" which is considered one of the great ballad recordings.

One of the original and most enduring stars of jazz at the Philharmonic, Flip won greater recognition when he recorded Juan Tizol's composition, "Perdido'. This number achieved such fame that he acquired the nickname Flip "Perdido" Phillips; and even foreign audiences punctuate his performances with cries of "Perdido", "Perdido!

Recognition of his musical ability is evidenced by the fact that for ten consecutive years he was the recipient of the Downbeat Award in the tenor sax field.


Flip's musical tourings have taken him not only over all of the North American Continent;, but, also include nine tours of Europe and trips to Japan, China and Australia.

For relaxation, Flip enjoys baseball - a sport he likes so much that he used to work with the Cleveland Indians to keep in condition. Since moving to Florida, fishing has become his favorite off-time recreation; and, he has become one of the expert fishermen of the area.





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POST OFFICE RUSH

The Post Office Department gets quite rushed around the Holidays. So this is to remind you to mail your overseas and out of state packages and cards early.

The Christmas" rush" next month brings a very old quote to mind: "Neither snow nor rain, nor heat, nor gloom of night stays these couriers from the swift completion of their appointed rounds." This was said by the Greek historian, Herodotus in the Fifth Century B.C. but it still is true of the postal service.

However, Sanibel Post mistress Scotia Bryant recently added a thought. "While it is true that bad weather does not stop the mails, it certainly can slow them down."


She mentioned that planes: can't get of the ground, switches on railroad tracks can freeze up. Trucks must move more slowly and cautiously over highways. And, in many places, mailmen might wish for the warmth of an igloo. Even the impish Mr. ZIP can't assure next-day delivery under these conditions.

"Why," you may ask, "does

the post master bring this up?" "Simply to let people know that there is a factor that we just can't control, the weather, Postmistress Dodie Booth of Captiva said. "It is important that people mailing Christmas cards and gifts make every effort to shop early and mail early to assure on-time delivery. This is especially true during the Christmas rush when an ever increasing avalanche of mail moves through the postal system."

The Post Office Department has several new tools to use in this year's mail service. The most important is the new ZIP code and transportation-distribution system that came into being with the Zoning Improvement Plan (ZIP). Everyone is urged to use the five digit numbers because in most cases the code cuts down the number of times a piece of mail must be handled. This saves time, labor and money.

The Post Office Department suggests that even if you don't know the code for the addresses of the people to whom you'll be sending cards and gifts, you should use the code on your return address. And you should record the codes from



the return addresses of those who are writing to you.

Moving the Christmas mail is a hard, tiring job and the local workers who work so diligently during this peroid deserve all the cooperation they can get.


The postmaster said that shopping early, mailing early and using ZIP codes will really put ZIP into your Christmas mailings...and give your mailman a hand too.
