The Island Water Association, Inc. has opened offices in the Sanibel Community House and is now accepting membership subscriptions. PATRICK O. MURPHY is in charge of the office and will have it open for business five days a week, from 8:30 until 4:30. A phone is being installed and the number is GR 2-4981.

During the opening drive for membership-or until March 15, 1965subscriptions to the Association will be \$108. This amount is to be paid in full when the application is signed, or with a initial payment of \$18 and the balance spread over three years of payments of \$18 every six months. Prices will probably be higher later on.

The minimum number of subscribers has been set at 600, and this number must be reached before March 15. It is therefore important that all Islanders sign up without delay. The sooner that the minimum number of subscribers is reached, the sooner we will have good water.







"The Eskimos have already climbed on the ice mountains got ready to blow snow cold towards in east it shows already to get ready for our warmth. It is no fun to cut wood when the eskimos will blow 10 and 20 below zero.

"Santa Claus is repairing his harness for deers to draw him with jingle bells for the people hear him coming. On Wednesday Nov. 25 is just four weeks to Christmas and Santa Claus's team of deers are dancing in a hurry to take trip around the country.

"For cold, sore throat, cough, a good cure is to use balsam gum most people see balsam trees that there is a little lumps on trees. Bust each one of them with pen knive and take them a few drops of these gums and swallow them. No money needed, it growed there for person to use it. A tamarack gum, another good cure of cold and coughs. There is round balls on these trees, one ball is enough. Put in a bottle, half pint, take bark of the gum. Then put in bottle and fill it with whiskey, stir good it gets like milk. Then take a teaspoon full three times a day. Some takes every four hours, and is enough, no more.






AUDUBON TO SHOW "WHITE WILDERNESS"

COUNTY COMMISSION STUDYING PROPOSED CAUSEWAY TOLL RATE REDUCTION

After the Sanibel Community Association submitted a recent complaint stating that the \$3 round trip fare caused a hardship on Islanders, the Lee County Commissioners decided to get an estimate on the cost of a survey which could eventually lead to a commuter reduction.

Herbert J. Sims of New York, fiscal agent for the building of the causeway, wrote the Commission that "We have no way of advising the County Commission that a commuter rate can be established at this time." The letter said that any reduction would have to meet conditions established in the bond resolution which financed the almost \$4 million dollar project, and that if the tolls were really causing a hardship on Islanders, the County should have a survey made by Goodbody & Co. to represent the county. After presenting the results to both residents and bondholders, Sims wrote, "We may have the bond resolution amended to permit installation of commuter rates if warranted."



A new shop, The Red Pelican, is due to open on Sanibel today. It's on the main road right between the B-Hive and Glory of the Sea. If you're fascinated by the unusual, you'll be as fascinated as we are by the Red Pelican. Tis the only shop we've ever been in (including during our young village days) that has as wide a range of delights --- penny candy to Morocan rugs, patchwork parkas to antique screens Scotch oatmeal to wooden toy trucks, shoes to tea boxes. If what you're looking for is hard to find, you'll very likely find it there!

The Sea Horse Shops, of course, are old and favorite shopping grounds for many Islanders and visitors. It's possible to go in with a long list, and come out with the whole thing checked off. The Gaults must spend months and months looking for just the right thing, because you so often find it there. For instance, tiny pistols

smaller than your tinger, bobbing toys for the young ones, faboulous beach tote bags for teenagers, and all sorts of oriental oddments to grace your shelves.

The Raynolds Craft Shop is full of ceramic delights, including all sorts of Christmas ornaments for your home and gifting. They also have just about anything you can think of made out of shells--frames, plaques, boxes and tables, as well as rare local specimen shells.

MacIntosh Book shop on Sanibel is a real adventure! Don't think you can just go in and look around. You can go in and look around, but you stay! Book shops are fascinating anyway and especially when the buyer has good taste and his shelves of volumes you just must read. I am (especially fond of the prints one finds in well set up book shops and discovered some beautiful old Chineses prints first thing. Another new arrangement in the shop was a large variety of hand blocked prints made into stationery. The paper has deckled edges and there is a variety of colors and designs. They are utterly charming, lovely native birds, beach scenes, tropical palms and birds and butterflys. Prices range from \$1.50 to \$2.00. 


