
#### ISLAND CHRISTMAS

SANIBEL POST OFFICE by ethel snyder

The American flag fluttering in a breeze at the top of a pole in front of a building any place in the world brings a thrill and a sense of security to millions of persons especially to Americans and to countless others. I had not been able to find the flag fluttering in a breeze on top of a pole on Sanibel because I could not find the post office. There was rural delivery service on the Island. Mail was put into my mail box out front at the Beach Road and an obliging and friendly carrier also picked up outgoing mail and packages and sold stamps when he delivered. And I had seen large pouches of mail come over on the mail boat from Fort Myers but had no idea where they were taken to be sorted out. The boat landed at Bailey's dock at ten in the morning. It was always on time barring hurricanes when it didn't come at all! So there must be a post office somewhere.

One day I inquired at the store (Bailey's, of course.) "It's that way," and an Islander waggled his thumb in a direction farther west on San Carlos Bay Shore Road

skirting the bay. "Just keep going over three bridges and you will find it. Capt, Reid is the postmaster. You'll like him." The present was as good a time as any so off I started in the Pill Box (my antique Chevrolet coupe) to find the Sanibel Post Office. The first bridge was right at hand. Daisy Mayer lived just beyond that one. There were numerous inlets on the bay side of the Island. It was primitive wild jungle sort of country. Mangrove thickets lined the shores with their roots sticking out and coon oysters hanging in clusters up to the high water line. They were entirely out of water at low tide. There was always a wild violent rush of water as the tide was going in or out. It never went anywhere anyway. Just rushed, and it was deep and turbulent. The bridges were rickety, the loose boards clattered and rattled as I drove over. The second bridge was more rickety than the first but wider. The road was twisty and narrow. It was not possible to pass another car and you only hoped no one was coming. Someone backed if that happened. The third bridge was terrific. Quite high, wider and dilapidated, boards all loose and flapping and you hoped it would hold together until you got over. I had changed my mind about looking up the post office after the second bridge but there had been no place to change the direction of the car. You just kept on going. Soon after the third bridge was safely negotiated and one more

post office. It was housed in the front room of Capt. Reid's house, which was one of the early frame cottages. It might have been painted but if so the paint was all worn off from storms and weather. The whole place was weather beaten and picturesque and what with the flag waving I was thrilled. It was nice to meet Capt. Reid and I understood why he was postmaster and would be postmaster as long as he lived, inspite of the fact that he was the only Republican on the Island and he was a Yankee. Neither of those qualifications



This son welcomed me warmly to Sanibel and he read me a letter he had recently received from Postmaster General, James Farley in Washington of commendation for long service as Sanibel postmaster. It was a fine letter. After that hazardous trip to the post office ( the one and only time I ever went) I had great respect for the rural carrier who made the trip several times each day.
