
During the last week before school started, there were

The library also has a "Fairy Godfather" of whom we will tell you also, who has presented us with The Enclyclopedia Britannica.



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
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
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Architect's rendering of the new St. Isabel Catholic Mission to be built on church property adjoining the Telephone Building. ART GALLERY ADDS INTEREST TO ISLANDS

The Seahorse Art Gallery, now in its second sear in, has added a new dimension of interest to the Islands, and has succeeded in focusing attention on the work of the twenty artists whose paintings are now on display. Some of these artists are residents of the Islands and nearby areas, and many have had their paintings shown in other galleries and exhibitions in this country and abroard. Others are being presented at the Seahorse Gallery for the first time. The excel-lence of their work may be of interest to collectors who can discern possibilities of a future acceptance and appreciation by the art world.
Practically all painting media

Practically all painting media and styles are represented in the current show, as well as a wide variety of treatments and individual approaches to related subject matter. Devotees of the traditional, realistic, school will discover many fine examples of this idiom, and those whose taste is more conditioned to the abstract and impressionistic, or to "pop" art, or fantasy, will also find these types of work included.

Leon R. Levy of Sanibel, the director of the gallery, said that the opinions of visitors to the gallery on the subjects of style and technique, run strongly in a number of different directions, and that there seems to be no pattern of comformity of likes - and - dislikes in any given age group. Older people,


supposed to favor the more conventional or the nostalgic, are just as apt to be attracted by the avant-garde approach; the opposite reaction being often observed in younger connoisseurs, whether buyers or merely viewers.

However, what all groups have in common is a willingness and an ability to express their opinions, and Mr. Levy reports that some extremely entertaining and informative discussions on the state of painting have ensued at the Gallery as a result. He says that, since his own taste, interests, and painting techniques cover a wide range and variety, he has found himself arguing with gallery visitors many sides

of the question as to "what constitutes art," with equally firm conviction, but with no abservable conclusions. This, he says, makes running an art gallery interesting.

The current show features paintings by Asbach, Sherwood, Green, Solmes, Herfzberg, Rieser, Bartok, Thomas, Booth, Bancroft, Stamper, Niven, Romig, Hartman, Eager, Rothofol, Halle, Feist, Levy and others.



SANIBEL POST OFFICE MEM-ORIES CONTINUED.

(Last week, Miss Snyder took readers along on a harrowing ride to the old post office. This is the rest of the story.)

Webb Shannahan, atall, gray haired aristocratic man of few words but whose smile was friendly, was carrier for several years after I arrived in the Islands. The Shannahans lived near the light house on the Gulf side. Then came Walter Burke who had come to the Island during the war as an army radio man. After the war he stayed on and got the job of rural carrier and married our popular school teacher Sarah Robinson, Everything happened to Walter, His car got into the ditch and had to be hoisted out. He had breakdowns at inconvient moments. This and that unfortunate thing happened. You just couldn't understand why, but it did. There was an uneasy sense about getting the mail. "Of course Barkis was willin'"-so was Walter but that is how it was. Then came Pat Murphy who now lives on Captiva. Pat isn't really his name but it should have been. It was O. O. Murphy, first O for Oren. Figure that out! You could relax and know the mail was in good hands. Everyone loved Murphy. He had resigned a good job with the Postal Department in Detroit to come to Sanibel and never regretted the change. He was the only one who could yell at me with impunity "Hey Skinny." I loved it. At that time many packages of clothes were delivered at my cottage and he delivered them inside the cottage.

After Reid was gone it was obvious that a new location would have to be selected for the post office. There were two schools of thought. One favored a location at the ferry landing, the other favored having it inside Bailey's store at the mail boat landing on San Carlos Bay. Since I was a new arrival on the Island I knew little of the inner strings pulled but the up-shot was that Capt. Kinsie, owner of the ferry line and considerable acreage on the eastern end of Sanibel, built a little post office and leased it to the government for years to serve as the post office. As I say, it was little. Three was a crowd inside, but there it settled down

to a comfortable, well-ordered life. Scotia Bryant was appointed postmistress and what a wonderful appointment that turned out to be and still is!

Then one day, when the little building was not large enough to house the increasing mail coming to an going from Sanibel, a new efficient and much larger building was constructed in the same location. A picture of the new post office is now one of the favorite post cards. The American flag flutters on top of the pole in front and it is the first thing you saw when you got off the ferry.

The little old post office got trundled away on the back of a truck right down the main road and into oblivion. That was a sad event to have the old place just gone. Retired from public service with no fanfare or ceremonies! What the public doesn't know is that it is doing very nicely, thank you, as a home for chickens. No fluttering of flags, just fluttering of feathers, and silly cackles! It had been used to that before: but had a kinder name for it. Same thing!


The Sanibel post office in 1964 is a far cry from the horse and buggy days when it got its start. It was a shock The Red

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to me just before this Christmas when I got a glimpse behind the scenes and saw mail bags bulging with out going mail piled on the floor layers deep! It looked more like a big city scene rather than our Sanibel post office. Scotia our beloved postmistress was putting some finishing touches on the records as the truck was about to pick up the bags. A big hearty expression of gratitude and appreciation goes out to our post mistress who has regulated this efficient branch of the government over here for these many years. Three cheers and a hurrah to Scotia.






